Plot Summary

"Red Lily: In the Garden Trilogy" by Christopher McDougall is the the story of a ghost that haunts a house until it is avenged.

Hayley is a single mother who has found herself in a wonderful situation. She lives with a very distant cousin and friends in the beautiful Harper House. Hayley feels very fortunate to have her friends in her life because they give her the opportunity to work at the nursery and they help her take care of her daughter. They are like family to her.

Harper House is a beautiful old house, but it is haunted by a ghost. The ghost, Amelia Connor, is drawn to the children in the house. Hayley sees her when the ghost comes to sing to Lily. Amelia isn't always pleasant. Sometimes she is scary and harmful to the adults, but she would never harm the children.

Hayley is very attracted to Harper, the son of her friend Roz. Her daughter loves the man as well. She visits with him one evening and kisses him. As she walks home, Hayley become uncharacteristically angry and snaps at her daughter. She feels horrible about it later and doesn't know what came over her. Back in the carriage house where Harper lives, he is dreaming about kissing Hayley when the ghost trashes his kitchen.

Soon it becomes apparent to everyone that Amelia is possessing Hayley. She says mean and spiteful things. Hayley tries to fight back mentally, but sometimes she catches glimpses of the ghost. They know she has to be put to rest, but they don't know how or even who she really is.

Harper and Hayley become even closer, and they realize that they are in love. He buys her a bracelet she is drawn to. Through a series of events, they discover that the bracelet once belonged to Amelia. As their love grows, Amelia becomes more aggressive. She appears with a blade and rope and flings Harper into a wall. She also gets into Hayley's head, encouraging her to steal from her friends.

Hayley fights back with the help of her friends. They remind her that she is strong and Harper is strong, too. Roz tells Hayley that she feels fortunate to be able to watch her son fall in love with someone she, herself, loves. She reminds Hayley that Harper was there, holding her hand when Lily was born. Hayley is very moody and learns that she is pregnant. Harper proposes to her, and they begin to plan their wedding. The growing relationship between the two sets Amelia off, and Hayley gets more frequent glimpses into Amelia's life. She is finally put to rest in the family graveyard.

They know they need to find Amelia's missing body so they can put her to rest. Together they go to the old nursery and Hayley is possessed by Amelia. She learns that the woman had tried to hang her baby son as well as herself, but a nursemaid saved the child. As death surrounds her, Amelia floats into a dark and cold space. When Hayley tells the others about this, Harper realizes that it's probably the pond. He dives down, searching for her and finds her.

Prologue - Chapter 4 Summary

"Red Lily: In the Garden Trilogy" by Christopher McDougall is the the story of a ghost that haunts a house until it is avenged.

In the Prologue, it's January of 1893 in Memphis. A woman who was once beautiful and clever is now destitute, desperate and demented. She was the mistress of a powerful man, and her life was filled with riches, servants and fabulous friends. People once envied her — a thrilling feeling for the daughter of a housemaid. Things changed.

She has a son and at first she doesn't want him, but her feelings change. He becomes the only thing she loves more than she loves herself. She looks forward to his birth, and she doesn't mind the pain of delivery since she knows it is followed by joy. The woman is told that she delivered a girl, and the girl is stillborn. She knows they lie to her.

Grieving, the woman sinks into despair and madness. Reginald took her son. Months after she gives birth, he finishes their affair. He doesn't need her anymore now that he had his son. Reginald tries to pay her off with money and a trip to England, but she wants him to pay in a different way. Now she is penniless. The woman dresses up in a gray dress and fixes her hair. She is ready to go to Harper House to take back what is rightfully hers.

Getting to the house is expensive, but she feels it's worth the cost so her son James can come back with her in comfort. At the house, she knocks on the door and tells the man who answers that she is there for James. He says there is no James in residence. The woman pushes past him and meets up with the master's wife, Beatrice. The woman says she pities Amelia Connor and wishes she hadn't had her brat foisted on her. Amelia asks for her son back, and Beatrice kicks her out of the house.

She comes back later during the cold night. Amelia is wearing a white nightdress, and she is ready to kill them all and take her sweet James. She knows that she can't do it, however. She thinks of another way for them to pay. She goes to the carriage house to get what she needs then moves toward the house, singing to her baby.

