Plot Summary

Party Princess is a novel in the Princess Diaries' series by author Meg Cabot. The story follows the main character, Amelia "Mia" Thermopolis as she tries to balance her high school problems with having a boyfriend in college.

Mia struggles with juggling her duties as a royal, such as her princess lessons with Grandmere, with her role in student government where she has to raise money to pay for the senior class commencement ceremony. Additionally, Mia is dealing with having her boyfriend, Michael, attend his first year of college while they continue their relationship. Specifically, Mia thinks that Michael wants her to be more mature and more of a party girl, similar to the girls that he knows in college. When Michael decides to have a party at his parents' apartment, Mia decides that she should dress and act like a party girl.

While Mia is trying to figure out how to raise the five thousand dollars she needs to rent the hall for the commencement ceremony, Grandmere decides to force Mia to star in a musical that Grandmere has written. In the end, Grandemere gets her island and Mia is able to raise the money that she needs for the commencement ceremony, but in the process, she learns that she can accomplish her goals by telling the truth rather than being manipulative.

Mia is also dating, Michael, who is Lilly's brother. Since Michael is a freshmen in college, Mia is worrying that she isn't as cool as the girls Michael is interacting with in college.

Mia tries to continue to be a normal teenager, but her princess duties always seem to get in the way. She also has a tendency to overanalyze situations, which causes her to have wild moods swings, from one extreme to another.

Michael Moscovitz

Michael Moscovitz is a freshmen in college in New York City at Columbia University. Michael is also the older brother of Amelia's best friend, Lilly. Michael is tall and handsome. He and Mia having been dating for the last year and half as the novel unfolds.

Michael loves music and he is also very smart. Michael decides to throw a party at his parent's apartment. This propels Mia to try to figure out how she should act as a "party girl" because she wants to meet Michael's expectations and be cool in the eyes of his friends.

Michael also finds out that his parents are separating during the novel. He is trying to juggle the problems with his family, relationship with Mia and take his midterm exams in school, simultaneously. In the end, Michael tells Mia that he loves her just the way she is and he doesn't want a party girl.

Lilly Moscovitz

Lilly Moscovitz is Mia's best friend and Michael's younger sister. Lilly seems to be very self-centered. She is very caught up in the cause of not allowing the school administration to control the students. Lilly also hosts her own cable network show. Additionally, in the novel Lilly puts together a literary magazine for the school so that they can raise the money the student government needs to pay for the commencement



ceremony. Lilly suspects that her parents are separating but they haven't told her this for sure. Because Lilly is bottling up her feelings about her parents having problems, she is being mean to Mia and acting out in general.

Grandmere

Grandmere is a dowager princess. She is Mia's paternal grandmother. She is in her 70s. Grandmere has made it her job to teach Mia how to be a proper princess. Grandmere has eyebrows that are painted on and her dog, Rommel is always with Grandmere. She is always meddling in Mia's life.

During the novel, Gandmere writes a musical that is based on Mia's great, great, great, great and then some grandmother's life. Grandmere forces Mia to play the leading female role. It is all an effort for Grandmere to win the bid on an island she is trying to buy off Dubai that is in the shape of Genovia.

Mom

Mia's mom is rather eclectic. She is married to Mia's algebra teacher and they have a one-year-old baby. Mia's mom was in love with Mia's dad, but refused to marry him because of the rules she would have to live by as a royal. After they broke up, Mia's mom found out she was pregnant with Mia, but never tells Mia's father. Since having Mia's baby brother, Mia's mom seems to be in a constant state of tiredness. When Mia's mom finds out Grandmere is forcing Mia to be in the musical, Mia's mom threatens to call Mia's father to put a stop to it. Mia talks her mother into not contacting her father because Mia is doing the play so that Grandmere won't tell the senior class valedictorian that Mia squandered the commencement money on buying recycling bins for the school.

Mr. G is the algebra teacher at Mia's school. He is also Mia's stepdad. He seems to be a quiet and laidback man. Mr. G is also the father of Mia's baby brother.

