## **Plot Summary**

Brother Odd by Dean Koontz is based on the character Odd Thomas and his attempt to find peace in the Californian mountain monastery of St. Bartholomew's. Odd has a rather unique gift—he sees dead people—those who are unable to cross over are drawn to him in hopes that he can fix what holds them here. Some want comfort, some forgiveness and others have motives he is unable to grasp. They often complicate his life. After a tragic affair in his hometown of Pico Mundo, Odd retreats to the monastery. He is drawn to situations, and running entirely on intuition and faith that his life has purpose, he follows the pull. Odd looks outside the monastery's guest house window and sees his ghost dog Boo acting as though something terrible is in the shadows. He watches to see what has the dog's attention. Something only he and Odd can see, the other worldly, inky and sinuous shape oozes across the lawn in the shadows. Seemingly half man/half wolf, it glides without even rippling the grass it passes over. Odd wants to look away, but senses that should they ever find out he can see them, his life would become much more difficult. Only the Mother Superior (Sister Angela), Abbot Bernard, and Brother Salvatore (Brother Knuckles) are aware of his special gift. Hoping that he can help one of their own, Brother Constantine, who had been found hanged from the bell tower a year earlier, Odd is given a universal key so that no matter where Constantine appears, Odd can reach him; but life for Odd is never that simple. The appearance of a bodach tells Odd that trouble is coming as they are harbingers of chaos. The more that come, the larger the catastrophe that follows. Bodachs are drawn to pain and chaos, like moths to a flame, and while they seem unable to affect this world directly, Odd is unsure of the extent of their control.

Before he is ready to leave the monastery, Odd is instrumental in unraveling the mystery of Brother Constantine's death. The benefactor of St. Bartholomew's, John Heineman, a man Odd respects and admires, harbors a Jekyll and Hyde personality. Heineman creates a program that he believes can offer scientific proof of the existence of God. Instead he unleashes a variety of angry and violent extensions of himself and unwittingly kills a total of three of the Brothers before Odd, with a great deal of help from an NSA agent masquerading as a librarian, helps to put a stop to his manifestations. When he is finally ready to return to his home town of Pico Mundo, he says goodbye to the Brothers and Sisters, and just days before Christmas, barely down from the Sierra Nevada mountains, Odd feels the pull again. Unable to continue, he gets out and begins walking down the side of the highway following the psychic magnetism that controls his life. The surprises aren't over for Odd, though, as he finally says goodbye to the spirit of Elvis, and finds a new friend has joined him with Boo on his journey to the next adventure.



### **Chapter 1 Summary**

Brother Odd attempts to find peace in the monastery of St. Bartholomew's. Odd has a unique gift. He sees dead people, those who are unable to cross over entirely, are drawn to him hoping that he can fix what holds them here. After a tragic affair in his hometown, Odd retreats to the monastery. He sees something that looks like half man/half wolf, gliding without rippling the grass. Only Mother Superior (Sister Angela), Abbot Bernard, and Brother Salvatore (Brother Knuckles) are aware of his gift to see the dead. Hoping that he can help one of their own, Brother Constantine, who had been found hanged a year earlier, Odd is given a universal key. The appearance of a bodach tells Odd that something bad is coming.

He trails the bodach to St. Bartholomew's School behind the Monastery. It and two others gather around one of the student's bed. They hover around her, feeding on impending violence.

### **Chapter 1 Analysis**

Odd sees dead people. Remarkably, he has a fairly spiritual nature, and when people who are dead but have not quite crossed over come to him, he never turns them away. Despite the interruptions to his own life, he goes out of his way to try to help these spirits continue on their way. Some come to him for comfort, some for justice, and some he never understands completely, but he always tries to help. He also sees other creatures he names bodachs. They are sinuous, inky black shapes that vaguely resemble a cross between wolf and man and glide just above the ground leaving no trace. Odd Thomas has been a guest at St. Bartholomew's Monastery since shortly after his best friend and the love of his life, Stormy Llewellyn was killed, trying once again to find some purpose in his life. Odd follows the bodach. Avoiding contact with anyone else, he finds the bodach and discovers two more as well. Hunched over a student named Justine, they are unaware of his presence, and he behaves as though he is unaware of theirs.



#### **Chapter 2 Summary**

Odd watches the bodachs. They look at the door and quickly leave. Resisting the urge to follow them he sees the student's (Justine) eyes open. Annamarie in the bed next to her says a phrase that Stormy, Odd's girlfriend, used, "Loop me in, Odd one." Wrestling with emotion, he doesn't respond. As much as he wants Stormy back, he knows she's gone. Annamarie fell silent, and looking over at Justine, he sees two tears on her cheek. He leaves the room looking for the bodachs and Boo, his dog.

### **Chapter 2 Analysis**

Odd doesn't want the bodachs to become aware of him, so he wanders around Justine's room adjusting the thermostat and checking the window to make sure it is closed. When the bodachs leave, he doesn't go after them, instead finds himself looking into Justine's open blue eyes. He feels a sudden longing for Stormy that is so strong he wishes Justine's eyes would suddenly become Stormy's. Behind him, Annamarie begins talking in her sleep. At first she just says his name, but then adds the remainder of a phrase that Stormy used to use with him. He is rooted to the spot, unable to speak, knowing if he does, he holds her to a world in which she no longer belongs. Suddenly afraid, he can't even look at Annamarie, but the "Loop me in, Odd one" that comes from her is devastating. He knows he can't respond, but it rattles him. As much as he wants Stormy back, he knows that hoping for the wrong thing will only bring him misery. When Annamarie stops talking to him, he looks over at Justine and sees the tears still left on her jawline. He waits until his heartbeat goes back to normal, and then goes out in search of Boo and bodachs.



### **Chapter 3 Summary**

St. Bartholomew's has an advanced computer system that monitors everything. Fear of fire drives Odd to check all the systems; all are green and working properly. The only threat is from people. Somehow Odd has a hard time picturing the sisters or the monks involved in any such atrocity.

Odd suddenly realizes that his time for quiet contemplation is finished, and this is just God's way of starting the ball rolling again. For seven months, he has enjoyed a much needed hiatus from his real life, but now he is definitely getting the message that it's time to return to work. As he backs out of the computer program, he sees a reflection behind him. He spins the chair around to face the intruder.

### **Chapter 3 Analysis**

Knowing violence is coming, the only thing Odd can think of is fire. The possibility sends him to the computer system in the basement, and he goes from one screen to another checking the status of sprinklers and the propane tanks. Everything is normal. He tries to imagine what else could go wrong, but all he is left with after eliminating the larger, and more natural threats, is people. He can't imagine any of the Sisters going on a rampage any more than he can picture it with any of the Brothers. He closes the computer program down, and in the black screen sees a reflection behind him. Startled, he whirls to face the intruder, spinning the chair around between them.



#### **Chapter 4 Summary**

Odd is relieved to find his visitor is the Mother Superior (Sister Angela). Odd tells her about the bodachs, and the possible reason for their appearance. She guesses that something will happen to the children, but Odd assures her that might not be the case. He asks her about the other spiritual pilgrim, a Russian named Rodion Romanovich. Odd leaves, still trying to figure out why the bodachs have come.

#### **Chapter 4 Analysis**

Odd is surprised by Sister Angela and finds himself telling her the real reason he is up so late. He tells her about the bodachs and about where he saw them. He also tells her that they are harbingers of disaster as a rule. Sister Angela wants a plan, but Odd has no ideas yet as to what might happen. He wonders about the Russian who has a suite in the guest house as well. Sister Angela agrees to check him out discreetly in the morning, but tells Odd that if he needs her sooner, he can reach her on her cell phone. Odd is surprised by the concept of a sister with a cell phone, but she reminds him that it is no less difficult than accepting a fry cook who sees dead people. Odd agrees and leaves to continue checking the school for bodachs and trying to figure out why they were there.



#### **Chapter 5 Summary**

When Odd gets back upstairs, the bodachs are gone. The trouble might have root in Brother John's exploration of the structure of reality from his subterranean work place. Odd goes to the Abbey and down a set of stone stairs. There is a door with a sign: Libera Nos A Malo, which means "Deliver Us From Evil." He unlocks the door and walks toward another door: Lumin De Lumine or "Light from Light." A plasma screen reads Odd's palm print, and Odd steps into a small room. The room descends. A rectangle of red light ushers him forward to the third door: Per Omnia Saecula Saeculorum or "Forever and Ever."

Brother John, John Heineman, was Time magazine's most brilliant physicist of the year. Odd silently waits while Brother John decides whether or not to break his silence. Then Brother John offers Odd a cookie.

#### **Chapter 5 Analysis**

Leaving the school, Odd is suddenly struck by the idea that the disturbances might be coming from Brother John's work on the structure of reality. He goes in through the Abbey in the early morning hours, and passing the kitchen, he heads down the stone stairs. Then he passes through a series of doors, an elevator and a palm reader before gaining access to the subterranean space that Brother John occupies. Brother John was known to the world as John Heinemen, a brilliant physicist. When admitted, he waits for Brother John to speak first, observing the silence instead, if that is Brother John's choice. He hasn't waited long before Brother John offers him a cookie.



#### **Chapter 6 Summary**

Odd asks Brother John about his project. Can it get out of hand and create chaos? He answers it might but might not. Brother John tells Odd that his gift is God-given and he feels obliged to pursue it. Brother John works with intellect only, while Odd relies on a sixth sense when the dead came to him for help. Suddenly Odd finds himself at the door. The door closes, and in the courtyard, he sees snowflakes. For a brief moment, life is beautiful and right. The feeling lasts until he hears the scream.

### **Chapter 6 Analysis**

Odd hopes Brother John can give him some insight as to what might be coming, but he isn't much help. Instead, he gives vague statements that only leave Odd exactly where he started. He still harbors the suspicion that trouble might originate with Brother John's experiments and science and worries that Brother John isn't guided by faith at all. In fact, his sole motivation is intellect, and untempered by faith, Odd fears it could be dangerous. He leaves Brother John reversing the security procedures to get out, thinking about the inscriptions over the doors as he closes and locks each one with his universal key. "For ever and ever" and "deliver us from evil" are the two inscriptions. He heads outside and is stopped in his tracks by the first snowfall he has ever seen in his life. Struck by the miraculousness of it all, he stands there thinking about how perfect it all is, despite the fact that Stormy is no longer in his life. The feeling lasts right up until he hears a scream.



