Plot Summary

NW is a novel by author Zadie Smith. The story follows the lives of various people that grew up in and live in the NW neighborhood of London. The main character in the first half of the novel is Leah Hanwell. Leah has a loving mother, Pauline, and a loving husband, Michel. Being a white woman married to a black French man poses its own challenges, but these are not challenges that are new to Leah. Her best friend, Natalie is also black.

Leah has reached adulthood wondering when all of her friends became so grown up while she feels as if she isn't on the same level as they are. She loves Michel, but he is ready to take their lives to the next level by buying a house and having kids. Leah is secretly doing everything she can to avoid any of these plans, including stealing Natalie's birth control pills so she can take them without Michel knowing she's on the pill. Leah even has an abortion without telling Michel she was ever pregnant.

The second half of the novel follows Leah's best friend, Natalie Blake. Natalie Blake comes from the same neighborhood as Leah, but her family couldn't be more different. In addition to overcoming poverty obstacles, Natalie also faces the challenge of being black. Natalie manages to make it as an attorney, marry a successful financial expert and have two children. Natalie, too, however, is leading a secret life of her own. Even with all of her success, she yearns for a different life, which causes her to respond to personal ads where couples are seeking a third sexual party.

The novel reveals that even those that grow up in the same neighborhood can end up with very different lifestyles. While Leah and Natalie are able to lead middle-class lives, some of the other people that they knew growing up are drug addicts and thieves.



Chapters 1 and 2

Chapters 1 and 2 Summary

A redhead is lying in a hammock. She's reading a magazine and trying to write on glossy magazine pages with a pencil, which isn't working. She's writing that she is the sole author of her dictionary. The redhead mentions that Michel is still at work and that he says that not everyone can be invited to the party. Additionally, the redhead thinks that not everything can be shared in marriage. The hammock the girl is in tips and the papers go everywhere.

The doorbell rings and Leah, the redhead, opens the door to a frantically screaming woman. The woman, who introduces herself as Shar, is waving a bill in her hand and screaming about her sick mother in the hospital. Leah invites Shar in for tea. While she's making the tea and talking with Shar, she notices that Shar's clothes are dirty and there appears to be something wrong with her face. Leah agrees to call Shar a cab to get to the hospital.

Shar realizes that both the woman and Leah went to the same school. Shar starts talking about other people that went to school with them and what they are up to now. Leah admits that she took a pregnancy test this morning and that she's just found out she's pregnant. Shar places her hands on Leah's belly, pronounces it a girl and predicts that she will be a lot of trouble and Leah will have to constantly watch her.

Leah goes up to the bathroom, making the excuse that she has to get the money that Shar needs for the cab. She cries in the bathroom until the taxi arrives. As Shar is getting into the cab and Leah is giving Shar the money she needs, Michel, Leah's husband walks up. When Leah tells Shar who he is, Shar comments on him having a girl's name and how good looking he is. Leah says that he is French, originally from South Africa, and that he's a hairdresser. Shar promises to return tomorrow to pay Leah back when Shar gets money from her paycheck.

Chapters 1 and 2 Analysis

When the redhead is writing and thinking that she is the sole author of her dictionary, she is saying that she is the only one in control of her own destiny. Michel saying that not everyone can be invited to the party is a metaphor for saying that not everyone lives the same life. The papers scattering everyone is also a metaphor for the redhead's life being scattered.

Leah appears to be unhappy about her pregnancy. It can be that she doesn't want children, or that she isn't sure how Michel is going to react to the news that she's pregnant. the two women represent two different classes. While they both went to the same school and appear to come from the same neighborhood, they live contrasting



lives. While Shar is dirty and had an abusive husband and three children, Leah seems to be living a more posh life and so far doesn't have any children.



Chapters 3 and 4

Chapters 3 and 4 Summary

When Leah tells her mother, Pauline, about Shar, her mother says she's been robbed on her own doorstep by a crack-addicted gypsy. Pauline asks what Michel said, pronouncing his name Michelle. Leah says he wants to go looking for her to get the money back.