Tina

Tina is one of Mia's friends. Tina is the daughter of an oil sheikh. Tina is also a romantic, so she is always reading romance novels and dishing out romance advice. She is dating Boris, so she is often kissing and making out with Boris. Mia turns to Tina for advice on her relationship with Michael.



Lana

Lana is Mia's arch enemy. Lana and Mia try to make each other's lives terrible. Lana ends up blackmailing Mia for invitations to Grandmere's benefit in exchange for Lana not telling the valedictorian that the student government is broke. Lana was running against Mia as class president, but lost. Mia asks Lana's advice on how to be a party girl.

Rocky

Rocky is Mia's baby brother. He is tall and overweight for his age. He is about a year old. He only has two words in his vocabulary and eats whatever food his parents are eating. Mia is concerned because Rocky still isn't walking on his own and only says two words. Mia feels he should be more advanced at his age, while Mia's mom continuously reassures Mia that Rocky is progressing normally for his age.

Amber Cheeseman

Amber Cheeseman is the valedictorian for the senior class at Mia's school. Amber also does some form of karate. Mia is worried that Amber is going to kill her when Amber finds out that the student government doesn't have the money to rent the commencement hall for graduation. In the end, Amber is the one that tells Mia that Mia is a real party girl, which forces Mia to realize that a party girl is all in the eye of the beholder.



Objects/Places

Genovia

Genovia is the country, or French principality, where Mia and her father are the prince and princess. They speak French, so Mia has to learn the language when she finds out that she is part of the royal family. A land developer in Dubai creates an island off Duabi that looks like Genovia, so Grandmere is bidding to buy the island during the novel.

Manhattan

Mia grew up and still lives in Manhattan in a loft with her mother and stepfather. Mia spent her whole life in Manhattan until she found out that her father is a prince and she is a princess. The city represents Mia's normal life as a teenager because she gets to be herself, attend school, go out with her friends and live more of a normal life when she is in Manhattan.

Albert Einstein High School

Albert Einstein High School is the private school in Manhattan that Mia and her friends attend. They have to wear school uniforms to school. Mia has her limo pick up Lilly each morning so they can drive to school together. This is also the school that Mia is the student government president for, and for which Mia has to raise the money for the rental of the hall for the senior class commencement ceremony.

Journal

Mia is constantly writing in her journal. In fact, the novel is formatted as journal entries written by Mia. Mia writes in her journal in school, at home and in the limo.

Limo

The limo is Mia's transportation to and from school and anywhere else she needs to go. She has a driver and a bodyguard that travels with everywhere in the limo. Mia also gets to spend time with Lilly because they ride to and from school with Mia.

Plaza

The Plaza is the hotel where Grandmere has a suite while she is in New York. This is where Mia goes to have her princess lessons with Grandmere. The Plaza Grand Ballroom is where Grandmere holds the auditions and rehearsals for the musical.



Recycling Bins

Mia approves the purchase of recycling bins for the school. The purchase of these bins depletes the money the student government has to pay for the commencement ceremony hall rental. When JP tries to help Mia destroy the literary magazine issues, he tells her to put the paper in the crusher of the can portion of the recycling bins to shred the paper.

Beer

At Michael's party, Mia gets a bottle of beer out of the fridge. She sips it slowly while standing around at the party trying to socialize with the other guests. JP brings Mia the bottle of beer after Mia embarrasses herself sexy dancing in front of everyone at the party. Mia initially drinks the beer from the advice she received from Lana telling her how to be a party girl.

Fat Louie's Pink Butthole

Fat Louie's Pink Butthole is the name Lilly chooses for the school literary magazine. The issue is to feature different works from students. Lilly decides to sell the issues of the magazine to raise the money the student government needs for the graduation ceremony. The principal ends up confiscating the issues of the magazine because Lilly didn't get approval from the staff advisor before publishing some of the stories, or for naming the magazine.