#### **Chapter 7 Summary**

The cry is cut off quickly, he runs in the direction of the cry. Around the corner of the library, he almost trips over a monk lying on the grass. As he leans in to listen for breath, he is clubbed from behind. Odd rolls, gets to his feet, and runs as fast as he can. He grabs a few stones to throw at the pursuer. He circles back and is surprised that the monk is gone. He searches, but finding nothing and returns to the guest house.

#### **Chapter 7 Analysis**

Odd runs toward the outcry and almost falls over a monk lying face down in the grass. Odd tries to check for vital signs, but his hands are so cold he can't be sure whether he is feeling a pulse or not. He leans in to listen for breath just as the assailant swings a club at him from behind. He rolls and gets up running, making his legs move as fast as he can and grabbing stones to throw once he is far enough away to feel safe enough to think of it. By that time though, there is no one following him. He retraces his steps to help the monk, but he is gone also. He searches for a little longer but then heads back to the guest house, teeth chattering.

He is surprised when he gets upstairs to find more light coming from his suite than he had left on. He heads for the open door.



### **Chapter 8 Summary**

Odd tells Brother Knuckles the entire episode, beginning with the bodach he and Boo saw. Odd tells him about the scream and about the unconscious monk. Brother Knuckles agrees to do an unofficial bed count. He will tell Odd in the morning. He asks if Odd knows how long they have before something happens; Odd estimates a day or two. After Brother Knuckles leaves, Odd braces a chair under the door.

### **Chapter 8 Analysis**

Odd finds Brother Knuckles in his room when he returns, and gratefully shares the events of the evening with him. Leaving nothing out, Brother Knuckles worries for a minute that his past is catching up with him and might harm innocent people around him, but Odd assures him that is not the case. In fact, Brother Knuckles is ashamed of his past, and lives his life now in a manner that he hopes makes up for it a little bit. Having lived most of his first forty years as muscle for the mob, he had an awakening of spirit that began when he read the boss' daughter a bedtime story. So taken with the plight of the main character, he finally bought the book a few days later to find out how the story ended. When the rabbit found its way home, he cried. He sat a long time, thinking about the story and reading it over again and again, understanding the symbolism more each time. Eventually, he understands that he is crying for himself and the person he has become and begins to make changes. After a brief time in witness protection, fate brought Brother Knuckles to the monastery, where he now thrived. He tells Odd that he will look for a monk with a headache and report back to Odd in the morning. Odd is nervous enough that he jams a chair under the door handle so he can sleep, and then gives himself yet another opportunity to laugh at himself and at life. At times, Odd feels like he is the hapless character locked in a slapstick movie and when he mixes aspirin and coke and finds himself frothing at the mouth, he wonders at the amount of times things like that happen to him.



#### **Chapter 9 Summary**

Too tired to care about where Boo had been hiding, Odd climbs into bed and falls asleep. He dreams that a bodach is standing in front of him, but it morphs into the Russian guest who reads aloud the card that is framed on the nightstand, "YOU ARE DESTINED TO BE TOGETHER." It was more important than air to Odd.

The dream continues as memories of Stormy overwhelm, and he wakes after less than four hours of a sleep. The framed card was now face down on the nightstand. He checks the chair under the door handle and the latch on the window. Both are secure. Out the window he sees three police cruisers and men searching the grounds.

#### **Chapter 9 Analysis**

Odd cleans up and gets into bed, with Boo at the foot end. He had been hiding in Odds' suite until Odd got into the shower. His company is not unusual, and Odd climbs into bed exhausted. He falls asleep and has troubling dreams that include the Russian guest, Rodion Romanovich and Stormy. His dream is vivid and bittersweet, and he wakes after little more than four hours of disturbing sleep. In his dream, the Russian had read the card in the frame aloud, and now awake, Odd notices the frame face down on the desk. He believes that someone must have come in, but the door is still blocked with the chair, and the window is latched.

Standing there as he fully comes awake, he realizes the flashing lights he sees belong to the three police cars below, and looking closer, he sees that they are systematically searching the meadow.



#### **Chapter 10 Summary**

The police take immediate interest in Odd as he is the only one not in a monk's robe. Brother Knuckles tells Odd that he did a bed check and found all in bed. In the morning, Brother Timothy did not show up for Lauds, and Knuckles found pillows stuffed in his bed. Brother Knuckles thinks Brother Timothy is dead, confirming Odd's fears.

### **Chapter 10 Analysis**

Odd is quick to dress and get downstairs. He wants to know what is going on, but knows that he will only attract attention to himself by going over and asking the police who are standing to one side quietly waiting for Abbot Bernard to finish prayers. Odd tries to look casual, knowing he stands out if not for anything other than that he dresses differently. Brother Knuckles sees him and takes him into the grand cloister to tell him what he discovered. The missing monk is Brother Timothy. Strangely, someone took the time to stuff his bed with pillows to make everyone think he was still in it. By doing so, the search for Brother Timothy was delayed by hours, and snow now covered any traces of what might have happened. Odd asks Brother Knuckles whether or not he thinks Brother Timothy is dead, already sensing the answer before he confirms it. In his professional opinion, Brother Knuckles believes Brother Timothy is already dead.



### **Chapter 11 Summary**

Odd thinks he should talk to the police, but Brother Knuckles convinces him not to. Odd has a gift that not all will understand, and "we need you here." Odd can't argue with that logic.

When they get to the guest house, Elvis is waiting for Odd. He has been with Odd off and on since his death. He really wants to see his mother, Gladys, but is afraid he let her down. Elvis isn't easy to convince that his mother loves him regardless, and he should have no fear of a reunion.

#### **Chapter 11 Analysis**

Brother Knuckles helps Odd to see that talking to the police is a mistake. He reminds Odd that while those who knew him accepted his gifts as they were, and worked with Odd on occasion, there were many out there who wouldn't share this enthusiasm. The police here could just as easily detain Odd, and then he would be no help to Brother Knuckles at all.

Walking back to the guest cloisters, they go in to find Elvis, who is waiting for Odd. Odd tells Brother Knuckles Elvis is there. The dead don't talk to Odd, but they seem as real to him as anyone else. When Elvis puts his arm around Odd comfortingly, Odd feels the warmth of it, even though at any moment Elvis could walk through the wall as well. Elvis stays with Odd because he hopes that being with him will help him summon the courage he needs to go to that higher place. Odd tries to convince him that he should go. His mother Gladys would be so happy to see him, but Elvis feels profoundly guilty about the way he let his gift go, and traded it for a life of drugs and alcohol. Still, Odd tells him he would be welcomed.



#### **Chapter 12 Summary**

Odd and Brother Knuckles search, but find no trace of Brother Timothy. Odd retreats to the library, Elvis with him, but Brother Knuckles looks over invoices and then goes to mass. Odd is startled momentarily when Romanovich the Russian shows up in the library.

After the Russian leaves, Brother Rafael tells Odd that Brother Timothy has not been found, but the police are giving up their search. They unofficially determined that Brother Timothy is probably taking a break from the tedium of the monastery.

#### **Chapter 12 Analysis**

Odd and Brother Knuckles search for, but don't locate Brother Timothy. Neither of them really expects to; instead, Odd and Elvis spend some time in the library, where Odd literally runs into Rodion Romanovich while looking through the stacks. They have a meaningless conversation after which Odd wonders why neither of them brought up the missing Brother Timothy. Did they both intuitively know the answers already? Odd thought that perhaps that was the case. When the decision came to abandon the search for Brother Timothy, Brother Rafael is beside himself. He can't understand the attitude the police have taken in assuming that Brother Timothy was merely AWOL. By eightforty, they are all gone. Elvis stands outside in the snow trying to catch snowflakes in his mouth.



### **Chapter 13 Summary**

Odd finally gives in to his "psychic magnetism" and begins looking for Brother Timothy. He finally follows his instincts outside. After wandering for some time, he gives up thinking about Brother Timothy. Part of him didn't really want to find his dead body and therefore inhibited the "search." He heads for the school, but before he arrives, he hears a keening sound, and can't shake the feeling that he is being watched. He hears otherworldly noise coming from every direction.

### **Chapter 13 Analysis**

Odd wants to help Brother Knuckles find Brother Timothy and figure out what is going to happen, but he has little faith in himself. He knows and admits that he has a stronger "psychic magnetism" than most people, but he still has a hard time believing he can help. Still, he goes outside and concentrates on Brother Timothy, hoping to find him. The effort was halfhearted, though, as Odd didn't really want to find Brother Timothy's corpse. Finally, he decides to concentrate on bodachs and the upcoming nightmare instead and finds himself heading towards the school. Halfway there, he gets the feeling he is being followed and about to be attacked, but turning quickly finds no one. He hears a sound that he can't identify as being from our world and stands in the snow, trying to figure out which direction it is coming from, but it seems to be from all directions.



### **Chapter 14 Summary**

Odd starts toward the school again and the keening stops, but he senses movement. Then something crosses his path, ten feet ahead. Moving with a grace that doesn't seem possible, it appears to be a construct of bones with an icy covering. Odd hurries forward, noting the prints the creature makes as he passes them. As soon as he is inside, he hears scraping on the far side of the door.

#### **Chapter 14 Analysis**

Odd isn't as easily rattled as most people are, mostly because he's been around and helped dead people for some time. He stands out in the snow, taking his hood down and listening for the source of the noise. He sees a shape moving in the distance, but can't make out what it is. He has a feeling that there is some form of intelligence involved, and whatever it is, it has its own locomotion. He gets the feeling something is behind him and turns, but nothing is there. Then, heading for the school, he sees another figure just ten feet ahead. Bones clad in ice and moving with a grace that seems impossible, Odd watches as it goes across his path. He sees the footprints it made, knowing for sure he isn't crazy now, and hurries into the school. Right away, the strangeness fades, and he begins to second guess himself, but then he hears the sound at the door.



