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Plot Summary

How to Deal by Sarah Dessen is a compilation of two of her previous works - Someone Like You and That Summer. Each story is written from the perspective of a girl in her teens who has to come to grips with emotional and familial trauma. In each case, the young lady in question manages to overcome the emotional issues she is facing, generally gaining some insight about themselves in the process.

In Someone Like You, the main character, Halley, is called back from summer camp to be with her best friend Scarlett after an accident claims the life of her boyfriend. At Scarlett's house, Halley meets her alternate in Michael's life, Macon, and can hardly believe it when he shows an interest in her. As his interest deepens, and they spend more and more time together, Macon becomes increasingly obsessed with having sex with her. Halley puts him off again and again until she realizes that if she doesn't give herself to him - something he assures her is no big deal - she will lose him. She decides that New Year's is the right time, and goes to a party with Macon. He takes her upstairs to a room that is dirty, and so recently occupied by another couple that they haven't vacated yet. Leaving her there, she drinks more, and by the time he returns, she feels ill and wants to go home. Angry, he drives her back and gets them into an accident. Halley soon finds her self worth, and realizes that pressure from a boy should never be the reason that she gives up her virginity.

That Summer provides a similar scenario in which Haven is struggling to find herself. She is the youngest of a family that is changing. Her father has left to remarry a younger woman, her sister is days from her own wedding, and her mother is contemplating selling their home. All of these things come to head and Haven loses her composure. She blames her sister Ashley for being the catalyst to all the change. In Haven's mind, when Ashley said goodbye to Sumner, she began the series of events that led to the downfall of her family and their happiness. When Ashley finally reveals the real reason she left Sumner, Haven sees a new side of her sister. Ashley tells her a universal truth. The first boy is the one that hurts the worst. Haven realizes that her sister will always be her sister, though men in their lives may come and go, and that knowledge is comforting.

By November Grandma Halley's health takes a noticeable downturn. Halley often thinks of the grandmother she was named after, remembering the time they sat together watching as the comet that bears their name passed overhead. Halley had always felt as though there was a little magic attached to both her and her grandmother's names. Grandma Halley is slowly losing her grasp on memory, balance and events. While Halley is busy with Scarlett, the baby bible, and seeing Macon whenever the opportunity arises, her mother works towards finding a home for Grandma Halley. Marion continues to date Steve, and Scarlett insists that his natural character is beginning to reveal itself. A new student, Cameron Newton, joins their school and while Halley is at the doctor's one morning, Scarlett makes friends with him. She tries to dissuade Halley, but Halley is determined, and her mother finally relents.

Halley is about an inch and three quarters taller than her best friend Scarlett. She has long hair, and thick eyelashes and eyebrows. He picks her up a block away as usual, and takes her to a party, but the night doesn't go the way he hopes it will. Halley drinks too much, and by the time he returns to her, having left her in a bedroom upstairs, she is feeling sick. She tries to excuse herself, but Macon becomes angry. He takes her home and is so angry that on the way he gets them into an accident. It is the wake up call that has Halley splitting up with him. Macon is sorry and apologetic, but Halley doesn't yield. Macon skips more and more classes, and finally dates Elizabeth Gunderson.

Mr. Averby (Someone Like You)

Mr. Averby is Halley and Scarlett's boss at Milton's Market.

Julie Cooke (Someone Like You)

Halley's mother, Julie Cooke, is a therapist by trade, and specializes in adolescent behavior. She has written two books on the subject, conducted many seminars and



appeared on local talk shows. Despite her education and background, she still has difficulty dealing with her own daughter.

Mr. Kramer (Someone Like You)

Halley's family's neighbor in Lakeview, Mr. Kramer does not appreciate the new airport and the constant plane traffic that has resulted, claiming it has given him high blood pressure. He is even less impressed when Halley begins dating Macon, and Macon begins his habit of honking his horn to get Halley's attention, leaving rubber on the pavement when he leaves, or just idling outside at the stop sign for extended periods.

Ruth (Someone Like You)

Director of Sisterhood Camp, Ruth is the one who allows Scarlett to talk to Halley at midnight when she calls to deliver the news that Michael Sherwood is dead. Impatient at first, her attitude soon changes to concern when she overhears that someone has actually died. She has short hair and wears Birkenstocks.