Pauline blames Leah being gullible on her being an only child. Pauline also blames the problems on the foreigners in England. Pauline asks to speak to Michel. The only thing the two connect on is Leah's mistakes. Leah goes down to the communal hammock to smoke marijuana with their neighbor Ned.

Michel, Leah and their dog Olive are enjoying croissants at a local pastries' shop. The man at the counter is wearing a turban. Michel is talking about a clinic. Leah points out Shar to Michel as Shar buys a pack of cigarettes in the shop. Michel points at Shar and demands their money back.

Chapters 3 and 4 Analysis

It seems as if Michel wants Leah to get pregnant. He keeps talking about their moving forward and about a clinic. This suggests that Leah has not told Michel that she is pregnant yet. This can be an indication that Leah is not planning on keeping the baby.



Chapters 5 and 6

Chapters 5 and 6 Summary

Leah provides an overview of how she and Michel fell in love and what their relationship has been like over the years. She talks about how the physical attraction between the two of them was immediate. The order of their relationship, however, also seemed to be backward. As they are lying in bed now, having been married for years, Michel keeps talking about her age and them being more military about trying.

Saturday mornings while Michel is working at the salon, Leah is free to do what she wants. As Leah dances she looks at herself in the mirror. She wonders where the time has gone. The doorbell rings. There's a girl crying that her mom's had a heart attack. The girl laughs. She is so high that she turns around and leaves because she's forgotten her lines.

Chapters 5 and 6 Analysis

Michel seems almost obsessed with them having a baby. The ironic part is that Leah is already pregnant. Rather than tell Michel this, however, she is keeping it a secret. Leah seems to have apprehension about their relationship in general, which can be the reason she is keeping the pregnancy a secret from everyone.

Leah seems to be self-conscious. This is especially true when Michel is around. It's as if Leah has lost her own true identity when her husband is in the room. This is why she feels so free to be herself when he is working at the salon on Saturday mornings. It also seems as if Leah and Michel are too different. Michel is black. Leah is white. Michel likes rap music. Leah prefers older hits. Michel wants children. Leah doesn't seem to want children.



Chapters 7 and 8

Chapters 7 and 8 Summary

Leah is thinking about an apple tree. She is relating to the apple tree—how it grows and blooms; hibernates for the season; and then blooms one again. Michel wants to move forward. he keeps talking about buying their own home.

Leah is at work. She's thinking about how she is the only white woman in a sea of black women from various African countries. She's hiding her pregnancy from her co-workers as well as her family. She tries to act normal at work, but she always feels as if she has to act different in order to fit in. The women are always making comments. Some of them even remark on how Leah's white and she has the last black man on earth.

Chapters 7 and 8 Analysis

The apple tree is symbolic of Leah's life. She's thinking about how she is the same as the tree. the tree is the same tree that has been blooming and dying, blooming and dying for years. As the tree blooms and die, life around it is changing, while the tree remains the same. Leah is questioning if she is the same girl or if she has changed. She feels as if she is the same thing, but that things have changed in her life, but she doesn't want to change with these things.

Michel, on the other hand, is ready to keep moving, taking their life to the next level. while she remains silent about her feelings, Leah is hesitant to move on, to take their life to the next level, such as having a baby. It seems as if Leah is just going through the motions at this point in her life.

Leah is even going through the motions at work. She feels self-conscious because she is the only white women on her tem. She feels self-conscious because the black women always remark about her having a black husband. Leah is trying to be normal. She's trying to act the way that she thinks other people think she should act.



Chapters 9 and 10

Chapters 9 and 10 Summary

Leah prints out directions. It doesn't say what the final destination is, except the address itself. Leah describes the people sitting in the waiting room. She also takes about all of the diversity of the people in London, in general.

Chapters 9 and 10 Analysis

It appears as if Leah has printed directions to a clinic. She talks about an expectant father in the waiting room. She can be there for a checkup on the baby about her pregnancy. She can also be there to find out what her alternatives are for terminating the pregnancy.