### **Chapter 15 Summary**

Sounding like bone on wood, the scraping continues, and then the doorknob rattles. Pressing his nose to the window he sees bone-like structures longer than fingers lined up like a serpentine keyboard, and curved through still more rows of bone that join with what appears to be knuckles and sockets. He watches it remake itself again and again. Then it flexed away from the window and was gone, leaving Odd hugging himself with a mix of wonder and dread.

#### **Chapter 15 Analysis**

Inside the school, Odd feels safe at first, and even starts to second guess what he saw and heard outside, but when the noises start at the door, all doubt is gone. The door rattles, and Odd goes to the window to get a closer look. What he sees defies everything he knows. A kaleidoscope of bones that are longer than fingers and are lined up like a keyboard and are connected with knuckles and sockets. Odd isn't as surprised by that as he is by the fact that it keeps remaking itself into more and more intricate and beautiful patterns. At first mesmerized, Odd stands with his hand against the glass watching, but then the glass under his hand cracks and breaks the spell he is under. He backs up, but instead of breaking in, the creature flexes and heads into the snow. Odd is so unnerved that he can't move. He stands there, hugging himself until Sister Clair Marie rescues him by asking him to take off his boots.



#### **Chapter 16 Summary**

Sister Clair Marie asks him what's wrong. He doesn't want to worry her. Then she grabs Odd's boots and opening the front door, begins beating the snow off them. Odd hurries over to her expecting immediate problems, but by the time he reaches her, she is closing the door unscathed. Then she sends him to see Mother Superior, who had summoned him.

### **Chapter 16 Analysis**

Odd takes stock of himself, and still struggling with what he witnessed, he is pale. When Sister Clair Marie notices that, she asks him what's wrong, but Odd doesn't want to frighten her, so he can't tell her the truth. Instead, he tells a lie. He tells her that the snow outside is the trouble. He has never seen it before and makes her believe that he feels the weather is ominous. She goes to great lengths to tell Odd that he should make an effort to embrace the weather, in order to understand the balance in the world. Odd doesn't want the sister to go outside again, and nervously tells her so as she sends him off to see the Mother Superior.



### **Chapter 17 Summary**

There were several categories of children at St. Bartholomew's, ranging from severe physical retardation with mild mental retardation to severe mental retardation and all manner of affliction in between. Most of these children were abused. A ten-year-old prodigy sits at the piano playing softly, and the children play and laugh while bodachs crawl through the room. The three Odd had seen the night before have become seven.

#### **Chapter 17 Analysis**

Odd notices the recreation room on his way to Mother Superior's and looking in he can't help reflecting on the varying children, who made their lives at the school. Some were severely physically retarded, and some mentally, and some in between the two, but one thing they all had in common was the need for affection. One child is playing the piano softly, although unable to dress himself, and Odd can't help wishing those who hurt children into a special pit in hell. He watches, and glancing around the room notes that there are now seven bodachs, where yesterday there were only three.



### **Chapter 18 Summary**

Mother Superior is certain Brother Timothy didn't run off for R&R as the police suggested; Odd agrees. He tells her about the seven bodachs in the children's recreation room. She suggests moving the kids, but Odd points out that this could play right into the problem. He asks her to trust him and issue an order for all to stay indoors and to lock and latch all entrances and windows.

### **Chapter 18 Analysis**

Odd goes to Mother Superior's office and is reluctant to tell her too much. After a little small talk, she comes straight to the point and asks about Brother Timothy. Odd has to admit he doesn't know exactly what happened, but it wasn't anything good. He tells her about the four additional bodachs in the recreation room, and she suggests they should move the children, but Odd is worried it might make things even worse. He asks Sister Angela to do him a favor and accept something on faith without asking questions. When she agrees, he tells her to announce that everyone is to stay indoors for the duration of the storm and keep windows and doors locked. Mother Superior agrees and asks Odd what is out there. ### **Chapter 19 Analysis**

Odd concentrates on finding the source of the imminent danger, but finds himself in Justine's room again. He tries to fight the urge to go there, but having put out a call for information, he can't seem to redirect himself. Going into room 32, he finds Justine seemingly aware and looking straight at him, but what truly unnerves him is the smell of peach shampoo. Not any peach shampoo, but exactly the same as the stuff Stormy used to give him after a day working as a fry cook. It was the only scent that covered the smell of hamburgers and french fries. He stands there, unable to move until strangled sounds come from Justine. Despite partial paralysis, after a strangled "no" from Odd, Justine somehow finds the strength to raise her arm and point out the window. Odd goes to look and sees light in a window across from them. Then he see a shapeless form, similar to a bodach, but not, standing in the window. Now he has a direction, and though he knows the time is near, he still can't pull himself out of room 32, until no trace of the peach shampoo lingers in the room.



### **Chapter 20 Summary**

Odd goes to Jacob's room. Odd sits at the table across from him and looks at Jacob's drawing. Jacob was born with some affliction that reminds Odd of Down's Syndrome in some ways, but not in others. Jacob is working carefully on a woman's portrait. Odd tells Jacob how talented he is. Jacob asks Odd if he ever floats away when the dark comes, and that he's afraid he'll float wrong when the dark comes. After a while, Jacob says simply, "he wants me dead."

#### **Chapter 20 Analysis**

When Odd crosses the courtyard and finds the room opposite Justine's, he finds Jacob sitting a table drawing. Odd asks if he can come in and takes the silence he gets as assent. Jacob is drawing one of dozens of portraits of the same woman. Speaking quietly to Odd, he asks him if he ever floats away at night and then tells Odd that sometimes Jacob sees the ocean. Jacob's worried though. The ocean keeps moving, and he's afraid that he'll float the wrong way when the dark comes. Jacob seems convinced that when it gets dark, the darkness is coming, which Odd interprets to mean that death is coming, possibly tonight. He tells Odd that the dark wants him dead. Odd doesn't entirely understand, but it seems as though the trouble might be coming tonight.



#### **Chapter 21 Summary**

Odd asks Jacob who wants him dead. The answer: the Neverwas. Neverwas once came to him, and seeing that Jacob was full of black said, "Let him die." Odd is painfully aware that Jacob knows something that will help him figure this all out, but when Odd presses him for more information, he says he saw Them and the Neverwas, but he fears that when the darkness comes, he'll float off in the wrong direction and not be able to find the bell.

#### **Chapter 21 Analysis**

Odd tries to get more out of Jacob, but it seems as though their conversation just goes around in circles. He asks Jacob who wants him dead, and Jacob tells him that it's the Neverwas. Jacob tells Odd that he's (Jacob) dumb but not stupid and that he knows what he saw. Odd tells him he isn't dumb because dumb can't draw like Michelangelo, but Jacob isn't convinced. Instead he launches into a barrage of sing-song rhymes about "dumb" until Odd begs him to stop. Odd tries to explain to Jacob that the children who made up those rhymes were just jealous of him and his ability to draw, but Jacob doesn't believe him. He quietly tells Odd that the Neverwas came once before, when Jacob was filled with black, and said "let him die," but he still tells Odd that his isn't afraid of Them or the Neverwas. The only thing Jacob is afraid of is floating the wrong way in the dark and not finding the bell. Odd knows there is some information inside Jacob that will probably help him, but he can't figure out how to extract it. He tries several tactics before in frustration, he tells Jacob he'll be back in the afternoon to visit, but Jacob is not responding anymore.



### **Chapter 22 Summary**

Sister Miriam tells Odd that the portrait Jacob draws is indeed Jacob's mother who raised him on her own. Before she died when he was thirteen, she made arrangements for Jacob to stay with the church. After her death, her ashes were scattered in the ocean. Jacob is convinced that he might not be able to find her when he dies, despite assurances that his mother now waits in heaven for him.

Odd turns to see a hooded figure in the doorway. The figure seems to be without a face, though he is standing under a light that should easily illuminate him. The figure retreats. Odd follows, but finds no sign of it.

### **Chapter 22 Analysis**

Odd goes back down to the nurse's station and finds Sister Miriam there. He asks her about Jacob, confirming that the portrait he draws over and over is that of his mother. He asks her about the Neverwas, but Sister Miriam hasn't heard Jacob use that expression and can't help. She doesn't understand Odd's interest in Jacob, and Odd can't exactly tell her that Stormy sent him a message from beyond that told him that Jacob held the key to the mystery that was unfolding. Sister Miriam tells Odd that Jacob's mother had died of cancer when he was just thirteen, and she had been cremated and her ashes spread at sea. It explains why Jacob is so worried about not being able to find her when the darkness comes for him. He's afraid that when he dies, he won't be able to find her, despite Sister Miriam's constant reassurances that his mother is waiting for him in heaven.

### **Chapter 23 Summary**

Odd heads to the kitchen for a sandwich. He sees Rodion Romanovich applying icing to cakes. Rodion claims to be from Indianapolis, but Odd doesn't believe him and tries to catch him in a half truth. It doesn't work.

Rodion asks Odd have a discussion about subatomic particles behavior. Rodion explains how quantum theory tells us that every point in the universe is connected with every other point, regardless of distance. That being so, people, information or objects should be able to move between one point and any other instantly. What holds us back is our lack of sufficient understanding. #### **Chapter 23 Analysis**

When Odd can't find the mysterious faceless figure he saw, he heads for the kitchen, suddenly hungry. Sister Regina Marie makes him a sandwich in less time than it takes Odd to wash his hands. He takes it and looking for a seat finds himself looking at Rodion. Still suspicious though he is of the Russian, Odd isn't impolite, and takes the chair offered. He watches Romanovich icing one of ten pan cakes laid out, and he tells Odd that baking is something he finds very relaxing. Odd learns that he is from Indiana, and asks him questions trying to trap him in a mistake that would give away the true reason he is staying in the guest quarters. The big Russian feels much the same way about Odd. He has the impression that there is more to Odd than Odd lets on, and Rodion is right. They discuss quantum theory, and Odd is reminded by Rodion that on some scale, we can shape reality. He also speaks of the fact that every point in the universe is connected. Odd is polite, but makes his exit when his sandwich and vanilla coke are done.