Marion Thomas (Someone Like You)

Scarlett's mother, Marion Thomas, works at the Fabulous You in the Lakeview Mall. She spends forty hours a week helping people get dressed up fancy and then takes their pictures as they sit, wearing way too much makeup and holding an empty champagne glass. The pictures are supposed to be the kind of come hither photo that you would give to a boyfriend or husband. It is a difficult job. Marion has bleached blond hair that she maintains monthly, and the same green eyes as her daughter. She reminds Halley of a living, real life Barbie.

Elizabeth Gunderson (Someone Like You)

Elizabeth dated Michael before he started seeing Scarlett, and takes the news of his death hard. She goes from sobbing theatrically at the funeral to quitting her position as head cheerleader and slumming. Now, she is dating someone who is the lead singer of a college band, and wearing clothes that intentionally make her look morbid and morose and most of her friends are still following suit. She wears jeans that are ripped intentionally, and styles her hair to look stringy on purpose, having gone from the homecoming queen to chain smoking.

Grandma Halley (Someone Like You)

Born in May of 1910, her father had been watching the comet pass overhead as his wife had given birth to Grandma Halley, and thought the name appropriate. Grandma Halley suffers from Alzheimer's and is deteriorating. A phone call reveals that she has fallen



and lay unable to help herself for some time before she was discovered. Soon after, she is placed in a home.

Dr. Roberts (Someone Like You)

Scarlett's maternity doctor is Dr. Roberts.

Grace Halley Thomas (Someone Like You)

Grace Halley Thomas is the name that Scarlett gives to the daughter she has as a result of her relationship with Michael.

Haven McPhail (That Summer)

Haven is five feet eleven inches tall, and despite her prayers, the growth shows no signs of letting up. Haven takes after her father, a calm and balancing force while her sister Ashley is more emotional, like their mother. Haven is struggling with the changes that are occurring in her life. The events lay themselves out like toy soldiers, and every time she thinks it all the way through, she comes to one inescapable fact. The changes all began when Ashley first said goodbye to Sumner, breaking up with him on Halloween. Since then, she had met and become engaged to Lewis, her father and mother had separated and divorced, her father was engaged to be remarried, and her mother began talking about selling the house and moving them into an apartment. Slowly but surely. Haven's life comes unraveled, and her along with it. Although Haven has always been the type to go along and get along rather than make waves, this too changes. She becomes more and more frustrated, and then angry with the changes in life, changing from the quiet and reserved young woman who wished she could shrink a foot to a more forceful, and outgoing type of person. Everything comes to a head the day before her sister's wedding when Halley loses her composure at work. She is dealing with a particularly difficult woman who can't get what she wants and throws a shoe in Halley's general direction, hitting her in the head. Halley storms after her, and returns the favor before simply leaving the mall. In that instant, she grows into herself a little bit. When she returns home, her mother tries to talk to her, but Haven retreats to her room and sleeps. When she wakes, Ashley tries to talk to her, but Halley tells her to shut up and walks out - a first that leaves her sister speechless. Her father is supposed to pick her up afterward, but when he arrives, Halley refuses to go out to where he waits, honking his horn. Stubborn as she is, he waits for a while before leaving her behind without so much as coming to the door.

Halley's anger stems from her sister's break up with Sumner. What she doesn't know is that Sumner cheated on her which is what caused the breakup. It also broke her sister's heart. When she learns this, her bond with her sister returns. She realizes that her sister understands most of what she wants her to, and loves her.



Ashley McPhail (That Summer)

Ashley and her mother share a flair for the stage that Haven doesn't have. She is twenty-one years old and stands five foot four inches tall. She has a figure that most women wish they'd been born with and hair that always seems to look perfect. Tiny feet and a small frame combined with inner strength make Ashley a package to be reckoned with. As a varsity cheerleader, Ashley had always taken her place at the top of the pyramid. She had dated and later split up with the football team's captain and always seemed to live a lifestyle that came straight out of a Barbie magazine. Ashley has a butterfly tattoo on the inside of her left ankle - a remnant of a wilder youth that she left behind when she became engaged to Lewis Warsher.

Ashley sells Vive cosmetics at Dillard's department store. She thrives in the glamour market and Halley loves it when her sister helps her to 'get ready'. Ashley and Halley's relationship becomes strained when life altering changes occur and Halley blames her sister's break up with Sumner, believing it to be the catalyst that changed everything else. Ashley finally has an opportunity to explain the truth to her sister, and mend the rift that has steadily grown between them.