In Chapter 1, it's July 2005 in Harper House. Hayley is exhausted, but every time she stops rocking, her daughter Lily begins to squirm. It's 4 o'clock in the morning, and she has already been up twice before to soothe her fretful daughter. She thinks about how tough it is for single mothers and wonders if she would have made it if she were all on her own. Thankfully, she has friends who are willing to help. These friends are so close that she considers them family. She lives in a beautiful Harper House, has a great job, and has a wonderful friend who cooks their meals. Logan and Stella were recently married, and Mitch and Roz were on their honeymoon. Haylee knows that she should probably find a new place to live. She wishes she could find a place close by, even on



the property like the carriage house where Harper lives. Harper is an extremely attractive friend who is Roz's son. He is amazing with Lily, and he's very smart.

Lily is finally asleep so Hayley tries to get some rest as well. She wakes up hearing some singing. The room is ice cold. She sees a figure in a gray dress singing an old lullaby. She hasn't seen the ghost for several weeks and doesn't know what to say. She reminds herself to note all the details of this experience so she can share them with Mitch. Hayley has seen the ghost acting crazy, but right now she seems calm. She tells the ghost that Lily had her inoculations that day so she is fussy. She tells the ghost it is all right to go.

David fixes her some blueberry pancakes for breakfast and comments on her tired visage. She tells him they had a visitor the night before. He is concerned, and she reassures him. Hayley comments that she feels that she is getting into a rut, and David suggest that she get some new shoes. She also decides to go get a new haircut. After a day of primping and shopping, she comes back feeling like a new woman. At work, she daydreams about finding someone to love. Harper interrupts her musings and tells her that his mother is home.

In Chapter 2, Hayley goes up to the house to see Roz. The honeymoon was wonderful, and they came back bearing gifts. Roz says that she likes to think of herself as an honorary grandmother to Lily. Hayley mentions that she's looking for someplace to live, and Roz tells her she wants her to stay.

David is making a special welcome home dinner that evening, and Hayley enjoys dressing up for it. She feels like a new person who is back in the game.

Harper is downstairs thinking about how happy he is for his mother. He thinks Hayley looks amazing, but tries to tell himself not to think about it since she is sort of a cousin as well as an employee. He knows he has to keep the relationship at friendship level.

It's great being back together with everyone. Hayley thinks about families. She thinks of Harper and what it would be like if he were married, and it makes her ache inside. After dinner, the children go out to play and the adults gather together to talk about Amelia. Mitch is bringing them up to date on his research. They have a hard time tracking down any solid evidence, but there is a grandmother who remembers comments from her own mother and a cousin who worked at Harper House. The adults in the room figured that Amelia had died on the property. They figured that she is haunting the house until she is avenged, but don't know how.

Hayley tells them that she saw the ghost the previous night. Mitch records her story as she talks about the singing. She also mentions a time when she looked out the window and saw the ghost walking toward the carriage house.

Before Hayley goes to bed, she and Harper go to check on Lily. The room is cold, and she sees the ghost sitting in a rocking chair once again. When she turns to look at Hayley, her eyes are bulging and her rims are violent red. Hayley speakes, and the form



begins to disintegrate until it is only a skeleton wearing rags. Harper offers to stay with Hayley that evening, but she tells him she will be all right.

In Chapter 3, Harper seeks Hayley out the next day, knowing he can't be obvious about his concern for her. He asks for some help with his work In the grafting house. As they work, she flirts with him and likes the way he reacts to her flirting.

When they are finished working together, Harper takes a swim in the pond. It is something he has done since childhood. He decides to distract himself by going out, but when he gets home, he doesn't feel like going out anymore. He loves his house and the flowers that surround it. The flowers make them think of Lily and how much he loves her. David comes over to see if he wants to go out with him, but he declines. While they are talking, Hayley and Lily walk by. Lily runs to Harper in delight. She calls him da-da, and Hayley is extremely embarrassed.

In Chapter 4, Hayley is having a hard time concentrating at work. She is feeling abnormally low, and doesn't know what's wrong with her. When Stella comes to talk with her, she admits to Stella that she likes Harper. She can't believe she has fallen for Roz's son and feels as if it's wrong. Stella reassures her.