He takes his plate and glass back to the kitchen, and Sister Regina Marie mysteriously appears to take them from him. As they are standing there discussing Rodion Romanovich's ability to bake, the bells of the abbey begin to peal. It isn't a regular time for bells, and Odd excuses himself immediately and hurries to see if Brother Constantine is the reason they are ringing.



### **Chapter 24 Summary**

Quickly Odd heads up the stairs, the noise of the bells now so angry and loud that Odd can't block it out. He gets to the top, and watches dead Brother Constantine. He is psychically sending out waves of poltergeist energy that make the bells ring angrily. Finally the noise is reduced to small harmonic tones.

### **Chapter 26 Summary**

Odd returns to the reception area. He has never encountered these kind of spirits. Odd tells Sister Angela that Brother Constantine was murdered. His reluctance to leave this world is because he fears for the Abbey brothers. Odd tells Mother Superior that the murderer came back for Brother Timothy and how he tried to hang him (Odd) in the bell tower. Odd tells her the murderer is someone he knows. Brother Constantine must have witnessed something before he was killed. Maybe Brother Timothy as well. Odd asks her to keep the children safe and to fortify and defend the indoor space.

#### **Chapter 26 Analysis**

Odd returns to the reception area where he puts his now dry boots on his cold feet, still trying to figure out who he saw, and why. One thing was certain; he was seeing things he had never before encountered. Sister Angela shows up, and Odd explains that Brother Constantine had been murdered and lingers now because he fears for the safety of the remaining brothers, and doesn't want to leave while they all still believe he hung himself. Mother Superior asks if Brother Constantine is present and when Odd points to where he is standing, Mother Superior tells him they pray for him and miss him every day. ### **Chapter 27 Summary**

Fortifying the school is the first priority, but Odd knows he needs more than ten strong and courageous men who aren't afraid to do battle if necessary. Odd and Mother Superior pick five names. Each has some previous experience that would qualify him to be helpful. His plan is to arm the five with bats and wait. Odd decides to drive to the abbey and pick up as many Brothers as possible. Odd wants Romanovich to drive the second vehicle. He doesn't trust Rodion and would prefer that Rodion be outside their defenses rather than inside. Odd plans to leave Rodion in the Abbey.

#### **Chapter 27 Analysis**

Odd and Mother Superior sit in her office thinking of which of the Brothers might be best equipped to deal with this kind of problem. Odd would like to have three times that, but he thinks the best way to assemble them is to let the five strongest Brothers chosen to select the rest themselves. Two obstacles need to be overcome. He asks Rodion to drive the second plow-equipped vehicle, and Rodion agrees. Rodion comments about Odd's knowledge of Indiana and Indianapolis, but Odd lies smoothly. They exchange another barb or two until they were even.

#### **Chapter 28 Analysis**

Odd goes to the kitchen to enlist Rodion's help but also to continue the verbal sparring that has become their medium of conversation. Odd continues to try to make Rodion slip up in areas that he should know for sure if he truly is a librarian from Indianapolis. Rodion never slips up, but that only makes Odd distrust him more. There is an air of deceit about the man that bothers Odd. Treachery and villainy are likely more the character traits of this chameleon. He enlists Rodion's aid in driving the second plow equipped vehicle, and Rodion agrees. They plan to meet just before one in the parking garage. Even once arrangements are made, Odd tosses out a statement of half truths to see if Rodion catches them, and of course he does, but it only increases Rodion's suspicion of Odd and his claims that he is just fascinated with everything Indiana. Odd saying he is a self-proclaimed Hoosier is like Rodion saying he's an Indianapolis librarian.



### **Chapter 29 Summary**

Odd heads toward the garage, and then starts one of the vehicles. Then he shuts if off again and gets out to find Boo waiting. Odd's psychic magnetism kicks in and he realizes that Boo is trying to get him to open the door. He goes through and finds himself in a boiler room. There are monitors in all the rooms, and all seems normal. Odd notices that the pipes disappear behind a panel and approaches warily. Using a tool hanging on the wall, he opens the bolts holding the panel in place.

#### **Chapter 29 Analysis**

Odd heads to the garage, thinking about Boo, who seems to summon him. ### **Chapter 35 Analysis**

#### **Chapter 36 Summary**

Odd tells Rodion to go into the Abbey and get the Brother's ready. Odd collects the keys from both vehicles and pockets them, to prevent Rodion from driving back to the school. Odd tries to explain without telling Brother Knuckles too much. Trusting him explicitly, Odd tells him he found Brother Timothy, but there is no body to show the Sheriff.

### **Chapter 36 Analysis**

#### **Chapter 37 Summary**

It is anything but silent in the second SUV as they follow Rodion back to the school. One by one the Brothers ask questions, and Odd finds ways to evade them. They are almost back to the school when out of the storm comes a scuttling collection of bones.

### **Chapter 37 Analysis**

Brother Knuckles drives the second SUV with Odd and the remaining Brothers, following Rodion in the first. He is still disturbed that he didn't foresee the second set of keys scenario, and though the Brothers are full of questions, Odd isn't ready to answer them yet. He wants to have them all together in the school before he tries to describe what he has seen, and what Brother Timothy has become. Brother Quentin makes the observation that Odd's left eye twitches when he is being evasive, which is often during this drive. He is about to debate that observation when he turns and out the window sees Boo and Elvis capering across the courtyard together. It is the unabridged joy with which they romp together that makes Odd glad for once that he has the gift that allows him to "see." His smile prompts questions from Brother Knuckles and he explains that Elvis might be moving soon. Brother Knuckles is thrilled, and Brother Quentin is even more confused. Still, Odd reveals nothing. They almost make it to the school uneventfully, but just before they do, one of those bony structures lumbers out in front of them.



#### **Chapter 38 Summary**

Part of Odd hopes that he is the only one who can see the monsters, but that hope is quickly dispelled. Rodion lurches to a halt as a structure of bones as big as two horses running nose to tail, lumbers across the road in front of him and out of sight over the embankment. ### **Chapter 39 Summary**

The tires turn slowly in the air as the SUV lays there, with no easy way for the Brothers to exit. The Russian and eight Monks stay inside while the beast, rather than pursuing them, retreats a little and watches them. Brother Knuckles backs up his SUV then builds up the revolutions and accelerates. He turns at the last possible moment slamming into the creature, and when it explodes, it takes the windshield and Odd's courage with it. They quickly help the Monks and Rodion out of the other SUV. ### **Chapter 39 Analysis**

When the beast steps back after puncturing the tires of the first SUV and turning it on i's side, Odd can't believe that it doesn't just climb inside and begin hauling the Monks out one at a time and treating them to the same fate as Brother Timothy. Instead, it stands back and watches, and before Odd can figure out what to do, Brother Knuckles has their SUV in reverse and is leaving. Odd is horrified, thinking they are leaving the Brothers behind, but Knuckles quickly corrects him. ### **Chapter 44 Summary**

Romanovich praises Odd's ability to extract information from Jacob. Odd knows the key is with Jacob and his father. Mother Superior approaches, scattering bodachs. Odd asks her the name of Jacob's father, she says it is unknown. Odd reminds her that they have to find a child like Justine, but who can speak. Flossie Bodenblatt, had been through it all, but is a child of spirit and has regained the ability to speak. She had been brought back to her room for Odd.

#### **Chapter 44 Analysis**

After leaving Jacob, Odd and Rodion run into Sister Angela. Odd asks her about Jacob's father, but she tells him there is nothing in the file. Odd is under the impression that Rodion knows more than he is telling, and when he voices his opinion on that subject, Rodion doesn't disagree. Flossie turns out to be so much like a younger Stormy that Odd simply can't bring himself to make the connection. He can barely sit beside her and keep his emotions in check, and after just a couple of minutes, he knows he can't. He explains the situation to Sister Angela, telling her that Stormy has tried to communicate with him twice through Justine, and that he believes she could tell him what is going to happen, but he can't use an innocent. ### **Chapter 46 Summary**

### **Chapter 47 Analysis**

While bodachs are not concentrating in any particular area, because they believe John Heineman is at the root of the disturbances, Odd and Rodion think Jacob is the child most at risk. Because John was so vehemently against having anything to do with him as a child, it stands to reason that any monstrous creation of his would be bent to claim his son as its first trophy. As such, their fortifications concentrate on keeping all the children safe, but with special care taken to keeping Jacob safe.

### **Chapter 50 Analysis**

He concentrates, and then explains that the room is wired to him specifically; and in front of them on the floor small cubes appear very similar to the ones into which the ice monster disappeared. When it is finished, Brother John is looking at it with a mixture of joy and wonder. He tells him that it isn't proof of God. He walks over to tell him when he realizes he's left his bat behind. He goes back to retrieve it just as the glass cracks.

### **Chapter 51 Analysis**

Brother John "creates" a floppy for them, which is simply a furry little creature with big eyes. Harmless, and relatively cute looking at first glance, there are a couple of problems with his creation. The first is the method by which it grew. It began i's life as a collection of little cubes that looked exactly like the collection of cubes from the ice monster that vanished before their eyes in the school. Rodion tells him to get rid of the abomination, and with some reluctance, he does.

Rodion asks Brother John if he is aware of the other abominations he has created, and though it is clear that Brother John is unsure. Some other part of John, the Other John, made these, and the Other John was nothing more than an angry child. Odd shows him the ice monster drawing, and explains that Jacob calls them the dogs of the Neverwas, and Jennifer called him (Brother John) the Neverwas. Jacob remembers him telling his mother to let the infection take him. He remembers it all. At first denying it, he looks at the drawing more closely. He tells him that the same obsessed child who used forty-seven sets of Lego to build a model of quantum foam had to have created this creature, and slowly Brother John agrees. Most of all, he tells Brother John that it isn't too late to fix it all, but Brother John sadly disagrees.

### **Chapter 52 Analysis**

While Rodion is explaining to Brother John that some part of him must have manifested the beasts that they have seen, Odd is thinking about the creatures here at the abbey versus every other supernatural or other worldly creature he's come across. Without exception, the others all died by decomposition, not deconstruction. The very vanity displayed by each of the creations seen here point to something created as opposed to something of the nature he's dealt with before. Rodion makes him "think away" the creature on the floor, and asks him about the other creatures, but John denies having anything to do with them.