Ashley's wedding is beautiful, and when she comes up the aisle to see Halley with tears streaming down her face, she hugs her sister fiercely, and whispers that she loves her.

Mac McPhail (That Summer)

Haven's father, Mac marries Lorna Queen - another employee of WTSB's Channel 5 team. Mac is the sports anchor and shares the news desk with Lorna. He is a beer drinking teller of stories and tall tales who came home one day and simply announced that he had fallen for the 'Weather Pet' and broke his wife's heart. Mac is a larger than life kind of character. When he starts dating Lorna, he begins the transformation into a younger looking man to match his younger looking 'trophy' wife. He begins hair implants to replace the hair loss at the top of his head, and a short month after the wedding, Lorna announces on television that they are expecting.

Lorna Queen-McPhail (That Summer)

Haven's father marries Lorna Queen of Lorna Queen's Weather Scene on WTSB News Channel 5, much to Haven's and Ashley's disappointment. Although the girls reveal nothing, neither is thrilled with the fact that he hurt their mother to the degree that he did. Lorna is a meteorologist - blond and almost too cheerful in a pastel suit. She is Mac's trophy wife, and a month after they are married, she announces she is pregnant.



Sumner Lee (That Summer)

Sumner had met Ashley at the beginning of tenth grade, just before Haven turned ten. Sumner is slim, has bright blue eyes and curly, black hair. He speaks with an Alabama accent, and likes to wear beat up high top Converse sneakers that make noise when he walks. He has a terrific sense of humor and seems to lead a charmed life. Sumner is the only one who ever brought out Ashley's fun side, and had shown her how to enjoy all aspects of her life. When they had been together she was always smiling.

Lewis Warsher (That Summer)

Ashley's fiance, Lewis is a neat dresser, who still manages to make Ashley swoon whenever she sees him. Lewis and Ashley are to be married on August nineteenth.

Casey Melvin (That Summer)

Casey is Haven's best friend. She is gone for most of the summer at 4-H camp, and while there, discovers how much she likes boys. One in particular, Rick, is her new boyfriend who lives in Hershey, Pennsylvania. She already has plans to go there for Thanksgiving to see him.

Casey is a redhead who has the kind of hair that could be described as pumpkin in color, and it is offset by a million freckles.

Charlie Baker (That Summer)

Charlies Baker is a news anchor for WTSB's Channel 5.

Tess Phillips (That Summer)

Tess Phillips is a news anchor for WTSB's Channel 5.

Carol Cliffordson (That Summer)

Carol is a twenty-one year old distant cousin who lives in Akron, Ohio. When she and Ashley had both been twelve years old, Carol's parents divorced and Carol had come to spend a week with Ashley and her family, creating a bond that Ashley remembers when it comes to planning her wedding. The first problem reveals itself with the choice of dresses which Carol doesn't like.



Gwendolyn Rogers (That Summer)

Gwendolyn is a small town girl who makes it big in the modeling industry. She is tall and beautiful, and went to Newport High just like Haven and Casey had. Gwendolyn manages to become a local celebrity. She travels to Milan, L.A. and even New York, doing covers like Vogue with advice on makeup and seasonal fashions.

Gwendolyn has a nervous breakdown and returns home after being badly hurt by a photographer she had been seeing. She had intended to marry him, but caught him in bed with a sixteen year old girl. Avoiding everyone now, she wanders the streets at night, suffering from insomnia, and keeps to herself. When asked to introduce this year's fashion show, she does so, but the photographs taken at the end push her over the edge and her mother has to rescue her from the stage where she crumples.

Haven runs into Gwendolyn on the path on the rainy night before her sister's wedding and for a brief time, shares an understanding into Gwendolyn's mindset.

Lydia Catrell

Lydia is a widow who moves in next door to Haven, Ashley and their mother. She has frosted hair, and wears bright short sets and sandals. Her lifestyle is equally colorful, and she soon brings Haven's mother out of her shell. Within a month, she is going out every Thursday night to Ranzino's at the Holiday Inn to listen to music and go dancing. Lydia also belongs to a travel club and talks Haven's mother into going with her, first to Las Vegas, and then to Europe.

Lydia has had and raised four daughters and her experience in weddings gives her the position of wedding planner for Ashley's wedding.