Chapters 11 and 12

Chapters 11 and 12 Summary

Leah spots Shar on the street. When Shar recognizes Leah, Shar drops the phone receiver of the payphone in Shar's hand. Leah walks up to Shar and instead of her own voice, Leah hears Michel's voice as she tells Shar she wants her money back and Leah Calls Shar a thief.

Leah also thinks about the number thirty-seven. She believes it is a lucky number. This includes thinking of an address, 37 Ridley Avenue. It's a boarded up house right now.

Leah meets her mother to go shopping. On their way to the stores, they run into an addict begging on the street. He's selling a train fare card. Pauline starts to negotiate the sale with him. The man turns out to be a guy Leah went to high school with, and even had a crush on when they were growing up.

Chapters 11 and 12 Analysis

Leah is keeping the pregnancy a secret from Pauline as well. Leah finds it ironic how people can grow up with the same opportunities, yet turn out with such drastically different lives. For example, the boy she grew up with has turned into a junkie trying to sell fare cards on the street to make money to feed his habit.



Chapters 13 and 14

Chapters 13 and 14 Summary

Michel is on the computer online trading with Leah's inheritance. Leah wants to get on the Internet, but Michel tells her she has to wait until he's done. While Leah waits, she smokes three cigarettes. She overhears one of the neighbors yelling at her children. Then, Leah sees Colin Hanwell, her dead father appear near her house. When he approaches, they talk about her dog, Olive, and Leah's happiness. Michel announces the computer is free.

As Leah walks through her neighborhood, she notices how it has deteriorated over the years. When Leah spots Shar, she notices she has a black eye that has turned into a yellow bruise. Shar's eye is weeping uncontrollably. When Leah walks up to Shar, Shar admits she stole her money and that she's a drug addict. Leah tries to offer Shar help for the drugs and the abuse but Shar shrugs Leah off and tells Leah to leave her alone.

Chapters 13 and 14 Analysis

When Leah thinks of her father, she thinks of the Ukranian nurses that cared for him. She also thinks about a scrape he got on the edge of the games' table that never went away and never healed. She implies that her father died last year and that he left her some money, which Michel is now using to trade securities online.

It seems as if Leah is relating the decay of her city and country to the influx of foreigners, drugs and crime. This is certainly how her mother feels about the changes in their country.



Chapters 15 and 16

Chapters 15 and 16 Summary

Leah has taken some pamphlets from work about addiction. She gets off the bus and starts to walk towards Number 37. Before Leah gets to the house, she throws up in the bushes in front of what used to be her childhood church, but is now apartments. When Leah reaches Number 37, she slides the pamphlets into the mail slot.

Leah thinks about how she searched for a home remedy, but can only come up with hat pins and gin baths. Since she knows this won't work, she is sitting in the office with her old credit card from college so that Michel won't see it. She thinks about the procedure when she had it in college. The doctor was counting down backwards from ten and by the time he gets to seven, Leah is asleep. When she wakes up, she thinks minutes have passed, but her old lover says it's been two and a half hours.

When Leah wakes up this time, she thinks about how this is her third time having the procedure. The first two times, she was a little over two months pregnant. This time she was three months pregnant.

Leah and Michel are visiting Leah's best friend, Natalie, her husband, Frank, and their children, Spike and Naomi. Natalie mentions that Leah is always trying t save someone. Michel says several women and a couple of men are living in the house and running the scam of getting people's money. They also talk about Nathan Bogle, the guy they went to school with that Pauline and Leah saw selling travel cards.

Michel tells Frank that he's dabbling in online trading with the money Leah's father left to them. Frank gives Michel some advice, which causes Leah to lash out at Frank. Frank leaves and Michel starts berating Leah for treating Michel badly. She says she was just defending Michel. When Natalie returns with Naomi, Leah notes the look of longing on Michel's face.

Chapters 15 and 16 Analysis

It seems the street Leah once grew up on is now deteriorated into crack houses, rundown and boarded up house. What is left of the neighborhood has been changed, such as the church converted into apartments. Number 27 is the crack house, the boarded up house, where Shar and others like her squat. Leah is dropping the pamphlets off for Shar in an attempt to try to get Shar help for her drug problem.