One of the ice creatures is attempting to break into the school, but Brother Knuckles is not afraid. He councils Brother Maxwell to be unafraid as well because they have some advantages over the creature outside. The biggest of which is that they are essentially good, and the fact that they are made out of flesh and blood doesn't hurt either.

Odd has a sudden flash of understanding and tells Brother John that the Other John who is creating these creatures is like an angry child, but that there is still time to fix all of this. There was still time to heal the wounded and broken heart of the boy who was his son. Brother John sadly disagrees.



### **Chapter 53 Summary**

Without warning, the figure of Death comes toward Odd out of nowhere and knocks him flying. Odd moves as fast as he can after landing, and a wing chair quickly follows, crashing where he had been. This time Death has the face of Brother John. Death came at Odd again. Rodion pulls out his pistol and fires at death until he dissolves, but as quickly as he does, he rematerializes and it begins again. Rodion quickly empties another clip into it, noticing that Brother John stands in the corner with his eyes closed, creating it again and again.

At the school, Brother Maxwell realizes that the ice monster isn't afraid of them. A tentacle came through the window and ejected or broke off; it immediately reformed into a smaller version of itself. Brother Knuckles took two good swings and it broke into a million pieces but more were being dropped through the window. Brother Maxwell tells Brother Fletcher to remove Jacob. The two Brothers keep swinging, and then Brother Maxwell was pierced by one that rematerialized behind him. He watches in horror as Brother Maxwell is transformed into one of these things, shredding the storm suit as it emerges. The noise is horrendous, and they hope that Jacob is safe.

In desperation, to stop Death from reforming, Rodion shoots Brother John twice. The impact takes him off his feet, and he is unable to reform himself. Death reached Rodion, but after laying one hand on his shoulder, did nothing else. Then Death dissolved into a million pieces.

#### **Chapter 53 Analysis**

Suddenly, Death appeared and knocked Odd flying. Odd got out of the way quickly and managed to avoid the wing chair that followed, but Death continues to stalk him. Odd notices that this time Death has John's face - but not the face that Odd is used to. This face is hard, mean and in control. Rodion comes to his aid immediately, pulling out his pistol and shooting Death until he dissolves, but immediately he begins to reassemble. Rodion notices Brother John standing off to one side of the room, eyes closed, and concentrating, and did the only thing he could. He shot Brother John twice. Brother John fell to the floor, and Death turned to look at John, surprised that his creator has been stopped. Then Death dissolves for good.

Brother Maxwell and Knuckles are left to fight off the ice beast, which has broken the window and is slipping in tentacles that break off and become miniature versions of itself inside. Swinging with all his might, Brother Knuckles manages to break one into a many pieces, and Brother Maxwell shouts at Brother Fletcher to get Jacob out. Brother Maxwell hits one, but behind him another one pierces him, and Brother Knuckles



watches in horror as Brother Maxwell becomes one of them. Brother Knuckles retreats and gets help barring the doors, leaving what is left of Maxwell on the other side.



### **Chapter 54 Summary**

Before midnight that evening, the first group of NSA agents arrive. Odd isn't sure how Romanovich contacted them. The NSA create cover stories for the deaths of Brothers Maxwell and Timothy, and decide to put Brother John's body on ice for a year until he wouldn't be linked and then announce that he'd had a massive heart attack. The icy monsters disappeared into tiny cubes when John had been shot, so there were no more casualties. Brother John's array of computers are impounded by the NSA. Everyone was sworn to secrecy, under threat of lifelong imprisonment, and Abbot Bernard decides to leave his position between Christmas and New Years. He had supported John Heineman and embraced his idea that God could be found through science.

Three days later, Rodion comes to Odd's suite with wine, and everything necessary to make sandwiches. Elvis hung around while they ate, and Odd had the feeling he was waiting to make a spectacular exit. Odd is ready to go back to Pico Mundo. Rodion is headed to California where he intends to meet up with his wife when she returns from space. She was aboard an orbiting platform, and he can discuss no more about it. Odd tells Rodion that he is a little bit worried about the information in the computers, and what would happen if it got into the wrong hands. Rodion puts his mind at ease, telling Odd he made applesauce out of the information before he even called anyone in. Relieved, they toast each other.

### **Chapter 54 Analysis**

The flurry of activity around Bartholomew's is more than they have ever had before, but things begin to settle down into kind of a sad resignation. Odd regrets not figuring things out early enough to save Brother Timothy and Rodion regrets not understanding that if he had shot Brother John sooner, he might have saved Brother Maxwell, but out of it all, they have become friends. Odd trusts him. Odd was told not to discuss any of what he'd seen or heard, but he still wrote the manuscript as a way of sorting it all out in his head. A mass is said for Brothers Timothy and Maxwell, and even Brother John is forgiven for his misguided and troubled intentions. Even the Abbot steps down, unable to excuse his willing acceptance of the attempt Brother John made to use science to prove God's existence.

Odd decides to return to Pico Mundo, sensing it is time, and Rodion shares that he is headed to California to meet his wife, who is returning from time aboard a space station. They drink a toast to each other, having become new friends.



#### **Chapter 55 Summary**

Having already said his goodbyes, Odd chose to leave while the Brothers would be at Mass and the Sisters would be busy getting the children up and ready for the day. The Cadillac pulled up to the guest house, and Odd hurries to tell Ozzie not to bother getting out, but it is too late. Odd puts his bags in the trunk, and after closing it, Odd is surprised to see that all the Brothers were gathered quietly on the steps along with Sister Angela and a dozen of the nuns. Sister Angela unrolls a piece of paper—Jacob had drawn Odd and given it to Sister Angela to put on her wall. Odd tries to leave quietly, but finds that the Brothers and Sisters have other ideas. They aren't about to let him leave without making a little bit of a fuss. Instead of attending to their regular chores, they all gather quietly on the guest house steps to say goodbye. Sister Angela shows Odd a picture Jacob drew of him, and tells him she intends to put it on her wall of fame. He is to join the likes of George Washington, Flannery O`Connor and Harper Lee, who all share the same quality. Humility. All had been offered accolades and enticements and turned them down. All lived a life that used the best of their gifts and asked nothing in return. Odd belonged on the wall, even if he didn't see it right away, and his humility on the whole subject just confirmed it.

Sister Angela says goodbye and kisses his cheek, and he kisses hers back. Then he got into the Cadillac beside his friend and mentor, Ozzie Boone, noticing Elvis and Boo in the back seat, and they drove away. The Brothers and Sisters stood there watching, and Odd kept looking back, until they were out of sight.



### **Chapter 56 Summary**

The Cadillac had been refitted to accommodate the weight and dimensions Ozzie's 400 pounds, and they were out of the mountains in record time. Odd asks Ozzie for a favor, knowing that he is a wealthy man, would he put together a trust fund for a hundred thousand dollars in the name of Flossie Bodenblatt, to aid her in working with dogs. Elvis starts walking backward in front of Odd, grinning like he has a secret. Elvis disappears slowly still walking backward in front of Odd. It would be the last time Odd sees Elvis. Boo was still with him, though. He is the first ghost dog to ever have joined Odd and had been at the monastery a year before Odd came. Odd liked to think that Boo was waiting for him. It took a few minutes before he realizes that someone has fallen into step beside him.

Odd greets him respectfully, and he tips his hat, smiling his great smile at Odd. Odd tells him he's honored to do the same thing for him as he had for Elvis. He winks at Odd, and just a few days before Christmas, they follow the highway—Odd, Boo, and Frank Sinatra's ghost.

#### **Chapter 56 Analysis**

Ozzie is more than just friend and mentor to Odd. He is like a father to him, and the big man feels that Odd is like a son to him. Therefore, when Odd asks him to apply some of the wealth he has accumulated as a writer to a trust fund for Flossie Bodenblatt, Ozzie readily agrees. He is actually thrilled that he can finally do something for Odd, as in the past Odd has given him little opportunity to do so. That easily, a trust fund for working with dogs in the amount of a hundred thousand dollars is established.

Shortly after accomplishing that, Odd is stricken with the urge to get out of the vehicle. He asks Ozzie to pull over, and though he does, Ozzie is not happy about the fact that Odd is not coming all the way back to Pico Mundo, but Odd reminds him that his life is not his own. He lives in service to his gift. Reluctantly, Ozzie hugs him goodbye, and Odd tells him not to worry. He has Boo and Elvis with him. They watch Ozzie leave, and



walking away Odd runs on instinct, with Boo, the first ghost dog he has ever seen and who had been at the Abbey for about a year before Odd came (Odd liked to think he was waiting for him to arrive) and Elvis, who playfully walked backwards in front of Odd. "You can go," Odd tells him. It isn't the first time he's told Elvis that, but this time Elvis grins at Odd and still walking backwards, disappears. Odd walks with Boo and suddenly realizes that someone has fallen into step with him. Turning to see Frank Sinatra is a bit of a shock, but Odd tells him he'll be honored to help if he can, and winking at him, Frank smiles that smile of his, and they set out on the path that pulls Odd to it. Christmas is only days away.



### **Characters**

### **Odd Thomas (Brother Odd)**

Odd Thomas is twenty-one years old, and after losing his best friend and girlfriend sixteen months previously, Odd has chosen to stay at St. Bartholomew's Abbey for an indefinite period of time. He is picking up the pieces slowly, but still has trouble finding any real purpose or meaning in his life since her death. Originally from Pico Mundo, Odd is vouched for by his longtime friend and police chief of Pico Mundo, Wyatt Porter, and the town's Catholic priest, Father Llewellyn. Father Llewellyn was Stormy's uncle, and Stormy was the love of Odd's life.

Odd Thomas has the uncertain gift of being able to see dead people. In fact, he sees more than just dead people. He also sees vile and frightening creatures he has named bodachs after the bodachs of British Isles lore. Troubled souls approach him for help, and Odd does all he can to ease their transition to the next spiritual level, at which point he no longer sees them. Over the years, some of his more regular companions have included Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra. When Stormy died, her soul didn't linger and Odd misses her terribly. He has trouble finding meaning in his life since her death, and this is a large part of the reason that he left his home town of Pico Mundo and set himself up for a stay at St. Bartholomew's Abbey in the Sierra Nevada mountains. In an effort to divorce himself from dead people and the responsibility of having to help or being unable to help them, he ran, but found that his life followed him. There is no place to hide when you have this kind of gift.