Objects/Places

Camp Believe (Sisterhood Camp)

Camp Believe (Sisterhood Camp) is an isolated camp where girls are supposed to be able to improve themselves as women. Afternoon seminars include self help groups like "Peer Pressure: Where Do I Fit In" or "Like Mother, Like Me" and activities include swimming, horseback riding and lanyard making.

Lakeview

The neighborhood that Halley and Scarlett live in, Lakeview is comprised of several culde-sacs and streets that are bracketed by signs that assure everyone that Lakeview is a neighborhood of friends. The new airport is located only three miles away, creating a constant onslaught of airplanes landing or taking off above them.

The Arbors

A development of fancy Tudor houses that includes a golf course, pool and country club, The Arbors is where Ginny and her family lives.

Milton's Market

Milton's Market is the grocery store in which Scarlett and Halley both worked and where Michael later got a job a the Junior Assistant to the Produce Day Manager.

Aspire

The kind of car that Scarlett drives is an Aspire.

Topper Lake

A twenty minute drive from Halley's house, Topper Lake is where Macon takes her for her birthday.

Alfredo's

Halley's parents celebrate Halley's sixteenth birthday with her at Alfredo's.



So You're Pregnant - What Now?

So You're Pregnant - What Now? is the title of a book that becomes a bible for Halley and Scarlett as Scarlett's pregnancy evolves.

Teen Mothers Support Group

Scarlett joins a Teen Mothers Support Group at the urging of guidance counselor, Mrs. Bagbie, which meets two days a week.

Evergreen Rest Care Facility

The home that Grandma Halley is staying in after her fall is the Evergreen Rest Care Facility.

Lamaze

Lamaze lessons are pre-delivery classes that most first time mothers take, and that Halley attends with Scarlett.

Seventeen

Seventeen is a teen magazine that Scarlett and Halley spent a great deal of their youth pouring over.

Prom

Prom is a celebration for graduates.

Myrtle Beach (That Summer)

Ashley got her yellow butterfly tattoo on the inside of her left ankle at Myrtle Beach.

Little Feet

Little Feet is the children's shoe store where Haven begins working in Lakeview Mall when she is just fifteen, and has since been promoted to assistant sales person.



Vengo

Vengo is the name of the Italian restaurant that Haven's father takes her on the first Thursday night regular dinner they have after his honeymoon, and where Haven sees Sumner.

Pop Tarts

Haven's breakfast of choice is Pop Tarts.

Senior's Center

Sumner goes to dance with seniors for cash at the Senior's Center.

Lakeview Mall

Halley works at Little Feet and Sumner works as a security guard at Lakeview Mall

Ranzino's

The name of the pub at the Holiday Inn where Lydia begins taking Haven's mother every Thursday night is Ranzino's.

Las Vegas

Las Vegas is the first place that Lydia takes Haven's mother along with her travel club.

The Old-Timers

The Old-Timers is the name of the travel club to which Lydia belongs to and in which she involves Haven's mother.



Themes

Love vs Sex (Someone Like You)

In Book 1: Someone Like You, Scarlett decides to have sex with her boyfriend Michael who had only two weeks previously had told her he loved her for the first time. They'd done everything right. They'd waited until they were with someone they loved before having sex for the first time. They had used a condom, but it had failed. Still they hadn't panicked. No one gets pregnant the first time, right? Scarlett soon learns she was wrong. Not only does she find herself expecting, but also must face the issue alone but for her best friend Halley. Her mother is insistent that she abort the baby at first, and when Scarlett is unable to do so, she turns her attention to giving the baby up for adoption, despite Scarlett's insistence that she is going to keep her baby; and the father of the baby, Michael, is killed in an accident the day after Scarlett loses her virginity to him. Despite the obstacles against her, Scarlett, though fearful, keeps her composure and bonds with and then delivers her baby.

Scarlett struggles with the decisions that her best friend Halley makes during this time. While Scarlett is dealing with the enormity of her responsibility, Halley is contemplating having sex with Michael's former best friend Macon because he is tired of waiting for her to put out. She isn't proclaiming her undying love for Macon or his for her. Instead, she is concerned that her reluctance to put out is driving Macon away. Scarlett tries to help Halley, telling her that she is making a decision for the wrong reasons, but Halley thinks Scarlett is comparing too much of her own situation with Halley's and they argue.

