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Plot Summary

"The Battle of The Labyrinth" by Rick Riordan is the fourth story in the series revolving around the demigod, Percy Jackson. When the story begins, Percy is a 14-year-old who is ready to begin a school year at a new school. He is on his orientation tour when disaster strikes and monsters attack. This is the beginning of a summer during which Percy has to head down into the Labyrinth with some of his closest friends in order to save the world.

After his orientation, Percy heads to Camp Half-Blood where he learns about the Labyrinth. The maze was designed by Daedalus and according to Greek mythology, is part of King Minos' palace in Crete. Annabeth is intrigued by the Labyrinth and discovers that she is about to lead a quest and it involves passage through the Labyrinth.

Percy discovers that Luke is on his own quest for revenge and plans to use the Labyrinth to enter the heart of camp to destroy it. He finds an entrance with Annabeth to the Labyrinth and descend into it so they can stop Luke and his army. He makes the difficult decision and leaves.

Even though it's Annabeth's quest, the answer to getting through the Labyrinth lies in Percy. He realizes that they have to enlist the help of a mortal named Rachel. She has the unique ability to see through the Mist. While others struggle to choose between paths in the Labyrinth, she can see the correct route clearly. They eventually reach Daedalus, but he is hesitant to help them.

Grover is on his own quest. He has to find Pan and prove his existence or he will lose his job. While in the Labyrinth, the friends find Pan who is about to cease his existence. He breathes part of himself into each of the members present in the room, except for Nico, who is the son of Hades.

Luke finds Adriane's string, which leads his army out of the Labyrinth into Camp Half-Blood. A fierce battle ensues. Grover bellows, and the sound scares the enemy away. This sound came from the part of Pan that now lived within him. When the battle is over, Daedalus lets himself die, therefore closing down the Labyrinth forever.

They begin fighting and Tammi disintegrates during the battle. Kelli, the other monster, is older and more powerful. They hear people coming and she makes it look as if Percy is beating up on her. She sets the room on fire and it appears as if Percy started the fire. He runs out of the building and meets up with Annabeth who is waiting. Rachel runs out to join them. She gives Percy her phone number before leaving. Percy tells Annabeth that they need to head for Camp Half-Blood immediately.

Percy and Annabeth take a taxi ride to Long Island where they are going to camp. She is angry and he tries to talk with her by asking about some of their friends and acquaintances. Percy calls his mother to tell her about his morning even though it is not very safe for him to be using a cell phone. It feels good to be back at camp, but something feels wrong - as if there is tension in the air.

Percy greets some of his old friends, then he walks to the campus theatre. There he sees the largest hellhound he has ever seen. He goes to attack it and he is blocked. He is told that she is harmless and her name is Mrs. O'Leary. She is the pet of the new swordsman, Quintus.

Chevron comes to Percy and together they go to the woods to attend Grover's formal hearing. Grover claims to have heard the wild god Pan speak and they do not believe



him. They tell him that he has one more week to prove the existence of the god, but if he does not find Pan, he will lose his searchers license. The Council is adjourned. Now everyone has to go back to their cabins for inspection.

Percy is concerned about inspection. He has left his cabin a disaster. He hurries to his cabin and finds his half-brother there and the cabin is immaculate. Together they go to the forge and then they spend some time at the canoe lake with Annabeth. Tyson, Percy's brother, is scared of Grover because of his hooves and horns.

The brothers go to the sword arena where they fight Quintus, who is a good teacher. He has a strange mark on his neck and Percy asks him about it. The question makes Quintus lose his rhythm. He tells Percy that it is a reminder.

At the dining pavilion, a big crack reminds Percy of Nico di Angel, a kid who believes that Percy killed his sister. He is the son of Hades and the crack comes when skeletons attack Percy. Percy tells Tyson that the fact that Nico is the son of Hades is a secret noone could know.

That night Percy has a hard time sleeping. He receives an Iris message showing him Nico talking with a ghost. They are talking about exchanging souls so Nico can get his sister back. Percy knows Nico will now come hunting for him.

After this, everyone is excited. A monster has been spotted at the borders of the camp. There are rumors that Luke and his army of monsters are going to invade the camp, most likely that summer. Chapters 1-4 Analysis

Camp is a familiar place for Percy, and it makes him feel comfortable. It also brings back many memories, some good and some bad. As Percy greets others from the camp, the reader quickly understands who his closest friends are, and who he is wary of. On page 27, Percy says he thinks he knows the forest pretty well but now they were



going a way he didn't recognize. This foreshadows that there are many things in his world that he doesn't fully comprehend yet.