Most at home in blue jeans and t-shirts, Odd is not particularly handsome, but makes up for his lack of good looks with an abundance of charm and personal magnetism. Odd Thomas was plain and simply very difficult not to like. He just grew on you. With strong moral standards and spiritual understanding, he spends most of his time helping those who are in distress. When he isn't helping the recently departed on their way, Odd Thomas is a fry cook and a very good one at that. He is a master at the griddle and is often complimented on his ability.

#### **Bodachs**

A supernatural entity seen only by Odd Thomas and Boo, the Abbey's only dog, Bodachs are inky black and have little more substance than the shadows themselves. They slink along, low to the ground, as large as an average man. Suggestive of something that resembles a wolf, Bodachs are sleek, sinister and featureless. Though Bodachs are actually part of the folklore of the British Isles and are supposed to be vile beasts that slither down chimneys and steal children that misbehave, they are as close to describing what Odd sees as he can get.



Moving with intention, the Bodachs travel without leaving so much as a ripple in their wake. Odd has seen them enter through keyholes, through small chinks in window panes and even by chimneys as well, but no matter how they arrive, their arrival is cause for immediate concern. Bodachs are attracted to violence or catastrophe and seem to arrive just before whatever suffering is about to erupt. Like spiritual vampires, they hover nearby with certain knowledge of the future, and wait as though they are actually feeding on the human suffering they see. They seem to know that animals see them, but Odd takes great care not to let them know that he can see them as well. Somehow, he feels that if they knew he saw them, they would show him little mercy. Bodachs do not fly, pass through walls or closed doors and are able to lope but not glide like movie ghosts do.

The arrival of a single Bodach usually means that the impending violence is either near and certain or is remote and less probable. When they arrive in twos and threes, there is more likely a greater danger that is more immediate. When seen in packs, in Odd's experience it mean that many deaths are only days or even hours away.

#### **Rodion Romanovich**

Introducing himself as a librarian from Indianapolis, Rodion Romanovich is actually an NSA agent uncover as a guest at the monastery. One in a long line of agents sent in to keep an eye on John Heineman and his discoveries, Rodion is as much an enigma to Odd Thomas, as Odd is to Rodion. Their conversations are often verbal sparring in which Odd tries to catch Rodion in a lie about his cover story as librarian, and Rodion takes pleasure avoiding and diverting the attention from himself. Odd knows that Rodion is hiding something, and NSA agent Rodion Romanovich knows Odd has secrets as well.

Rodion came from Russia. He is a proficient baker and knowledgeable on a wide range of topics. His discussions with Odd vary in topics including everything from quantum physics to Indianapolis minutia. A mortician before he left his homeland, he claims to have been born with the talent; his job now is to determine whether or not John Heineman has indeed found a way to prove the existence of God through science. In his conversations with Odd, he tells him that his mother was an assassin, and his wife is currently aboard a space station conducting experiments of which he cannot divulge.

### **Sister Angela (Mother Superior)**

Mother Superior at the St. Bartholomew's Abbey, she is one of only three people at the Abbey who know about Odd's rather odd gifts. She claims that she and her sisters live as though from a time in the early part of the last century before the Church had lost its confidence and the Bishop's were all crazy. Though born in 1945, she feels that she would prefer to have lived in the thirty's than in this age of computers and satellites. Her eyes are the same color of blue of the periwinkles on Royal Doulton china, and she is an intelligent and engaging woman with great emotional strength and fortitude.



Accepting Odd's gifts on faith entirely, Sister Angela admires and respects the young man, who seems to want nothing for himself. By selflessly helping those around him to find peace, he earns a place on her wall of fame in the company of such greats as George Washington, Flannery O'Connor, and Harper Lee - all of whom donated their special talents and gifts selflessly, refusing compensation or adulation for their efforts.

Her courage and forthright attitude are a great comfort to Odd as he struggles with the loss of his girlfriend and soul mate, Stormy Llewellyn. Odd is surprised and touched by her display of emotion when it is time for Odd to go.

#### **Brother John Heineman**

John Heineman was a scientist of some stature when he was engaged to Jennifer Calvino when she became pregnant. Carrying the child to term, Heineman was already behaving poorly where her pregnancy was concerned, but when she gave birth to a physically-deformed boy, John wanted nothing to do with them. Denying fatherhood, he cut them out of his life and continued his scientific explorations. He became famous over the years, finally driven to the conclusion that the subatomic structure of the universe had indisputable design. He reexamined his life, gave away his entire fortune, and retreated to the monastery. He funded the facility there that cared for children such as Jacob, and for Jacob himself, but couldn't bring himself to take the final step and get to know his son.

When he finally came out of seclusion, it was to inform his colleagues that he had found a way to scientifically prove the existence of God. As such, he attracted the attentions of the NSA, who from that time forward placed an agent as a guest at the abbey. Denying he still harbored ill will towards his disabled child, John Heineman created a program that not only unleashed creations his mind consciously thought of, but simultaneously summoned up creatures with equal capacity for evil. In the end, his vanity would overcome his sanity, and much like the story of Jekyll and Hyde, he seemed to have no knowledge of what he was doing. To put a stop to it, Rodion kills Brother John.

#### **Brother Salvatore (Brother Knuckles)**

Brother Knuckles is the only one other than Father Bernard and Mother Angela who knows Odd's secret. Brother Knuckles is also the Abbey's cellarer, keeping an inventory of and purchasing the food and other material goods that the monastery and the school require. Having traded his life in New Jersey for this life at the monastery, Brother Knuckles has lost the edge of violence with which he came arrived at the Abbey. He has very strong looking hands that earned him the moniker Brother Knuckles, but assures Odd that he has never been responsible directly for the death of anyone else. Known as Salvatore Giancomo in his former life, Brother Knuckles had been muscle for the mob for many years, but when he reached forty, he began having second thoughts about the direction of his life. One night while guarding the "boss," he found himself reading a story to the boss' young daughter. The story so captured his attention that when the



child fell asleep before the end, he needed to know what happened. He bought a copy of the book and cried like a child when the moral of the story played out. Reading the story several times, he came to examine his own life more intently, finally giving him the strength to turn state's evidence against the very men for whom he used to work.

The trial complete, Salvatore was given a new name, Bob Loudermilk and relocated to Vermont, but suffered such a culture shock that he couldn't make the transition. The calling to monastic life came from an episode in a restaurant, but as a result, he pursued a path of regret that led to remorse and then finally to contrition. His new life gave him life, and he grew spiritually.

#### Boo

An entirely-white Shepherd cross, Boo belongs to and lives at the Abbey. He is one hundred and ten pounds and as graceful as he is brave. With clear blue eyes, he and Odd have bonded to a degree that he even hides in Odd's suite at times and sleeps there when he feels the need for companionship. Boo is the first and only ghost dog Odd has ever seen. Most animals leave right away, without hangups to keep them bound to earth, but for some reason Boo has remained at the Abbey for more than a year already. Odd likes to think that perhaps Boo was waiting for him, and he appreciates the dogs' company and companionship. When Odd finally leaves the Abbey, Boo and Elvis go with him.

### **Stormy Llewellyn**

Stormy was the longtime friend and girlfriend of Odd Thomas until sixteen months ago when she died. Born Bronwen Llewellyn, she preferred the name Stormy. She had Egyptian black eyes, and one of her favorite phrases with Odd was "Loop me in, Odd one," which basically meant, "tell me about your day." She had been part of the incident at the Pico Mundo mall that claimed more than 40 lives. She had been shot four times, and by the time Odd managed to return to her, she was gone. Still part of his life, he spends his days trying to live up to being a decent enough person to be worthy of the promise made to them when they first met. The gypsy woman in the machine had told them they would be together forever, and Odd needs that to be true.

#### **Brother Constantine**

The only spirit monk to inhabit the Abbey, Brother Constantine manifests himself occasionally by ringing the bells in one of the towers in frustration, or making rare appearances elsewhere in the Abbey. Unable to leave while the circumstances of his death are still so misunderstood, he remains, trying to give Odd clues as to the truth. What none of his fellow Brothers understands is that Brother Constantine did not commit suicide. He was killed by a manifestation created by John Heineman, and died because he had discovered the truth of Heineman's experiments. Having seen one of Heineman's creations, Heineman could not allowed Brother Constantine to live. His soul



remains in torment until the Brothers and Sisters finally realize the truth and are able to send his soul on to peace.

#### **Justine**

Justine is one of the girls in the school at the monastery. She has been there eight years already, and the photo of her on the desktop shows a child of real natural beauty. At the age of four, her father had killed her mother and tried to kill her as well by drowning her in the tub, but she survived. Stubbornly, she refused to submit. Clinging to life in a coma for weeks, she finally returned to a semblance of consciousness, but deprived of oxygen for so long, she would never really be the same. Outwardly, she looked like a beautiful, twelve-year-old girl. When her blue eyes were open, you could almost convince yourself that something lingered, but in all of those eight years, she hadn't made intentional eye contact, and speech was also lost, although she made occasional sounds.

### **Brother Timothy**

Loved by everyone, Brother Timothy is in charge of mechanical systems in both the school and the abbey. With an addiction to Kit Kats that borders on what he fears is gluttony, Brother Timothy hides the empty wrappers in the bottom drawer of the computer desk. He is also well known for the brightness of his blush. Neither of these things saves him as he becomes the second killing attributed to the manifestations of Brother John's. He is attacked in the courtyard and vanishes, until Odd finds him in the pipe tunnels later, but by then it is too late as he has already become a chrysalis for another one of these strange beasts.