A few days later, Hayley is watching a black and white romantic movie. She begins having a daydream about herself and Harper, and the scene shifts and becomes very realistic. The lilies in her daydream become roses, and strange thoughts go through her head. She is now a woman in control of the man she is pleasuring. She sees her blonde hair. Hayley panics and pulls herself out of the dream, hearing laughter as she grasps her own dark hair. She runs downstairs and sees Mitch. She asks him to get Roz. While she is waiting she sees a picture of Reginald and asks Mitch it it really is Reginald.

They talk about the dreams Stella once had. The dreams became more disturbing over time, and it was in the streams at Amelia told them her name. Hayley tells them that Amelia is moving on to her. She tells them what just happened. The man in her dream is Reginald.

Prologue - Chapter 4 Analysis

In the Prologue, the book opens with a scene from the past. It's a tragic scene about a woman who once had power and beauty who became insane after her child was taken from her. It was a child she hadn't even wanted at first, but he became the only thing that she ever could love aside from herself. She enters Harper House and has a confrontation with the mistress of the house who is now raising her son unwillingly. The reader finds out that the name of the insane woman is Amelia Connor. The reader also understands that the woman is going to do something drastic, but doesn't know exactly what she is going to do. This sets up the mystery of the story.

In Chapter 1, a little more than 100 years later, Hayley is living in Harper House. She lives a good life, surrounded by friends who are so close they could be family. She doesn't take her situation for granted, and she reflects on what it would have been like if



she had to raise her daughter on her own. This chapter introduces the reader to the main characters of the book - everyone living in Harper House and on its grounds. While reading this chapter, the reader discovers that Hayley sees the ghost on a regular basis, and the ghost is very unstable.

In Chapter 2, Hayley loves her job, working in a nursery. She also loves the people who own the place. They love her and her daughter Lily as well. All of the people in Harper House are familiar with the ghost in the house, and they have decided to work together to figure out why she is haunting the place. Mitch is in charge of the research, and they all agree to share every detail regarding their experiences with the ghost with each other. The first time the ghost is mentioned in this book, she is calm. In this chapter, Harper and Hayley go to check on Lily, and the ghost's face is scary. She disintegrates in front of them until she is a skeleton in rags. Harper offers to stay with Hayley, offering security, but even though she is attracted to him, she turns the offer down. She can face her troubles on her own.

In Chapter 3, even though he respected Hayley's wishes to stay alone that night, Harper is concerned for her and finds an excuse to check up on her the next day. They are both attracted to each other, but don't realize it. Hayley flirts with him, and he jumps into the pond. It's a place he has gone to since he was young.

This chapter gives the reader a glimpse of the closeness between Harper and Lily. He can't understand the depth of love he feels for the little girl, and she calls him da-da.

In Chapter 4, something is going on with Hayley. She feels strange and unusually depressed. She thinks it might be because she is attracted to Harper and doesn't want to act on her feelings. There might be more to it, though. The ghost manages to get into her dream state, and she gets a glimpse into the ghost's thoughts. Even though her dream is unnerving, Hayley is quick to share the details with the others in the household.



Chapters 5-9

Chapters 5-9 Summary

In Chapter 5, Hayley looks outside Stella's kitchen window, watching the summer evening activities as Lily plays with Logan. It's an evening filled with lazy contentment, and she remembers days like this when she was a child. Now she is the mother.

She talks with Stella about how good life is, and she dreams about how wonderful it would be to have someone as crazy about her as Logan is of Stella. She tells Stella that she doesn't know what's wrong with her lately, but she keeps getting caught in a "poorme" routine. She asks Stella to give her a smack next time she starts feeling sorry for herself.

That's the kind of personality she has. When her mother left, she learned to survive. She and her dad had a great life together, and she had done well in school and had gotten a good job. When her father died, she struggled, turning to a friend for comfort. Lily was a result of that, but she felt as if it was a positive thing. She didn't even tell Lily's father because she didn't want to ruin his life—he was moving on and getting married to someone else. Instead of feeling down, she moved on to raise the child on her own, although it hadn't worked out like that. Hayley comes up with an idea to make things better. She wanted to act, even if she failed.