As Percy makes his way to his cabin, the reader understands that he has a very close relationship with his half-brother. They spend time together, and out fighting in the sword arena where Percy bluntly asked the instructor what the mark on his neck is. It makes the instructor lose his rhythm, and he evades the question. This demonstrates that there might be more to him than is immediately obvious.

That night, Percy has a vision. There will be many dreams and visions that help Percy on their quest, and the first one occurs in this chapter. Percy is well acquainted with the dreams, and he always shows respect for the messenger. He also takes the dreams seriously.

When a monster is discovered around the camp, everyone is excited. This shows that the campers are unusual. Instead of reacting with fear, they react with excitement. They are aware of the fact that Luke and his army of monsters were planning to invade the camp and instead of running, they just train harder.

Annabeth breaks the rules in the dining hall by joining Percy's table. This shows that she feels that her message is worth the risk of getting in trouble. She talks to him about the Labyrinth, which is something that she has studied for a while. She sees how it will help them. They realize they have to go on a quest, and they embrace the adventure with an awareness of its seriousness, but without fear. The only one who really has an issue with it is Grover, who really dreads going underground. However, he feels the quest is worthy enough that he will go, and his friends support and encourage him.

After dinner, the campers are sent out to fight some monsters. Percy is teamed up with Annabeth, and it shows that they are not only good friends, but they really know how to work together. Chapters 5-8 Summary

The once-powerful being is a sniveling, terrified mess. They try to rescue him, but he is too afraid to leave. Percy made a bet with him, and he lost so he has to go with them. They ran from the monster, who is now chasing them then split up so Tyson would fight her off while the others opened the entrance to the Labyrinth. The wall closes behind them as Tyson catches up with them, blocking Kampe out.

They land in a room of waterfalls, and Briares says his brothers have faded. Percy didn't know that immortality sometimes has limits. Briares splits off from them. Percy asks him to help them, but he refuses. As they planned to move on Annabeth admitted that she is



confused and doesn't know where to go in the maze. Percy tried to get her to share the last line of the prophecy, but she wouldn't.

When he sleeps that night, Percy once again dreams about Daedalus. He sees the wings that man needs for his son and for himself that they could be. Soldiers came into the room, and the old man and the boys quickly put on the wings and escape. They are at the Triple G Ranch, and the boss has three bodies. Nico is there, too. Geryon, the three-bodied man, will not let him kill Percy and insists on giving the travelers a tour of his ranch. He shows off his flesh-eating horses that live in unsanitary, disgusting conditions.

Nico talks with Geryon, reminding him that he is after a soul. Percy comments that he thinks Nico is after his soul. He finds out that the ghost helping Nico is Minos, the evil king.

Percy makes a deal with Geryon. If he cleans the stables, Geyron will let them all go, including Nico. Geyron tells him he will have to do it by sunset or all of them will belong to him.

Chapters 5-8 Analysis

Now, as the friends descend into it as they start their quest, they experience the dangers firsthand. They walk by skeletons and have to make choices regarding the directions that they should take. They come across various gods, all out to serve themselves. The gods are deceivingly beautiful and powerful.



The world of the Labyrinth is intertwined with the mortal world the reader knows. The friends wind up in Alcatraz, but it contains monsters, and the monsters are terrifying. In fact, they are so terrifying that they have taken creatures that had been strong in the past and reduced them to quivering messes. Using their brains and their powers, the small team rescues one of the prisoners from the ancient monster, and they all escape. As the chapter closes, Percy comments that he was glad to be back in the Labyrinth. This is the first time the Labyrinth is know for a redemptive quality.

Chapter 8

In this chapter, Percy learns that immortality doesn't necessarily mean forever. Sometimes a god will just fade away. Although the concept arises in relation to Briares and his family, the reader might realizes that it might also refer to Pan. If a god is fading, others won't be able to find him or her.

Later, as Percy and Annabeth talk, they discuss previous adventures. It once again demonstrates how close they are to each other, but it's still not close enough for Annabeth to share the rest of the prophecy with him.

When they get to the ranch, the friends find more trouble. Once again they meet a god who could help them, but he only wants to benefit from them. Percy shows courage as tries to bargain with Geryon.