#### **Jacob Calvino**

One of the only adult students at St. Bartholomew's Abbey, Jacob is in his mid twenties and afflicted with a disease similar to Down's Syndrome. A misshapen head and jaw, and one eye lower than the other make his face and head seem somewhat lopsided, but he lacks the flat nose usually characteristic of Down's children. He has a stocky build, a thick neck, and his left temple is convex, while his right temple is concave. His heavy shoulders hunch over one of many drawings, all of the same woman. His mother was John Heineman's fiance in the days when he was just becoming well known for his scientific mind. John, horrified that his son was disabled, renounced him, leaving his fiance to raise him alone. When Jacob's mother died when Jacob was thirteen, his father had reached a point in his scientific exploration that humbled him to such a degree that he gave away everything he owned. He also became the benefactor for St. Bartholomew's Abbey in an attempt to atone for his earlier behavior. Despite Jacob's transfer into St. Bartholomew's, Brother John avoided him, still unable to completely eradicate the depths of his inner cruelty.



Jacob draws flawless reproductions of his mother that are so infused with emotion that the love is evident in her eyes. He also draws the hooded, faceless monk that Odd keeps seeing and the bone and ice structures that he calls the dogs of the Neverwas. Unable to share in detail with Odd the things he knows, he manages to tell Odd that he had seen the Neverwas when he was a younger boy, and in those days he had a face. It is too painful to recall, however. Jacob sees into people with a sensitivity that is uncanny, and he manages to leave Odd speechless when he tells him one afternoon that he knows what Odd's girl saw in him. Odd is so touched he can't speak.

#### **Sister Miriam**

A former Los Angeles social worker, Sister Miriam had once worked with troubled girls. She lost that position when some of the parents complained about the spiritual aspect of her counseling, and she was asked to leave. She found her way to the church not long after. She has a large and imposing presence and charisma to spare. While she isn't one of the few who know the truth about Odd, she suspects that he must be at least partially Irish with the amount of blarney he spreads around.

#### **Father Bernard**

The Abbott of St. Bartholomew's Abbey and the one of three people aware of Odd's special gift, Father Bernard is a straightforward man with strong convictions. He supports the work done by Brother John Heineman, embracing the idea that science can prove the existence of God. Realizing the enormity of his error, and humbled by how blindly he followed John's pursuit, he resigns in shame and humiliation, even though his feelings about himself are not shared by the other Brothers and Sisters. He still felt unworthy and spiritually unable to lead the others.

#### **Ozzie Boone**

Odd's mentor and father figure, not to mention close friend from Pico Mundo. A mystery writer of some fame, Ozzie is the person who first encouraged Odd to keep a manuscript about his adventures in life. He is also the one Odd calls when it is finally time for Odd to go home to Pico Mundo. Driving his specially-made Cadillac, all four hundred pounds of Ozzie is happy to see Odd. Wealthy by all standards, he agrees to put together a trust fund for Flossie Bodenblatt, one of the children in the school.

#### Flossie Bodenblatt

The young girl Sister Angela found to act as a bridge between Odd and Stormy, but when Odd meets her, he finds her to be so like Stormy that he can't bring himself to use her as the bridge. She has the same dark hair and eyes as his Stormy had, and a similar character. She is forthright, despite her disabilities, and determined to improve enough to work with dogs someday. Odd asks him friend Ozzie to help make that



possible and Ozzie does so happily. Flossie doesn't like her name, preferring to be called Christmas. To her, the name Flossie sounds too much like something you do to your teeth, or a cow's name. Another reminder of Stormy, who had also changed her name.



# **Objects/Places**

#### St. Bartholomew's Abbey

Located in California and surrounded by the Sierra Nevadas, St. Bartholomew's Abbey is where Odd Thomas secrets himself. Needing to escape the responsibilities associated with his life, and the complications that seeing dead people can bring into it, Odd is staying at the Abbey as their guest. On the east side of the Abbey are the guest house cloisters, where Odd stays, and on the west side of the Abbey, which also contains the church, are the novitiates' quarters. Past those sleeping quarters, and down the sloping meadow is the St. Bartholomew's School. In the school is the convent, where the nuns who teach the students live.

#### **Guesthouse Cloister**

Located on the east side of St. Bartholomew's Abbey, the guest house cloister where Odd Thomas stays surrounds a courtyard with a marble statue of the lesser known St. Bartholomew and a reflecting pool. The pool is drained in the winter months. A colonnade leads to the receiving room of the guest house, and from there the front door of the Abbey is accessible.

Odd stays on the third floor of the cloister in one of two guest suites available. The other is empty. The walls are made of stone, and the steps to the ground floor are made of granite and alternate between black and white reminding Odd of piano keys whenever he uses them. The spiral staircase leads to the main parlor.

#### **Pico Mundo**

Pico Mundo is the desert town where Odd Thomas lived for most of his life.

#### St. Bartholomew's School

Located behind the original Abbey, St. Bartholomew's School is a school for children upon whom the rest of the world has abandoned. Not only a school, but a home for these "different" youth, St. Bartholomew's School also houses the nuns who teach and care for the children there. The school is the only building of all those belonging to the Abbey that is actually locked at night for the students' safety.

On the main floor, there are classrooms, a kitchen and dining room, and a clinic. The second floor has two short and two long hallways that together make a rectangle; these are used for the students' quarters where the students room in pairs. At the junctures, there are nurses' stations that were manned all night. So close to Christmas, the halls are decorated with garlands and tinsel.



#### **KitKat Katacombs**

St. Bartholomew's school has a computer room in the basement. It is largely the territory of Brother Timothy as he is the one in charge of all things mechanical in the Abbey and in the school. As such, he feels safe there and indulges himself in his one sin.... he is addicted to Kit Kats. As such, the computer room and more specifically the bottom drawer of the computer desk and its ever increasing store of empty wrappers have led the Brothers to refer to the area as the KitKat Katacombs.

### Whimple

The part of a nun's attire that goes around her face.

#### Lauds

Lauds is the name given to morning prayer. It is the second of seven periods that the Monks observe in the daily Divine Office. At Bartholomew's Abbey, Lauds begins immediately following Matins, which begins at five forty-five in the morning and takes about half an hour.

#### **Matins**

Reading from the saints and singing of psalms that is part of the seven periods of the daily Divine Office that the monks of St. Bartholomew's observe.

# You are destined to be together forever!

The phrase is on a framed card that sits beside the nightstand clock in Odd's room. Important to Odd because the card had been dispensed to Stormy and himself when they put a quarter into a Gypsy Woman machine after a couple before them had fed in eight quarters to get nothing but bad news. Though Stormy died, Odd takes the card to literally mean that they will be together in their next life, and to him the card is more important than air.

#### **Bell Tower**

The site where Brother Constantine was supposed to have hung himself, but where John Heineman's creation had actually killed him. Also the site of Constantine's hauntings until Odd figures out the truth after having seen the creature who killed Constantine and almost becoming a victim himself.



#### John's Mew's

The name given to John Heineman's computer room in the bowels of the monastery. Accessed only by an elevator that descends through a containment of heavy water, this area is the home and scientific base for John's super computers. It is where John believes he has found a way to prove the existence of God through science.

# **Floppy**

The name John Heineman gives to the creation he concocts for Odd and Rodion when they go down to confront him. The size of a hamster, it is similar to a cross between a rabbit and a guinea pig. Cute and cuddly, it gurgles and plays with its own feet until Odd notices that the eyes are completely soulless.

#### **Neverwas**

The name Jennifer Calvino gave to John Heineman when he rejected their deformed son Jacob. Jacob grew up knowing him as the Neverwas, and describes him that way to Odd. The Neverwas is also one of Heineman's unconscious creations appearing like a monk of days gone by, but without face or features.

# **Psychic magnetism**

The force that guides Odd through his life, pointing him in directions where he is needed. It also helps him locate people. By thinking of a specific person or thing, he can pull himself to them.



# **Themes**

## **Hiding vs Facing Responsibility**

Odd Thomas goes to the monastery after a particularly violent incident in a mall in his hometown of Pico Mundo. Among the people who died was the love of his life, Stormy Llewellyn. Feeling terrible guilt that he was unable to stop this event, he left Pico Mundo to live in a monastery in the mountains. Odd has some rather unusual gifts. He sees dead people, or more accurately, he sees those that are no longer living but haven't passed all the way on either. Something troubles them enough to cause them to linger, and when they do, they seek Odd Thomas out for guidance and assistance. Most often, he is able to figure out what keeps them bound to earth, but there are exceptions. One of those is Elvis Presley. So troubled by the kind of life he led, and his unseemly demise, he is afraid to pass on and face his mother, Gladys, and nothing Odd tells him seems to ease his mind. Another "gift" Odd has is the ability to see otherworldly creatures that he finally named "bodachs" after folklore from the British Isles. They are silent and have no more substance than shadows, gliding effortlessly or slinking like cats; they leave no trace behind them. They are unable to affect the living, but are drawn to violence and disaster. The bigger the mayhem, the more bodachs appear in advance to watch. Odd truly believed that having seen the bodachs, and having narrowed the field of disaster, he should have been able to save more people at the mall. With his spirit so low that he couldn't see any meaning to life, he retreated to the monastery to hide from the responsibility that seeing these spirits brought him.

It didn't take long to figure out that he couldn't hide from his gifts. Brother Constantine, who had supposedly committed suicide by hanging himself in the new bell tower, took to ringing the bells now and then in a state of obvious agitation. Constantine had been seen in the older buildings, but seldom; he mostly frequented the bell tower. The monastery also have a mascot named Boo. He is a white shepherd cross, who also sees both bodachs and those souls who linger. In fact, in many ways he shares the intuition that guides Odd during times when he is trying to help. What is most interesting is that by going to the monastery, Odd is able to unravel a mystery that caused the death of Brother Constantine (which enabled him to continue on to his next level of service, as Stormy would say), and helped protect the children from possible death. Odd tried to run from the life of service to the dead, only to find himself thrown into a situation that needed his special skills desperately. It sounds like just another part of his continuing destiny to me!