Walking down the path, Hayley let Lily go. The girl ran to Harper's front door. They knocked, and Hayley stepped aside so when Harper opened the door, all he saw was Lily. He greets her then Hayley steps out, and he invites them into the house. They talk about her dream, and Hayley tells him that Harper looks like Reginald. She says she was extra sensitive to how similar they looked because the daydream began with her thinking about Harper. She kisses him. They agree that they are both interested in each other but want to take things slowly.

On the way back to the house, Lily is throwing a temper tantrum, and Hayley snaps at her. The house seems like a far-away mirage. Roz comes into view, and she snaps back into focus, feeling nauseous. Later, after she tucks Lily in, she talks with Roz. Hayley says she doesn't know what's wrong with her - it's like she's feeling pregnant again, but that's not a possibility since she isn't having sex. Roz says maybe she should, and she offers to babysit if Hayley wants to join the dating scene again. She also says that sex might be one of the keys to Amelia. When women in the household have sex, she gets more active. It's particularly strong when sexual energy is tied with love.

In the carriage house, Harper is thinking about the evening. He falls asleep and dreams about making love with Hayley. The dream is interrupted by crashing. The ghost had trashed his kitchen and written a message with ketchup saying, "I will not rest."



In Chapter 6, Mitch looks at photographs of Harper's destroyed kitchen. He comments on the fact that the ghost has never entered the carriage house before. Hayley and Lily come in, and the guys don't hide the pictures fast enough. Hayley sees them and gets upset.

Later, at work, Hayley asks Stella for some manual labor since she can't think straight. She tells Stella that the incident in the carriage house was her fault since she pursed Harper there. It's extremely hot out, and Harper is concerned when he sees her doing heavy labor in the heat. He makes her rest, and he tries to kiss her, but she fends him off. Hayley says they should stay friends and not throw sex into the mix. He is upset and argues with her.

Her vision wavers, and she feels like she is looking at Harper through a wave of heat as anger within her spikes. She spews vile words out, and he notices that her eyes changed. She becomes a seductress. Harper tells Hayley he likes her just the way she is. She vaguely remembers what she said and feel ill. They go home and talk to the others. Harper tells them Amelia was talking through Hayley.

In Chapter 7, the three woman are talking together, and Hayley admits to Roz that she put the moves on Harper. She is very apologetic, and Roz tells her that Harper is a grown man and can make his own decisions. Hayley admits that she feels guilty because she thinks she brought on the ghost's attack. Roz says that Harper will be able to handle it. Hayley tells the others what happened at work, explaining how she sort of faded back when words came out of her mouth that she didn't put there. They were ugly words. Stella reminds her that it wasn't really Hayley speaking.

Hayley is very unnerved. She turns to the Internet to find out more about ghosts and possession. Harper comes to visit her, and he tells her how much he wants to be with her. He doesn't want the ghost to separate them. She tries to pretend she's not interested, but when they kiss, it's very obvious that she still is interested.

She sees Amelia in the doorway with a storm raging around and through her. She looks bloody and filthy and carries a long, curved blade in one hand and a rope in her other hand. Her face is filled with rage. Harper moves forward to tell the ghost that she is dead, and he is hit with a blow that sends him five feet back into a wall. Hayley runs forward and tells the ghost that she can't harm Harper. He is her great-great-grandbaby, and she used to sing to him. Hayley is sent sprawling by a gust of wind, and she hears a scream then the ghost is gone. Both she and Harper hear singing over the baby monitor. Amelia is sitting in the rocking chair, looking neat, calm, and quiet. Her face is filled with grief and what Hayley thinks is a look of regret.

They talk about their relationship, and Harper invites Hayley out to dinner. He decides to sleep in Stella's old room that night so they can sleep easier. Hayley realizes that she cares about him more than she thought she would. She thinks about how she didn't really want her baby at first, but after the panic, anger and denial, she realized she wanted her baby. She realizes she can have it all. She can play the man until he comes begging, and Harper House will finally be hers and her child's, at last.



In Chapter 8, the next day Hayley talks to Roz about the weird dreams she is having. Mitch comes in and tells them that he thinks he found her and asks them to get together with the others. Before he leaves, he tells them that the ghost's name is Amelia Connor, and she was born in Memphis on May 12, 1868. There is no death certificate on record.

The adults gather together, and Mitch tells them how he came acRoz the name. They discovered that Amelia's mother worked at a house called The Willows, owned by the Lucerne family. Roz says that she will smooth the way as they try to get information from the people who own The Willows.