As they talk, Quintus reveals to Percy that he is Daedalus. It is his form as an automaton - a new body. He is called Quintus because this is his fifth body. He has gone to the camp to see if it is worth saving. Mrs. O' Leary bounds into the room greeting Percy and Daedalus.

Summary And Analysis For Chapters 13-16 Analysis

The campers are struggling as they try to come to terms with Percy's death when he walks into Camp Half-Blood. They are overjoyed to see him - a bit of brightness in an ever-darkening world. They immediately get back to the quest and Percy shares what he has figured out. Annabeth has some troubles with the way things are going. She is already a bit jealous of Rachel, and she is the leader of the quest. She has to come to terms with her jealously and with the idea that being a leader of a team means doesn't mean that you always have the answers.

Rachel is friends with Percy and she knew about the monsters, but the reality of Percy's world didn't really hit her until she enters the Labyrinth. Annabeth is jealous of her, but she does not rebel or split off. Percy is right, they really do need Rachel whose contribution to the quest was sharing her knack to clearly see which path they should take. Even though they took the right path, they still have to face obstacles and challenges. They work together, calling on each other's unique strengths, to overcome these challenges.

The story takes a twist as they find Daedalus and they found out that Luke has already been there. Daedalus has now been portrayed as good and bad. He chooses to help them only after he is betrayed once again.

The story picks up pace, setting up for a climax. Percy witnesses the final act of evil arising, and has a chance to kill the rising Kronos, but hesitates too long when he realizes that Kronos looks like his former friend. Even though he knows Luke is evil and he is concerned about how Annabeth would react when facing Luke, he, himself cannot kill the being that looks like Luke.

Grover starts directing the satyrs, coming into his own. Everyone begins finding a place to move on with life. The rest of the summer is very normal at camp. Before he leaves camp, Annabeth tells him the last line of the prophecy. Back at the apartment in the city, Percy's mother throws him a party. Paul is there and asks Percy if he would mind if he asks Percy's mom to marry him. Percy thinks that it is a great idea.

Poseidon shows up and he and Percy go off to talk together. They discuss the summer and Poseidon says that there is trouble in the waters. He gave Percy a sand dollar as a present. That evening Nico shows up and Percy invites him for cake and to talk.

This chapter is the proverbial calm before the storm. The friends all reunite and together they find Pan who instills some of his power in each of them, except for Nicos, who is part of death by birth. As foreshadowed before with Briares and his brothers, gods can fade, and this is what Pan does.

The invasion occurs. It's brutal and the enemy is driven away by a surprise element. The gentle, scared Grover bellows so loudly that it scares away the enemy. He is changed and now carries on the power of his hero, the faded Pan. Daedalus decides that his time is finished, and he leaves his only beloved possession, Mrs. O' Leary, to Percy. He dies and the Labyrinth is destroyed.

The Council argues over Grover, but he doesn't really care anymore. He is moving on with his own life, as are the others. Annabeth finally shares the rest of the prophecy with Percy.

Percy's birthday sums up the story. His father arrives and they discuss all that happened, and Poseidon gives him information that lets the reader know that Percy's story isn't over yet. As the book ends, Nico shows up and Percy invites him in. The animosity is gone and the reader knows they might be teaming up in the future.



Characters

Percy Jackson

Percy is the main character in this book. When the book opens, he is 14 years old. He is a demigod, the son of Poseidon. With ADHD and dyslexia, Percy has a hard time in school. He isn't used to popularity, but he does have some close friends, which include the daughter of Athena and a satyr. He is romantically drawn to Annabelle, but he doesn't discuss it. The two of them are best friends. He is very loyal to his friends, and regularly puts his life on the line to help them out in tough situations. When Percy fights, he draws on the power of water to help him. He also uses his wits. Sleep is frequently elusive for Percy. He has visions and dreams that offer him insight into history as well as the goings-on in the Underworld. Percy takes these dreams and visions seriously.

Daedalus

Daedalus is a very old man who is a brilliant inventor. He designed the Labyrinth and it is connected to his life force. The man once had a son, whom he adored, but the son flew too close to the son while wearing wings that Daedalus made. The wax that held the feathers together melted and the boy plunged into the water. Later, Daedalus had a nephew who was as smarter, and perhaps smarter than he. He set it up so the boy fell to his death. Now Daedalus is cursed. He takes on new bodies, and in his fifth body, known as Quintus, he becomes the sword instructor at Camp Half-Blood. His body has a mark on it - a reminder that he murdered the boy. Luke and the others look for Daedalus to discover how to navigate the Labyrinth. As the creator, he is the only one who knows all the ins-and-outs of the maze.