### **Heineman's Guilt vs Redemption**

In a monastery that was created from guilt in the hopes that it would buy him redemption, Brother John Heineman, lived out his life but never found the peace he sought. When the new addition came and the old site became the new school for disenfranchised children who had no where else to go, Brother John Heineman finds



that the source of his deepest conflict is once again before him. In yet another opportunity for Brother John's soul to find redemption, his own son Jacob, once long ago denied by Heineman, finds his way to this new school. This quirk of fate is just one more opportunity ignored by Brother John. Fate or God or Whatever controls the marvelously strange and more than just coincidental things that happen in our lives, continues to open doors for Brother John and to give him chances for the redemption his money can't buy, and yet he refuses to repent. His repulsion of the children less than perfect goes so deep that he can't overcome it to save his own soul. Sadly, five minutes with his own son Jacob would have undoubtedly fixed this problem.

Jacob's mother knew the absolute truth. She knew that inside her son was a gentle and beautiful human being with the grace of God, and she told him so. She loved him with the love of a mother, pure and absolute. She taught him lessons that he took with him when she died. The most important of those lessons was that everyone on earth had a grace, and it was our choice whether or not we used it. Grace was a gift from God, and we were meant to use it for the betterment of humankind. Despite all of his physical shortcomings, Jacob knew all this and feared nothing. He took his gifts from God and used them to better mankind. These gifts extended past his ability to draw, although he managed to put on paper a quality that made the scene or subject jump to life. Jacob spoke little, but saw everything. He has a photographic memory and a heart larger than most of humankind put together. Jacob, it turned out, was an honor to know, and once you met him, you never forgot him.

The things we struggle with most in life are put before us again and again, so that we are given a chance to overcome and excel. Is it fate? Karma? God? Regardless of the name given to the power that is at the helm, we should be astounded at the intricacies and complexities of choices we are given in a lifetime.

# Proving the existence of God vs taking it on faith that God

John Heineman forgot some basic truths when he set about to prove the existence of God through science. He believed that if he could unravel the mystery of creation, he could understand God. In his hubris, he ignores what his research shows him. He manages to create a room that magnifies his intentions many fold, creating the item in his mind as per his unspoken instructions. The Floppy he creates is at first glance, cute and cuddly. Cooing and gurgling to itself on the floor, John regards it with a mixture of awe and rapture, while ignoring the most important facet of life itself—the soul. The center of all beings. By the time John has finished his creation, he is no longer emulating God; in his mind, he is God.

Odd and Rodion see the difference almost immediately, and the once cute Floppy takes on a much more sinister appearance. Realizing that the eyes are empty, Odd equates the same problem with the small Floppy to the larger ice and bone structures. Their violent intentions can only be coming from Brother John. At this point, Brother John is still in enough control that he could have put a stop to all of it. Unfortunately, his pride is



larger than his ability to reason, and he refuses to take responsibility for the creatures that are released and killing on his behalf. Despite their previous friendship, John Heineman sends one of his less friendly creations after Odd, and Rodion realizes that he must intervene or Odd will be killed. He fires into the monk form that is throwing Odd around the room, and it temporarily dissolves, but reforms again. When he looks over to find John standing in a corner with his eyes closed, there can no longer be any doubt that he is knowingly creating these beasts. Rodion shoots John Heineman dead, killing his creations along with him.

Abbot Bernard realizes the enormity of his misjudgment after Brother John is killed and immediately resigns as Abbot of St. Bartholomew's, no longer feeling worthy of the post. The one thing he should have known from the start is that God must be taken on faith and while science can point to examples of God's existence, there is no way for science to absolutely prove the existence of God one way or another. This is knowledge that must be taken entirely on faith, but taking note of the underlying order of everything, it is less and less difficult to accept that something extraordinary must be at the helm.

#### To Serve or Not to Serve.

This is not a question in Odd's mind. While he felt the need to escape his life of service to his gift for a while, it is clear to him that there is no avoiding the responsibilities that are attached to his special abilities. Odd knows that those that seek him out need him to help them go on to the next place. He has often been inconvenienced by the visitors that come to him, and he is quite often put in harms way himself in order to help them. He faces ridicule from his peers if they find out, or just fear that he should be committed somewhere quiet, and his life is never his own. He lost his best friend and soul mate, Stormy, in an incident at the Pico Mundo mall, and through all of it, he still keeps his faith that one day they will be together as was promised in the card they got from the gypsy woman machine. It promised they would be together forever, and Odd believes that it is true. He believes that if he lives his life honoring her memory, he will see her again.

Odd could have quit. He could have ignored the things he saw and hid in plain sight. He could have just wished it all away, but that isn't the kind of man Odd Thomas is. He puts the needs of other selflessly before himself, opening his life up to any spirit who needs him. To walk away from this gift he has would be equivalent to walking away from breathing. It is so much a part of his life. Thankfully, his time with Stormy taught him that he should not begrudge his gift but rather should embrace it, saving all he can. The purity of her heart stays with him, like a guiding light he reminds himself of her when he is low in spirit. Along the way, he gathers friends that ease the travel, including some famous names such as Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra. He picks up a dog named Boo in this adventure, and finds companionship where before he was lonely. The spirit dog is another gift that Odd appreciates and will try to help move forward. There is no question —Odd will serve until his service is no longer required.



# **Style**

#### **Point of View**

Brother Odd is told from the first person perspective of Odd Thomas, the main character. Not officially a Brother, Odd is staying at a monastery, looking for a break from a life that left him temporary lifeless. Having lost his girlfriend and the love of his life, Odd has trouble finding purpose in his life. Odd Thomas lives up to his moniker. He has a peculiar ability to see the disenfranchised souls caught between this world and the next. To Odd, they are every bit as real as anyone else, even warm to the touch, but no one else can see them. Somehow, they convey to Odd what they need, and he tries to help them to carry on to the next life. To do anything less would be to do them a disservice. Some spirits don't leave as soon as others. Odd has Elvis as a companion off and on, and though the spirits can't talk, he knows that Elvis is afraid to face his mother Gladys for fear that she is disappointed in him because of his lifestyle and the way he died. Odd tells Elvis that Gladys would be so happy to see him, but still he lingers. He and Odd are friends, and he is reluctant to leave before Odd heals enough to be without him. He stays with Odd until Odd leaves the monastery, and, while at first, Elvis leaves with him, it isn't long before he smiles and fades into his own future, leaving a new friend behind in his place.

Being at the monastery doesn't change the grand design of Odd's life. In many ways, it sharpens his resolve to follow his intuition, no matter where it leads him. A straight forward read, in Odd's shoes that never gets boring. Delving into faith, religion, science and grand design, this is a read with a great deal to think about.

## Setting

Brother Odd takes place in St. Bartholomew's Abbey in the Sierra Nevadas on the Californian side of the border. The Abbey includes a church, and a school for disabled children, along with the monastery and guest house. Odd Thomas occupies a third floor suite in the guest house and has done so since a disaster in his hometown of Pico Mundo, when 41 people were shot and nineteen killed seven months earlier.

The abbey contains a super computer in its bowels, created by John Heineman in his effort to prove the existence of God. In the process, John creates blasphemous creatures that kill three monks and would have continued to do much more damage had Odd and Rodion not put a stop to it all by killing John. The abbey is remote, but John Heineman's calls to his colleagues attract the attention of the NSA. In a sudden twist, it is an NSA agent himself who ensures the destruction of the machine that Heineman created, ensuring that further use or abuse of this program will not happen.

In the hills of the Sierra Nevada, Odd sees snow for the very first time and is overwhelmed by the beauty of it; though, at first, he is less than charmed with it when



he finds himself outside weathering the elements. While the story remains on the grounds of the Abbey, there are many references to Pico Mundo, and in the end, Odd comes to realize that it is time to go home.

### Language and Meaning

Written in plain English, Brother Odd is a charming mixture of belief, faith and science. A story about finding God in many different ways, Odd Thomas opens us up to a world most of us never give a thought to. Living his life in service to his gifts, Odd is not unlike the Brothers and Sisters he fled to after Stormy was killed. While looking for meaning in his life, and finding little, Odd thinks he is hiding from his responsibilities. In actuality, his gift led him to the abbey.

John Heineman is at the abbey, searching for scientific proof of God. While experimenting, he discovers the underlying order in chaos and believes he can bridge the gap between humans and Gods. He tries to convince Odd and Rodion that what he can do with his creation of the Floppy is not unlike the way God created man and everything else we know. Appalled and frightened by the degree of hubris displayed by Brother John, Odd and Rodion try to explain the difference to him, but John's pride won't allow him to admit he's crossed a line.

There is some scientific explanations where quantum physics is concerned, allowing the reader to conclude that Brother John's experiments have some validity. There is some discussion about how an experiment on a subatomic scale will be altered by the simple act of our observations. Brother John's experiments led him to conclude that God imagined and the world became, and because we have the same imagination and will, we are capable of the same on a smaller scale of course. Divine thought is explained as a form of energy that can shape itself into matter. Brother John discovers that under the final layer of apparent chaos, there is a strange order that is characteristic of thought waves.

A compelling read that liberally mixes the subjects of religion and science.

#### **Structure**

Written in fifty-six chapters, Brother Odd begins by retreating to the abbey to find peace after a traumatic experience in his hometown of Pico Mundo. Feeling as though he has no purpose in life, he sought reflection and contemplation with the Brothers and Sisters of St. Bartholomew's. As a guest of the abbey with special talents, Odd is given a universal key that opens all doors. It is the hope of the Abbot and the Mother Superior that Odd can help one of their own, Brother Constantine, find his way to the afterlife in peace.

Throughout his stay, Odd makes connections with several people that will stay with him forever. Sister Angela, who is the Mother Superior at the abbey, warms to Odd in a way that touches him deeply, even kissing him goodbye on the cheek when he leaves. He is



also reminded by Jacob that Stormy saw something worthwhile in Odd, and while Odd may not see it, Jacob does. What few words Jacobs speaks leaves Odd speechless with love for Jacob. When the story unravels, Odd realizes that it is time for him to go home. Brother Constantine has left the abbey and gone to his reward, and Odd takes the only two remaining spirits, Elvis and Boo, with him when he goes.

With Odd, the adventure of his life is never ending though, and his call to duty comes just as he gets to the bottom of the mountains. Though sad to leave his friend behind, Odd begins yet another adventure, following the psychic magnetism that pulls him from one place to another.