Before Halley sleeps with Macon, she has an epiphany. Having met Macon behind her mother's back on New Year's Eve, Halley had decided to sleep with him, but after having too much to drink and smoke, she is ill at a critical moment and chickens out. Angry, Macon drives her home, getting into an accident on the way. She hears him tell her to hold on, and hears him say he loves her for the first time, but oddly, now it is too late. Her time with Macon is over. Lying in the hospital, Halley realizes that she isn't willing to give her virginity to someone who doesn't think it is a big deal the first time. She realizes that she deserves more.

Family Ties That Bind (That Summer)

In Book 2: That Summer, Haven drifts from her family for a time, when it seems that everything around her is coming apart at the seams. The trouble begins when Haven's father tells her mother that he is leaving her for the 'Weather Pet', Lorna Queen from his station. He moves out, shattering the family unit, and for a time, Haven's mother is devastated, but then Lydia moves in next door and the healing begins. For Haven however, the family isn't a balanced unit anymore. Where once she and her father who share a calm and unflappable demeanor had been the balance for her mother and Ashley who tend to be overly emotional or dramatic, now Haven faces them on her own.



The next change had come when Ashley announced her engagement to Lewis. It is then that Haven begins to blame Ashley for having split up with Sumner. In Haven's mind, Sumner had been the only one who ever made her sister happy. The summer that Sumner spent with them at the beach is one of Haven's happiest memories, and one of her saddest is the day that she announced that she couldn't see Sumner anymore.

Filled with resentment, Haven becomes angrier and angrier. She manages to behave herself through her father's wedding, but as her sister's wedding approaches and her mother suggests they sell the house, she begins to unravel. Sumner's return to the area only makes things worse as her memory of their past is still so vivid in her mind. Haven withdraws into herself more and more, and the day before Ashley's wedding is when it all comes to a head. When Ashley finally finds Haven wandering in the woods in the rain and the dark, she takes her home, questioning her recent behavior and demeanor. Finally Haven just asks her sister why she ever split up with the guy that Haven had been convinced was perfect for her. Ashley explains that Sumner had cheated on her and broken her heart, answering all of Haven's questions at once. Ashley, in the position of big sister, tells Haven that the first boy is always the hardest, and giving it some thought, Haven has to agree. Now, knowing the truth, she hugs her sister and words are unnecessary. As Ashley walks up the aisle to her husband to be, she stops to hug Haven and tell her she loves her. Haven knows that everything will be fine and the future looks bright.

Ugly Duckling Syndrome (Both Books)

In both of these stories, a young girl is struggling to find herself and her place in life. In Someone Like You, Halley sees herself as little more than an outline - a shadow of what is yet to come. She is content to be in the shadows while her best friend Scarlett is in the spotlight. Known as Halley, Scarlett's best friend, is okay by her. When Macon begins to pay attention to her, at first she is surprised that he would want anything to do with her at all. Scarlett tells her that Macon should consider himself fortunate if Halley thinks him worthy of dating. This message doesn't get through, but after dating for several weeks, Halley begins to feel differently. Macon pressures her to have sex with him, but Halley is reluctant. It would be her first time, and her instincts are guiding her, telling her that she shouldn't. Macon becomes angry, causing an accident that wakes Halley up. She realizes that she is worthy of love, and of having someone believe she is beautiful.

In That Summer, Haven is facing a similar issue. Haven is just shy of six feet tall and is just fifteen. Her height is a constant source of embarrassment to her and as a result, she slouches to try to appear shorter. Haven feels as though she doesn't fit in her body. Her sister Ashley is perfect and petite, with small feet and a perfectly proportioned body. Haven struggles to fit in, and is too aware that her body has still not stopped growing. Haven finds herself one morning just before her sister's wedding. She is standing in front of the mirror when she realizes that she suddenly fits into herself. It is a magical moment and it is the first time that she hasn't felt too tall, or too skinny to fit in.



Many young girls face the ugly duckling syndrome, where parts of them grow either slower or faster than others. It is a gift of adulthood that generally evens things out, and enables us to see the real beauty that lies within us all.