Leah is at an abortion clinic. Since she couldn't find a home remedy or old wives' tale way of terminating the pregnancy, she is there with her own credit card so Michel doesn't see the charge for it. It appears as if Leah's indecision as to what to do with the pregnancy forced her to wait until the last minute to decide to have an abortion.



Leah feels as if her friends have outgrown her. While they've all moved on with their lives, she is still stuck in the same place. While Leah feels this way, she also doesn't do anything about moving on wither life. When she had the opportunity to have a family and become a mother, she chose to abort the baby instead.



Chapters 17 and 18

Chapters 17 and 18 Summary

Leah is walking with Natalie, Naomi and Spike to the church that Pauline attends. Natalie and Frank want to start attending church so that they children can get into a good school. as the walk through the deteriorating neighborhood, Natalie asks Leah if she is sure this is the right way to the church.

The church appears as if it is a blessing out of its hellish surroundings. As they walk through the graveyard, Natalie explains to Naomi and Spike the difference between the recently dead and the long-time dead. Leah reads the tombstones and she even thinks she envisions her own saying that she should take it easy from this heat wave for the next forty-eight hours. Then she thinks it says she should take it easy for the rest of her life. As the church service lets out, Natalie picks up a pamphlet to start reciting the history of the church.

Leah thinks about how Natalie always picks up the pamphlets. She also thinks Natalie must have become an adult in their years between sixteen and eighteen while Leah was smoking pot. As the vicar seems to be approaching the woman, and Natalie continues to recite facts and information from the pamphlet, Leah hears bits of pieces. Leah hears someone asking if she's okay and if she needs some water. Leah feels her knees buckle.

Pauline is visiting Leah. Pauline talks about how she used to faint too. When Leah calls Olive to sit with them, Pauline mentions that she is allergic to what is probably going to be her only grandchild. While Pauline rambles on and on, Leah thinks about Shar. She thinks about how while she's pushing the pamphlets into the slot at Number 37 that Shar opens the door and suggests they run away together. Leah thinks about Shar's long black hair being in her mouth as they rest on the bed.

The phone rings. When Leah answers it, it is a voice she doesn't recognize. The voice says she's their problem and to stay away from her and keep her pamphlets. The voice also calls Leah a dyke.

Chapters 17 and 18 Analysis

The church represents a religious symbol in the sins and evil that have become part of the neighborhood on Willesdon. Drugs and crime have moved into the neighborhood where Leah and Natalie grew up, but the church still stands as a holy symbol of the good in the world. Leah faints in the church.

Pauline implies that Leah and Michel are taking too long to have children. This is why she says Olive is likely her only grandchild and Pauline is allergic to the dog. Leah



thinking about running away with Shar implies that Leah is a lesbian. The anonymous caller seems to concur with this though process because the caller calls Leah a dyke.



Chapters 19 and 20

Chapters 19 and 20 Summary

When Leah tells Michel about the phone call, he gets very angry. He asks if the caller was Nathan. Leah says she thinks it was but cannot be one hundred percent sure it was him. Leah chooses not to tell Michel that the caller called her a dyke.

When Michel and Leah are coming out of the grocery, Leah says he thinks it is Nathan in a phone booth. Michel starts a fight with the guy, who turns out not to be Nathan. When he starts kicking Michel, Leah pleads with the man to stop because she is pregnant. the man kicks Olive and threatens to shoot Michel if he ever comes near him again.

Chapters 19 and 20 Analysis

Leah opts not to tell Michel that the caller called her a dyke because it is true that she is a lesbian or at least bisexual. Michel's instinct is to protect his wife. Little does Michel know but Leah is not being completely honest with him about anything, including their relationship, the baby, or her sexuality.



Chapters 21 and 22

Chapters 21 and 22 Summary

Michel and Leah arrive home with Olive. Ned asks if they are okay. They recount the story. Olive seems to be fine. They talk about whether they should leave her to go to the dinner party tonight. Since she seems to be normal, they decide to go.

At the dinner party, everyone is talking about their parents wanting to come to live with them at the same time they are having babies of their own. Everyone is from India, China and Africa—from everywhere but here. After recounting the fight story, Natalie tells Leah to tell the story about the woman who came to their front door.