Cell Phone

Mia has a cell. She is only supposed to use it, however, for emergency purposes. When Mia finds out that Grandmere cast her in the lead female role of the musical, Mia uses her cell phone to call and leave Grandmere an angry message. Grandmere returns Mia's call on the cell phone.



Themes

Relationships

One of the primary themes running through the novel is relationships. The novel reveals that even the individuals that make up a family have different relationships among the family members. For example, Mia and her father, and Mia and her mother, have a closer relationship than Mia has with her grandmother. Even Mia's father seems to have a troubled relationship with Grandmere.

Friendship is another type of relationship the novel tackles. Mia has very close friends—friends she had before she found out that she is a princess. Some of her friends, namely Lilly, have a hard time dealing with the fact that she is a member of a royal family. Eventually, Mia's friends learn to treat her the same that they have always treated her.

Romantic relationships are also tackled in the novel. Mia has her first true love and romantic relationship with Michael. Mia, however, is trying to learn how to deal with having a boyfriend that is in college while she is still in high school.

Coming of Age

One of the primary themes that run throughout the novel is growing up and coming of age, even against struggling with trying to maintain the life of a normal teenager while also being a princess. Mia struggles with the fact that her coming of age includes her having to carry out duties as a princess that interfere with the things she wants to do as a teenager. Mia is also trying to fix a monetary problem the student government faces because Mia approved the purchase of recycling bins for the school that depleted the bank account—and has left them broke and unable to pay for the graduation ceremony hall rental. Mia deals with finding a way to raise the money to replenish these funds.

Additionally, each of the characters in the novel is dealing with the coming of age of dealing with high school and their teenage years of dating. This forces several of the characters to deal with adult issues, such as how boyfriends and girlfriends should interact with each other. Mia especially struggles with her feelings about herself as a person and how Michael truly feels about her compared to the girls that go to college with him.

Family

Family is the central theme throughout the entire novel. This is because the storyline is about the lives of this particular family—the royal Genovian family. While every family has their trials and tribulations, Mia's family has its own family dynamics that are the



same and that are different from those of other families. In the end though, they are a family and they will get through it together, one way or the other.



Style

Point of View

The novel is written in the first person point of view, from the perspective of main character, Amelia Thermopolis. The novel swings back and forth between the present and the past. The present represents the time after Mia becomes a princess. The past represents the time leading up her finding out she is a princess.

The point of view of this novel is intimate, allowing a reader to connect closely with the main character, Mia. The book written in this manner allows the reader to get inside Mia's head, thoughts and inner struggles because the novel is composed of Mia's journal entries and letters Mia writes. The reader cares what happens to the narrator. The point of view also allows the author to inject her own opinions into the narration and to expand on the events taking place around the other characters and the occurrences taking place.

Setting

The primary setting is Manhattan in New York City. The novel is set during the 21st century. The main characters are involved in the trials and tribulations of dealing with their high school years. Mia is constantly trying to live a normal teenage life, while balancing her duties as a princess.

The setting of this novel works well with the plot. At first, the reader is not aware that Mia is learning to juggle her princess duties, duties as student body president and having a relationship with a college boyfriend. However, as events unfold, her transition is a constant part of the plot, the lives of the characters and even the outcome of the novel.

Language and Meaning

The language of this novel is relatively simple and easy to read. The language is from the 21st century, which is when the novel is set. The language is descriptive enough that it helps to explain the situations and is detailed enough for the reader to truly understand.

Structure

The novel is divided into Mia's journal entries, so it is by dates, times and places. Each journal entry ranges from a few lines to 10 pages long. The journal entries tell the story primarily in exposition and with some dialogue. The narrator injects her own voice and



thoughts throughout the book, providing her opinions and feelings of the events unfolding in the novel.

The novel contains one main plot and several subplots. The main plot is that of human relationships—friendship and romantic. One subplot is the coming of age of the characters, primarily Mia. Another subplot is family relationships.