Hayley hasn't been on a date in a long time and she thoroughly enjoys it. She tells Harper about Lily's father and her relationship with her own father. She tells him how she went to see Lily's father to tell him about the baby, and he was telling her how he fell in love with somebody so she didn't tell him. She had planned to name her daughter Eliza, but when Harper brought red lilies into the room after the baby was born, they were so beautiful that she named her daughter Lily.

When they get home from the date, Hayley discovers that her bedroom is completely torn apart. Nothing is damaged, but all the clothes from her drawers and closet are heaped on the bed. She begins to put things away and wishes she could afford better fabrics and designer labels. Roz has incredible quotes and jewels, and she wouldn't notice if some were missing. She stands in front of the mirror and talks to the reflection saying that it isn't her. She doesn't know what the ghost needs or how she gets inside of her, but Amelia can't make her take things from her friends.

In Chapter 9, Hayley is happy to be working since Amelia doesn't seem to be interested in visiting her work. She makes a list for Mitch documenting every time and every place where she wasn't herself. A woman comes into the shop, and its cousin Jane. She has had a complete makeover and look fabulous. It's a very happy reunion for everyone. By the time they hit August, everything seems very peaceful. Amelia could be heard singing in the baby's room, but there have been no signs of any problems. They wonder if identifying who she was is enough to make her leave them alone. Stella talks with Hayley about her relationship with Harper, and Hayley tells her that she is waiting for Harper to make the next move.

Harper is talking with David, telling him that it's hard for him to take things slowly. David recommends that Harper take her out to a fancy dinner and get a hotel room. He invites her, and she gets dressed up, but has no idea what's really in store for her. Before she leaves, she looks in the mirror and sees herself in a red dress, but it's not the one that she put on. This one is long, and her hair is arranged in elaborate blonde curls. She tells the apparition that she isn't her. As she walks away, she reminds herself that she know who she is, and she knows who Amelia is, and they aren't the same. When she looks back at the mirror, she is herself.



Chapters 5-9 Analysis

Chapter 5 offers the reader more insight into Hayley's background and personality. She craves calmness and family time, and she isn't a complainer. She is a survivor who understands and appreciates love in its various forms. This is important because it's in contrast to the woman Amelia is full of discontent.

Hayley is a woman who takes action. When she is alone and pregnant, she doesn't wallow in self-pity. Instead, she moves on to find a home and job. She doesn't use people. The reader knows that Amelia used men, getting what she could from them. In contrast, Hayley doesn't even tell Lily that he has a child because he is in love with someone else, and she doesn't want to ruin his life.

When Hayley snaps at Lily, the reader understand that this is not normal for her. Something is going on. As the chapter ends, Amelia moves into a new arena - the carriage house.

In Chapter 6, the adults in the house work together. They are friends, family, and researchers together. It's a tight-knit group. When Hayley starts acting strangely, they share the details together and don't hold things against her. They realize that Hayley is possessed by the ghost at times, but want to help her rather than shun her.

In Chapter 7, Hayley feels conflicted. She is falling for Harper, but has a hard time not feeling guilty about this with Roz. It's particularly bad when she has to admit that she said horrible things to Harper. Roz is very reassuring, reminding her that it's not her words when she is nasty. It's Amelia talkign through her.

In this chapter, the reader sees that Amelia can affect people physically as she thrusts Harper against the wall. Still, even after a raging appearance, she appears calm around the children. They know she won't ever hurt the children. As the chapter ends, Amelia begins to take over Hayley's thought processes so seamlessly that the reader only knows the transition because the thoughts aren't true to Hayley's personality.

In Chapter 8, the adults find out more about Amelia and are determined to find out what happened to her. They have a birth date, but no death date.

Harper invites Hayley on a date, and the reader sees the family-like connection between Harper and Hayley and her daughter. He doesn't know it before this point, but influenced the naming of the girl.

At the end of the chapter, Amelia once again takes over Hayley's thoughts. This time, Hayley fights back mentally. The ghost is trying to tempt her to steal from her friends, but Hayley is stronger than that. Her love for her friends is more powerful, and she refuses to listen to the ghost.