Annabeth Chase

This character is the daughter of Athena. She is Percy's best friend and she is known for her intelligence. In this book, she leads the quest.

Grover Underwood

This character is a satyr and he is Percy's best male friend. He is going to lose his searcher's license if he doesn't find Pan.

Rachel Elizabeth Dare

This character can see through the Mist. She is a mortal who leads the others through the Labyrinth.



Lukke Castellan

Once a friend of Annabeth and Percy, this character is the son of Hermes. He gave his body to Kronos.

Chiron

This character is the son of Kronos. He is the activities director at Camp Half-Blood.

Nico di Angelo

This character is Bianca's little brother. He is the son of Hades and blames Percy for the death of his sister.

Telekhines

These characters are sea demons with dog faces. They built weapons in the forge for the evil ones.

Tyson

This character is Percy's half-brother. He goes with Grover to find Pan.

Mrs. O'Leary

This is the pet hellhound of Daedalus/Quintus. She has a great fondness for Percy and saves his life in the arena.

Geryon

This grandson of Medusa has three bodies. He cons Percy and tries to back out on an agreement. He owns the flesh-eating horses.

King Minos

This character imprisoned Daedalus in the maze. He is the king of Crete.

Kelli

This character is a monster with dark curly hair like Medusa's. She impersonates a cheerleader, but she is actually an empousai.



Paul Blofis

This character is Sally's new boyfriend and soon-to-be husband. He helps Percy get into a good school.

Biana di Angelo

This character is Nico's sister. She died in the last book and does not want her brother to seek revenge.

Poseidon

This character is the god of the sea. He is Percy's father.

Perdix

This character was Daedalus's young, very intelligent nephew. He was killed by his uncle.

Calypso

This character who was punished by the gods and had to spend her eternity in paradise, alone. She is the daughter of Atlas.

Sally Jackson

This character is Percy's mother.

Juniper

This character is a tree nymph who is also Grover's girlfriend.

Kronos

This character was an evil leader who was rising up again.

Janus

This character is the two-faced god of doorways - beginnings, endings and choices.



Hera

This character is the Queen of Heaven. She is a very motherly figure.

Icarus

He was the son of Daedalus who flew too close to the son as they were escaping.

Hephaestus

This son of Zeus and Hera served as the blacksmith of the gods. He told the teens how to get to Daedalus after they found some information for him.

Themes

Understanding Interconnections in Greek Mythology

This book would be an average fantasy adventure novel if it didn't carry the theme of Greek mythology. Percy cannot live a "normal" life because he is a demigod. His father is Poseidon, god of the sea. As the reader discovers, a simple orientation day at the school can turn into disaster when monsters attack. Fortunately, Percy can counterattack using his own special weapon. He attends a camp where other teens like himself work together. They each have their own unique power. Since gods are always fighting for power, the world (not to mention the Underworld) is never a restful place. Stories from the past intertwine with offenses of the present, wreaking more havoc. The gods are selfish creatures and even the good ones are out to benefit themselves.

As the teens go on their quest, they pool together their resources to understand the Labyrinth and the way it works. Annabeth has studied it in great detail, but as she points out, it constantly evolves. Along the way, the teens encounter mythical creatures they have only heard about in their own mythology lessons. They learn the truth about immortality and the different sides of good and evil. Since the mythological world is ever-changing, it's difficult to know who to trust. This is shown as Luke turns evil, yet Annabeth still feels that there is good in him. It is also shown in Percy's doubts about Quintus. He is hesitant to use the whistle Quintus gave him even when he is in dire need of aid.

The Struggle Between Good and Evil

Percy is a demigod with a history of trying to help others and save the world. This continues in book four of this series. When monsters attack Percy in Manhattan, he realizes that something is seriously wrong in the Underworld. He goes out to Camp Half-Blood on Long Island and discovers that Luke has planned to use the Labyrinth to access the camp. When Luke gets into the camp, he and his army are set up to attack and destroy the demigods then move on to battle Olympus. They have plans to take over the world. It's up to Percy and his friends to stop them. This is not easy, however, when others are out to kill them. For example, Nicos wants revenge for his sister's death, and he blames Percy. While Percy is trying to get to the heart of the Labyrinth to enlist the help of Daedalus, he also has to evade Nicos.