Style

Point of View

Someone Like You, by Sarah Dessen is a fictional story for young adults that is told in the first person perspective by the main character, Halley Cooke. In this tale, Halley's best friend Scarlett loses her boyfriend in an accident just after they have sex for the first time. The condom breaks and Scarlett finds herself pregnant, and without the baby's father to help. Her mother immediately insists on an abortion, but Scarlett is unable to go through with it. She decides to keep Michael's baby. Meanwhile, her best friend Halley becomes involved with Michael's best friend Macon. Macon is a wild child who likes to party and lives life on the edge. Halley is astounded that he even gives her a second look. She begins spending more and more time with him, despite her parent's objections. When he pressures her to have sex with him, she resists, but as time goes on, he becomes increasingly distant. Halley decides that to keep him, she should sleep with him. Scarlett advises against it, but Halley isn't listening. She sneaks out with Macon on New Year's Eve, intending to have sex with him, but changes her mind when she sees where he takes her. The party is loud and the house is a pig pen. Upstairs, the bedroom smells like cat litter and the bed is only now being vacated by the young couple who rutted before them. Halley changes her mind, becoming physically ill, and Macon finally loses his patience. In his anger driving her home, he gets into an accident which hospitalizes her. Halley grows up in that moment, realizing she wants more from life. She deserves to love, and to have a man who loves her. Halley says goodbye to Macon, and helps Scarlett to deliver a healthy baby girl.

That Summer, by Sarah Dessen is a fictional story for young adults that is told in the first person perspective by Haven McPhail, the main character. In this story, Haven reveals the turmoil she feels as her mother and father divorce, and her father remarries. This is only the beginning of the changes that will occur. Her sister Ashley becomes engaged to Lewis, and their wedding falls close on the heels of her father's wedding to the weather girl at his station. Haven feels like her life is coming apart at the seams. Then Sumner returns to town, having left to attend school elsewhere. Sumner had dated Ashley and spent a summer with them at the beach. Around him, Ashley had laughed more, smiled more, and generally tolerated Haven more. As such, Haven had come to have strong feelings of friendship for Sumner, and had been devastated when her sister said goodbye to him. When he returns, it is as though it is a sign. He always seems to be near when Haven's life was coming apart. The more things had changed, the more Haven had come to believe that the changes all began when Ashley and Sumner split up. Haven blames her sister, hating her for the confusion and pain she feels until finally Ashley reveals the truth. Sumner hadn't been the perfect boyfriend that Haven had believed him to be. In fact, his cheating on Ashley is what split them up. This news changes things between Haven and her sister, and Haven realizes that Ashley had been devastated both by Sumner's behavior and her father's leaving. Between the two, she had almost lost her faith in men. Haven finally understands that her family will always be her family, and takes strength from it.



Setting

Someone Like You, the first of the two novels this book contains, is set almost entirely in Lakeview, which is a neighborhood that encompasses several cul-de-sacs and streets that are bracketed by hand carved signs and wooden posts. The only other real distinguishing feature is the new airport. The story begins while Halley is at camp, one week into a two week stay. She gets a phone call from her best friend Scarlett who tells her that her boyfriend Michael was just killed in an accident. Devastated, she asks Halley to come home, and Halley does. Scarlett and Halley both have jobs at Milton's as cashiers. The story revolves around small town living and lifestyle.

That Summer, the second story in this book is also set in Lakeview. Haven works in Lakeview Mall at a children's shoe store called Little Feet. Most of the story is set between the mall, Haven's home, and the area in between like the park where Haven occasionally still hides from the world under the slide. Again, small town living reveals itself in the lack of privacy and the fact that everyone knows everyone else's business. This issue is fueled by one or two town gossips who make it their personal mission in life to keep everyone informed.

Language and Meaning

Both of the stories contained in 'How to Deal' by Sarah Dessen are told in a format and manner that would be acceptable for a young adult audience. The language is straight forward and easy to understand, with most of the dialogue occurring between siblings or between young adults and their parents. The subject matter touches on some subjects which are sensitive to anyone who has a daughter or two, and realizes the difficulties they face when they begin to date. In the first story, Scarlett discovers she is pregnant. Though she had loved the young man with whom she'd slept, and they had used a condom, she soon learns that there are no guarantees in life. The condom broke, and two days later, the young man she loved enough to give her virginity to is killed in an accident. Her best friend Halley becomes both birthing coach and partner as Scarlett deals with the stresses of pregnancy, and faces the fact that she will be a single parent.