In Chapter 9, work becomes a respite for Hayley since Amelia isn't interested in going there. Things are more peaceful than they have been in a while. The relationship



between Hayley and Harper is getting stronger, and they decide to go out for a special dinner. As Hayley prepares to leave, she sees Amelia in the mirror for the first time. She reminds herself that she isn't the ghost.

In Chapter 10, Harper and Hayley go to dinner in Memphis to a place where she has never eaten before. He leads her past the dining room and upstairs where a room is filled with flowers, candles, champagne, and wonderful food. They spend an amazing night together. The next day, she looks in the gift shop to buy some gifts to thank her friends for taking care of Lily. She is drawn to a beautiful diamond and ruby bracelet with heart-shaped stones, and Harper decides to buy it for her. She is worried about the cost and tries to persuade him not to get it, but he insists.

In Chapter 11, Hayley has a hard time talking with Roz when they get home because they are talking about her son. Roz encourages the relationship and compliments Hayley on her new bracelet. Hayley admits that she is in love with Harper, and Roz says she already knows.

She tells Hayley that love is a gift to be taken and received freely. Hayley responds by saying that love is a lie. Roz shudders and asks if that's how she justifies the choices she makes. She finds out that the other woman made life, her son. Now she is there to get her son. Roz tells her that her son is long gone. He was her grandfather and a good man. The other one responds that she should have killed his father. Roz asks what she did do, and the other woman says she came in at night and now everything is gone. They hear Lily crying through the monitor, and Hayley slides to the floor. Roz calls for the men, and Hayley says that she is dizzy, has a headache and feels nauseous.

When the men come in, they use a tape to record everything that just happened. Mitch points out that the woman was used to getting gifts for sex so that's how she related to the bracelet Hayley is wearing. They realize that Hayley is the conduit, most likely because she is a young mother. She tells them about seeing Amelia in the mirror the night before. As she thinks back, she realizes that the woman in the mirror wore a necklace of rubies and diamonds, and she also realizes that she wore the very same bracelet that she is now wearing. The bracelet is Amelias. Later, Harper tries to persuade Hayley to move out. She won't do it.

In Chapter 12, David and Harper feel like detectives. They are going to talk to an old woman about the bracelet since her mother owned it, and she sold it when she was settling her mother's estate. They discovered that the bracelet had once belonged to a wealthy man's mistress.

Harper talks with his mother about his relationship with Hayley. He tells her about his visit with the older woman who sold the bracelet. She expresses concern over what happened to Amelia, pointing out that she is their blood. As they reminisce together,



they realize that Amelia has done some mean things to them over the years—far longer than they previously realized. She is filled with hate and anger because she is trapped.

In Chapter 13, Harper is at work, thinking about Hayley. He realizes that she is The One for him. When his former girlfriend comes in and greets him, Hayley sees them together and becomes jealous. Later when they talk about it, Harper makes it very clear that she is the only one that he wants. She goes to make him something to eat, and thoughts that he is lying go through her head. He should pay. She tells herself those are not her thoughts, and she won't have them in her head.

In Chapter 14, Harper asks Hayley to spend the night with him that night. He sets up a portable crib for Lily in the spare room. He has some toys from his childhood for Lily to play with as well. They both admit to each other that they love each other.

After they tuck Lily in, they start to have sex. Hayley knows that she is loved. She rolls over on top of him and tells him that is what he wants, it's what they all want. He looks at her and realizes that it's not really Hayley speaking. He tries to push her off of him, and she tells him that she knows how to use the body better than Hayley. He speaks to Hayley, telling her that she is stronger than Amelia and she shouldn't let her do this. He kisses her and says he loves her, calling her by name. She comes back to him. Even though it's awkward, they tell Mitch what happened.

This is where Hayley lives. It's a beautiful place with lovely gardens. It's haunted by a ghost who loves children but can become violent to adults.

Nursery

This is a room that is rarely entered. It's on the third floor. It's where Amelia died.

Carriage House

This is where Harper lives. The ghost goes here to destroy his kitchen.

The Pond

This is where Harper played as a child. He goes here to find Amelia's body.

Bracelet

This is what Hayley is drawn to. Harper buys it for her, and they later learn that it belonged to Amelia.

Rocking Chair

This is what Amelia is in when she sings to the children.

Blade

Amelia is seen with this when she comes from the Carriage House. She uses it to draw blood.