Knowing the difference between good and evil isn't always easy as Percy find out. Some seemingly good gods and demigods become evil, while others that Percy suspected were evil end out helping Percy and his friends. Some of the characters in the book don't know which side they want to support. They are neither good nor evil. For example, Daedalus helped Luke find the string he was looking for, but when he discovered that he was betrayed by the monsters, he turned around and began to help



Percy. One would like to think that good easily overcomes evil and continues to grow stronger. In this book, evil is very powerful. However, the good does ultimately win out.

The Choices One Makes And The Repercussions

Choices are a pivotal theme in the story. Right from the beginning of the book, Percy understands that evil is invading. He makes the choice to put his own life at risk to combat the evil. Along the way, he has to decide who to trust. When they are down in the Labyrinth, the teams have to make many choices regarding their path. Sometimes they go a certain way based on previous knowledge and studies of mythology. Other times, they make choices based solely on the fact that they hear something coming after them from another direction. They have to choose whether or not they want to help individuals they come across or whether they are going to hide from them or leave them to suffer.

Annabeth is the leader of the quest and Percy realizes that a mortal is the key to helping them find their way through the Labyrinth. Annabeth has to make a choice as to whether or not the girl joins the team. She isn't happy about it, but she makes the choice to benefit them all, letting Rachel join them. When Percy has a near-death experience, he finds himself on an island with Calypso. He has a choice of spending eternity in paradise with a beautiful woman or going back to fight against the evil, helping his friends. Even though the decision is difficult, he chooses to go back. Daedalus has been fighting to survive for a very long time, but in the end, he chooses to end his own life, thereby ensuring the destruction of the Labyrinth.



Style

Point of View

""The Battle of The Labyrinth" by Rick Riordan is told in the first person point of view of Percy Jackson. The tone is objective. Percy is the main character, and his feelings, thoughts, dreams, and experiences are revealed to the reader. The narrator remains omniscient and never intrudes by directing actions or warning the main character of danger. The narrator just relays events and gives the reader insight into the emotions, responses and feelings of Percy Jackson. The other characters and their reactions are shown objectively and the reader never gets to identify with their inner thoughts unless the thoughts are revealed through action or dialogue.

Setting

The setting of "The Battle of The Labyrinth" by Rick Riordan is critical enough to become part of the title. When the story opens, Percy is in New York City, an area that most readers can identify with because they have seen pictures of the city in magazines, on the Internet, or in the movies. The story moves on to Camp Half-Blood, which readers will recognize from previous books in the series. This camp is a special place for those who are not mortal. This is important because it is a gathering place for mythical creatures ranging from Cyclops to satyrs and dryads.

This magical setting is the place where the reader first encounters the Labyrinth before finding out that there are entrances to the Labyrinth throughout the world. The Labyrinth itself is an ever-evolving maze filled with hazards. The rules are constantly changing within the Labyrinth and it even has its own manner of handling time. The final battle of the book takes place back up on earth in the camp of the demigods. The book itself ends back in New York City, having come full circle in reality and mythology.

Language and Meaning

This book is written for a young adult and the language and meaning in the book reflect this. Although it is mostly filled with adventure, there is a little bit of romance thrown in. The author really knows his mythology and this comes through not only in the description of the multitude of characters within the book but also in the relationships and stories relating to the characters. Even if this is the first book of the series that a reader has ever read, it easy to understand what is happening in the story and how the gods are interrelated because the author explains the different scenarios and histories through natural dialogue. When new characters are introduced, someone will comment on the god or goddess who was that character's parent. If a curse is put on a character, the character comes out and explains what the curse is and why they were given the curse. The author plays around with mythology a bit. For instance, when the Sphinx



begins to ask questions rather than offering riddles, Annabeth points out that according to its true mythological role, it should be offering riddles to be solved.

Structure

"The Battle of The Labyrinth" by Rick Riordan opens with a Table of Contents, which shows that there are 20 chapters in the book. Each chapter has its own title, and the title summarizes the main event within the chapter. The chapters ranged between 10 and 27 pages. At the end of the book, there is a teaser chapter for a new novel by Rick Riordan entitled "The Red Pyramid."