On the way home, Leah and Michel bond over how different they are from everyone at the party. They get into a small scuffle but make up by the time they reach their front door. They kiss in the hallway and start to fool around. The next morning, Leah finds Olive dead under her nightstand with bloody foam coming out of her mouth.

Chapters 21 and 22 Analysis

Michel points out that their lives are just as unhappy as everyone else's at the dinner party. It's just in a different way. It seems as if Michel and Leah are in a lower class than their friends, so their problems differ slightly from those in a higher class that have money. Michel and Leah decide not to take Olive to the very because of the cost. In the end, it costs them more than money. It costs them their dog's life.



Chapter 23

Chapter 23 Summary

All through the month of July Leah mourns the loss of Olive. The women at work don't understand because all animals smaller than a donkey are vermin in their respective countries. The only way that Michel and Leah have moved up is by being safer and more secure. They've added a heavy duty lock to the apartment and now Michel picks Leah up at the train station after work.

Leah continues to hide the birth control pills she stole from Natalie's bathroom. She locks herself in her own bathroom to take the pills in secret. Then, it's the month of August.

To celebrate carnival, Leah and Michel accept an invitation to a party at an apartment of one of Natalie and Frank's friends. Michel hears a new story about a man who was killed by two young men while entering his house in the same neighborhood where Michel and Leah live. Michel says they need to move. Leah says she doesn't want to move.

Frank arrives before Natalie. When Natalie arrives, the husband and wife look at each other without any recognition or greeting. Leah ends up a little drunk, but has a good time.

Leah is picking up photos at the pharmacy. The girl cannot find the photos, but eventually finds a Hanwell envelope misfiled under the wrong letter. When Leah starts looking through the pictures, she sees photos of Shar and what must be Shar's friends. She makes a scene about the pictures not being her pictures and how she doesn't think it's a coincidence that Shar's pictures are under Leah's name. Michel drags Leah out the door.

Chapter 23 Analysis

Even the cultural differences of mourning the loss of a pet are different. Leah continues to keep secrets from Michel, such as taking birth control pills so that she cannot get pregnant, when Michel thinks they are trying to have a baby. The look exchanged between Natalie and Frank when Natalie arrives at the carnival party suggests to Leah that even perfect couples are not so perfect after all.

It seems as if Shar is taking on Leah's identity. This explains why Shar's photos are under Leah's name at the pharmacy.

Felix opens the envelope that contains a book that is about Garvey House, which is the projects in England where he grew up. He starts flipping through the book and reading the captions with his father. since his father lived there, Felix's father knows everyone in the pictures and he tells Felix small facts about who each person is. His father says he should be in that picture.

When Lloyd, Felix's father, finds his own picture in the book, he's reading a book in the picture. Lloyd says he was always reading and that's where Felix and his siblings got their brains. Lloyd also starts carrying on about where his money is for the author publishing his picture in a book. Lloyd warns Felix about always getting caught up with the ladies.

When Felix is leaving, he runs into his father's neighbor, Phil Barnes. Phil Barnes is also in the book Lloyd is looking at, and Felix has known Phil Barnes his whole life. Phil asks about Felix, Lloyd, Felix's twin sisters and his brother. Felix thinks about how Phil is the only one that asks about his brother Devon.

Phil also talks about Felix's mother. he says she was a great woman. As the two men walk toward the bus stop, they see another neighbor, Mrs. Mulherne. They help her get her things off the bus and to her apartment. Felix thinks about how Mrs. Mulherne and other women in Garvey House would comment about how Lloyd always took care of the



four kids alone. When Felix leaves, he thinks about how he met Grace at a bus stop. She believes their meeting was s fate. Felix gets onto the train.

The inference is that Felix is involved in some illegal activity. This is why his errands are secrets. Additionally, it is inferred that Felix is the one that beat up Michel because he keeps using the word bruv, which is also what the guy beating up Michel was calling Michel.

