There are people who will use naïve or new people because they can in any industry, but in the sex industry, it can be worse. It is very important for the girl to know what she will and will not do and to stand up for herself.

Book 4, Chapter 3 Analysis

Jenna gives an insight into how to get into the adult entertainment industry and make it work. She has learned from experience and wants to share with everyone, because she does not think anyone should have to go through things the hard way. Book 4, Chapter 7 Summary

Jenna describes a normal adult film contract. She acknowledges that it usually favors the production company and that many girls do not put their own demands in. However, she emphasizes that the contract is to protect both parties, not just the production company.

A normal contract defines the term of the contract, which is usually one year. The second part describes what the company will do for the actor/actress, what types of scenes will be expected, and how many within the contract year. Next, the contract states that the actor/actress will work solely for the production company during the contract year, which includes movies, promotions and any other type of entertainment. Should the actor/actress want to work elsewhere, he/she will need to have written permission from the production company.

Normally, the actor or actress will receive a monthly salary as long as she appears in several scenes a month and will receive a percentage of video sales. The final section tells the actor/actress that they are expected to be law-abiding, and refrain from drugs and/or alcohol abuse and prostitution. The parties then have a place to sign. There is usually an additional schedule of additional compensation for certain sexual acts.

Themes

When she finally broke out on her own, with Club Jenna, she was the most downloaded porn star on the web. She started her company with no understanding of internet business. She started making a profit within the first month.

Jenna succeeds in whatever she does, because once she had decided it is what she wants to do, she gives 100% until she accomplishes her dream.

Fear of commitment

For most of her life, when things got to close, Jenna's family would move. She kept this as an adult. The only relationship she did not run away from at first was her relationship with Jack. However, even with that relationship, when she started doing photo shoots, she started pulling away. She pulled away from Rod before they ever married and was never faithful to him. The thought of spending the rest of her life with him and being responsible was not an option. When she met Jordan, she enjoyed being with him. However, as he became more demanding and controlling, she started pulling away from him. When he wanted her to settle down with him, she ran.

She pulled away from everyone in her life, including her family. It took Jay to keep putting himself in her face before she would stay. She left him many times and he refused to call her and beg her to come back, but she always returned on her own. Eventually she realized that if she wanted a relationship to work, she would have to stop running and stick around. It scared her, but her losing Jay scared her more. She stopped running and found happiness.



Style

Point of View

There are several points of view in this book. Jenna mixes up entries to her diary, stories in her own words, and transcripts from interviews with producers and her family. By doing this, she is being intimate with the reader. She uses her diary entries to let the reader enter her mind and feel her insecurities, happiness, fear and depression. She is allowing us to understand her feelings more than anyone else at the time. There are come things that she writes about in the first person. She could only portray these stories. Only the other person in the relationships could give any insight. She uses these to describe her life, addictions, hardships and success. She tells of her fears and shyness, and explains that she does not know the alter ego that comes out when she is on stage. She gives the reader a very personal description of her feelings after the fact and it makes her more human. The interviews help to serve as a basis for her childhood and early adult life when dealing with her family. It gives the reader insight to how her father and brother feel as if they have failed her at times, and wish they could have done more. It is extremely well put together and informative.

Setting

The setting is mainly Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Miami, and Phoenix, and the different person each city created in Jenna. Las Vegas represents the shy, dependent, addicted little girl that left her fathers house for Jack. It also represents each time Jenna regressed to that little girl. Los Angeles represents the insecure and scared young woman who wanted to prove she could do things on her own. It is the city where, although, Jenna wants to be independent, she never allows herself to be, and gives her independence away. Miami represents the hiatus that almost destroyed Jenna, and the city that ultimately led her to Phoenix. Phoenix represents independence, unconditional love and family. All these she found in Phoenix with Jay.

Language and Meaning

Jenna uses straightforward language. She is a down to earth person with no presumptions, and wants this book to be a guide to those who are considering a life in the adult film industry or who are just interested in her life. She wants people, for what ever reason they are reading the book, to come away with something, whether it is what not to do or how to break into the adult film industry, what kind of relationships to avoid, or that there is always light at the end of the tunnel, you just have to find it.



Structure

The book is structured into eight parts. She starts with a prologue. It sets up the reader to know that she has had a rough life.

Book 1 talks about how she met Jack and started the first self-destructive path she was to take in her life, and how she tried to break away.

Book 2 explains how she got away from Jack and found her way into adult films.

Book 3 explains more of her childhood from interviews with her brother and father.

Book 4 explains her life as a hard-core porn star and her marriage to Rod.

Book 5 explains her escape from life with alcohol and drugs.

Book 6 explains her recovery from the second self-destructive phase and how she found her happiness with Jay.

The epilogue explains in Jenna's own words how she feels her past has affected her and how it will affect her future.