In the second story, Haven learns about trust and family. When the family unit dissolves, Haven struggles to cope with the myriad of changes. Her father leaves first, and then Ashley becomes engaged. Her father remarries shortly after leaving, and Ashley's wedding is set for soon after. In the midst of it all, her mother announces her intention to sell the house. Haven searches her mind for a time that was happy, and returns again and again to the summer that she and her family, along with Ashley's boyfriend Sumner, spent at the beach in Virginia. It was a happy time, and Haven comes to resent the changes that have occurred since. When the pressure builds to a crescendo, Haven finally snaps. Ashley finds her and brings her home again, on the way giving her a harsh dose of reality. The memories Haven has are wonderful, but not entirely accurate. Ashley hadn't initiated the break up that Haven believed started it all. In fact, Sumner had, with an act of unfaithfulness that Ashley couldn't and wouldn't forgive.



Structure

How to Deal by Sarah Dessen is actually two complete novels joined in one book for their similarities. The first book, Someone Like You, consists of three main segments which are further divided into nineteen chapters. The first section, Part I, is titled The Grand Canyon and is four chapters in length. This section introduces Halley and Scarlett, and reveals Michael death and the reaction that Scarlett has to losing her boyfriend and the first love of her life. The second segment, Part II, is titled Someone Like You, and is thirteen chapters in length. This segment deals with Halley and Macon, spanning the length of time that they dated, and reveals the reason for their break up. The third and final segment, Part III, is simply titled Grace. Comprised of only two chapters, this segment deals with the aftermath of Halley's accident, and the birth of Scarlett's daughter named Grace Halley Thomas. In all, this first book spans one hundred and eighty-one pages.

The second book, That Summer, consists of thirteen chapters containing a total of one hundred and twenty-five pages. These thirteen chapters are each between six and fifteen pages in length with most ranging between nine and eleven. Each chapter is labelled with the chapter number only, and there are no subheadings or subsections that further divide the segments.

Halley's mother to Halley after Macon crashes the car as he is taking her home.

Lorna to Halley and Ashley as she prepares to marry their father.

"I don't need anyone but Lewis and we're going to elope, I swear to God we are." Ch. 3, Pg. 30

Ashley to her mother and Lydia after she learns that Carol has called to say she can't attend.



"She has a breakdown just about every other day though." Ch. 5, Pg. 45 Haven to her father in response to his query as to how Ashley is doing.

"She's probably grown another four feet and we'll have to get fitted later again." Ch. 7, Pg. 65

Ashley to her mother as she complains about Haven's continued growth and the problems associated with it.

"'He was hoping I'd just lose interest.... He didn't even have the guts to call me and tell me he had a new girlfriend."' Ch. 10, Pg. 98 Casey to Haven after Rick calls her long distance to break up with her.

"If you're accosting the customers and running out on your job, obviously something is going on that we need to discuss." Ch. 11, Pg. 105

Haven's mother to Haven the day before Ashley's wedding, soon after Haven threw a shoe at a customer and walked out of her job at Little Feet.

"I have planned this day and done too much for too long for you to decide to ruin it purely out of spite." Ch. 12, Pg. 110

Ashley to Haven on the afternoon before her wedding in an effort to break through whatever problem Haven is having.

What emergency does Scarlett have that requires Halley to join her in the restroom at work? What test has she taken, and how many times? What other signs are present to confirm this test?

How does Marion respond to the news when Scarlett tells her? What does she believe is the best solution to this situation? What plans does she make? What information does she want from Scarlett beforehand?

What does Scarlett do when Marion takes her to the clinic? Who does she call? Who else comes to her aid? What compromise is reached with Marion and who negotiates the truce between her and Scarlett? What is the outcome of this situation?

How much time does That Summer span? What are the major events that occur in this time period that change Haven's life so dramatically and how?

Who does Haven believe is the perfect mate for her sister Ashley? What brought her to this conclusion and why? What did Haven overhear that makes her believe that Ashley broke up with him and not the other way around?

Where does Haven's father work? What is his position there? How does his position affect the time he spends with Haven and in what way? Who does Haven see during the first meeting she and her father have after his wedding to Lorna?

How many jobs does Sumner have? What are they? Which one surprises Haven the most, and why? Which job does he have that benefits both Ashley and Haven at different times?

Who is Halley's father's new wife? Where did he meet her? What is her position? What nickname does she have and why? What is she called behind her back?



What happens the day before Ashley's wedding that creates chaos for Ashley? What compromise does she threaten in anger and frustration? What suggestions are made that will solve this issue?

Where and when does Halley finally lose her composure? What does she do? What is the outcome of her outburst? What does she do immediately afterward, and where?

What does Ashley tell Halley when she finds her in the woods? How does this change the way Halley has always believed things went? What words of wisdom does Ashley impart at this time?