Ironically, Lloyd tells Felix to stop chasing women, but Lloyd is known for chasing women. What Phil Barnes says and what the other women said about Felix's mother suggests that she was either a drug addict, or that she had mental problems. Another implication is that Felix's youngest brother, Devon is in prison.

Tom comments on how it's a good thing Felix is a mechanic.

The two men walk to a nearby pub to have a drink and negotiate the deal. Felix talks about the various types of jobs he's done over the years, including being a drug dealer. At one point, Tom asks Felix if he has anything stronger than the beer he's drinking. Felix makes a joke about how his girlfriend says he has a sign on his head to ask him for weed. The two men settle on four hundred dollars.

On his way to his next destination, Grace calls. She's asking if Felix got in touch with Ricky about the leak in the apartment. He says he'll take care of it when he gets home. She asks Felix what Lloyd thinks of the book and tells Felix to put Lloyd on the phone. Felix lies, saying Lloyd is in the bathroom. Then, Grace is distracted by her work and hangs up.

Felix passes two prostitutes on the way upstairs to his Annie's apartment. She's in the bathroom taking a bath, so she summons him in there. When she asks for an ashtray and he looks around the apartment to locate one, he notices that her apartment is similar to his father's apartment—a lifetime of things crammed into a small space.

Tom and Felix represent the dividing line between very different upbringings. Tom ha older parents that are still married and provided him with everything he can need and more. Tom's life is posh and easy, even though Tom thinks his life is hard and a struggle.

Lloyd took care of the children, but they were poor and he likes to dabble in smoking weed, so it wasn't the most productive of households.

Felix has had a series of jobs in order to make ends meet. Some of the jobs are legal, but his drug dealing is obviously illegal.

Felix urges her to take an after-pill to ensure she doesn't get pregnant. Annie assures Felix she doesn't want to have his children.

They continue to argue as Felix leaves the rooftop and returns to the apartment. She starts to cry as Felix leaves. While he's walking down the building stairs, he hears a thud and sobbing, as if Annie has fallen to her knees to cry.

The pamphlets offer Shar ways to get home for her abusive relationship and drug addiction. The pamphlets are also what prompt the threatening phone call to Leah in her home.

Abortion Clinic

The abortion clinic is where Leah sits observing the others waiting in the room. This is Leah's third or fourth trip to the abortion clinic in her lifetime. Leah goes to the abortion clinic alone to abort the baby she is carrying from Michel, and Leah doesn't even tell Michel she is pregnant.

Birth Control Pills

Leah locates birth control pulls in Natalie's medicine cabinet. Leah steals the pills from Natalie and starts secretly taking them. when Michel finds the birth control pills with Natalie's name on them, he confronts Leah and Natalie. Natalie, however, doesn't know that Leah took the pills or that she has been taking the pills.



Website Listings

Natalie starts reading website listings looking for people to join couples in sexual acts. At one point, Natalie posts her own listing on the site, but she ends up removing it. Natalie peruses these website listings and arranges to meet with various couples throughout the second half of the novel.

NW6

NW6 is an abandoned and boarded up home in the NW neighborhood. It is the home where Shar is squatting with the people she hangs with that is presumably in the crime ring. NW6 is the mail slot where Leah drops off the pamphlets for Shar to get help.

Olive

Olive is a small dog. She belongs to Leah and Michel. When Michel gets into a fight with the guy on the street, the guy kicks Olive. Olive subsequently dies from internal injuries.

Bakery

Leah and Michel are sitting in the bakery with Olive. This is when they see Shar for the first time after Shar takes money from Leah. Michel confronts Shar for the first time in an attempt to get their money back from her.



Themes

Relationships

One of the primary themes running through the novel is relationships. The two primary relationships the novel tackles are romantic relationships and relationships between friends.

Friendship is one of the primary types of relationships the novel tackles. Even though Natalie and Leah have been best friends since they were four years old, and even though they come from the same neighborhood, they have always lived very different lives. Natalie and Leah seem to struggle with their friendship because each of them thinks the other one is more grown up than the other.

Leah and Natalie are each living a secret life. Even though they are best friends, they don't confide their secrets to each other. The two women don't even confide their fears with each other. In a way, this makes it seem as if their friendship is a surface friendship rather than a deep and meaningful one.

The novel also touches upon romantic relationships. Leah and Michel are married. Even though they are married, they want different things for their lives. Michel wants to buy a home and have children. Leah doesn't want either of these things, but she also doesn't communicate her feelings to her husband. Instead, Leah keeps secrets from Michel, including secretly taking birth control pills so she doesn't get pregnant.

Frank and Natalie seem to have a very superficial marriage. They appear to have married because it was the thing to do for Frank, and because it was a social and financial step up fro Natalie, rather than the fact that they truly love each other. Natalie, too, is keeping secrets in her marriage. When Frank uncovers Natalie's secret, it puts their marriage in jeopardy.

Coming of Age

Another of the primary themes that run throughout the novel is growing up and coming of age, even against adversity, such as growing up in poverty or losing a father to cancer. Leah struggles with the aftermath of her father's death to cancer, which leaves her constantly questioning what direction she wants her life to take and which direction her life is actually going. Because of her loss, Leah has a hard time forming bonds and relationships with people. Instead, Leah's coming of age forces her to lie and keep secrets from the people she supposedly loves.

Natalie too struggles with her coming of age. She is trying to break out of the impoverished home where she grew up. Natalie's coming of age also causes her to face an identity crisis. Natalie's search for the person she truly is even propels her to change her name so that she blends in more with her schoolmates and work colleagues. Natalie



too starts keep secrets from a young age and continues to do so throughout her adulthood.

Culture

One of the sub-plots throughout the entire novel is about the cultural differences between the residents in London. There is an emphasis on the novel of the color of each person' skin, the country where they come from and the cultural traditions for each.

Additionally, the plot is about how these various cultures and people with different backgrounds come together. They all have to learn how to live, work and play in harmony. For some, this seems to be easy, while others seem to struggle with the fact that people from India, Africa and other countries are now numerous in London. While the cultures of this area have numerous differences, they also have similarities because in the end, all of the people are human beings.

The individuals that come from the NW neighborhood are another cultural point in the novel. Natalie, Shar, Leah and Nathan all grew up in the NW neighborhood. While Leah and Natalie were able to go to college and make something out of their lives, Shar and Nathan chose a different path. Nathan and Shar chose a life of crime and drugs. This facts points out that some of what happens to people in life is nurture and some is nature. All of these people had similar experiences as children but turned out very different as adults.



Style

Point of View

The novel is written in the third-person point of view, from the perspective of the author, Zadie Smith. The point of view of this novel is intimate, allowing a reader to connect closely with each of the main characters in the novel. The book written in this manner allows the reader to get inside each character's head, thoughts and inner struggles. The point of view also allows the author to inject her own opinions into the narration and to expand on the events taking place around the characters and the occurrences taking place.

Setting

The novel takes place in London, specifically the NW neighborhood, during the 21st century. The main characters are involved in the daily life of living after growing up and coming from the same neighborhood in their childhoods.

The setting of this novel works well with the plot. At first, the reader is not aware how each of the characters is connected to one another. However, as events unfold, the NW neighborhood where they all come from is a constant part of the plot, the lives of the characters and even the outcome of the novel.

Language and Meaning

The language of this novel is relatively simple and easy to read. The language is from the 21st century, which is when the novel is set. The language is descriptive enough that it helps to explain the situations and is detailed enough for the reader to truly understand. Since the novel is based in London, there are some terms and words that are British English, as opposed to American English. There is also a lot of slang used throughout the novel.

Structure

The novel is divided into 23 chapters in the first half of the novel. The second half of the novel is divided by addresses in the NW neighborhood and specific street locations. Each chapter ranges from 10 to 20 pages long. The chapters tell the story primarily in exposition and with some dialogue. The author injects her own voice and thoughts throughout the book, providing her opinions and feelings of the events unfolding in the novel. The narrator switches back and forth between the past and the present.



The novel contains one main plot and several subplots. The main plot concerns human relationships, including romantic ones and friendships. One subplot is the coming of age of the characters. Another subplot is culture.