This is what Amelia wraps around the baby's neck and around her own neck.

Ballroom

This is the room Amelia enters before heading toward the nursery. Walking through it makes her more angry and envious.

This is where Amelia was born and where Harper takes Hayley on a date.

The Willows

Harper goes here to learn about the jewelry he purchased for Hayley.

Grafting House

This is where Harper spends his time working. He is patiently making a new flower for Lily.



Themes

How Anger Destroys

Dealing with anger is a very important theme in this book. Amelia has been treated very unfairly and she is determined to get revenge. She was once the mistress of a very powerful man. She was pregnant with his son and grew to love the child. When the child was born, she was told that it was a stillborn girl, and the child was taken away. Determined to get her child back, she went to the house to ask for her son. She was rejected.

Her obsession with obtaining revenge leads to her own insanity. While she plans to curse others, she ends up cursed herself. Amelia is very confused and unhappy, and she lashes out at others. She has some satisfaction when she is able to enter Hayley's body, but Hayley fights against the spirit of anger. Hayley turns to her friends for help, and they stand by her, keeping the angry feelings at bay. Her friends remind her that she is stronger than Amelia and can overcome the negativities.

Amelia became enamored with her son as she felt his life growing within her. There was a true connection between mother and child that was strong enough to make her love him more than she had loved anything else before.

As Amelia's story comes too light, the members of the family are determined to find her body and put her to rest. They understand that she made some horrible choices in her lifetime. But they also know that she is their blood relative and should be treated with



some respect. After they find her body, they bury her in the family cemetery, along with her son's rattle and a picture of him.

The Power of Love

This story couldn't exist without love. The story shows how love can be a wonderful thing, and it also shows how it can lead to destruction. Amelia doesn't understand what love really is. She expects affection and gifts in return for sex and doesn't understand how someone can give gifts without expecting something in return. This is shown by her reaction of anger and bitterness after Harper gives the bracelet as a gift to Haley.

Amelia has an unhealthy love for her son. It borders on obsession and is a catalyst for anger and revenge after her son is taken away from her. She is so eager to get revenge and is so desperate to have her son with her forever that she is willing to kill both herself and her son. In her own insanity, she feels as if her love will keep them together forever even after death.

On the other hand, the love between family and friends is very healing and supporting. Hayley survives and overcomes the possession of the ghost thanks to the love offered her by the others at Harper House. She and Harper love each other, and it all begins with friendship. Style

Point of View

The story begins in the third-person subjective from the viewpoint of a woman who lived in Memphis in 1893. Because of this perspective, the reader sees events as they unfold, but they also have insight into the way, Amelia Connor thinks and feels.

Chapter 1 takes place in July of 2005 and the point-of-view shifts. It is still third person but it's now from Hayley's viewpoint. This holds true for most of the story, but every once in a while there are shifts in the point-of-view between Hayley, Amelia, Harper, and Roz. Sometimes the shift in the point-of-view occurs within a single paragraph.

Generally, the shift occurs in a natural manner so the reader doesn't get confused. However, the shifts between Amelia and Hayley can get confusing. This makes sense since Amelia possesses Hayley, sliding in and out of her mind. The reader comes to learn the finer nuances of the shift. Amelia's tone and language are harsh and bitter. She also refers to her son rather than a daughter.

Setting

"Red Lily: In The Garden Trilogy" by Nora Roberts takes place on an estate with beautiful grounds. The ghost haunts the house and is seen walking to the carriage house. Eventually she appears in the carriage house, wreaking havoc. There is a nursery nearby where the main characters work. The Bride doesn't go there so Hayley has a place of respite.

The house is very large, which is important to the story because many people can live there. There is a third story of the house that is rarely visited, adding to the mystery of the story.

Language and Meaning

The language of this novel is basic English. It covers life in the late 1800s and life in the early 21st century, and the language reflects this. The older language is more formal while the more modern dialogue is filled with typical modern bluntness. Each character has a unique style of speech, with Amelia's standing out because her verbiage is filled with anger and hate.

The author is descriptive, using interesting adjectives and adverbs that enhance a reader's vocabulary. Instead of saying something such as "She has dark hair," the author writes, "It's gorgeous hair, that glossy mahogany."



Structure

"Red Lily: In The Garden Trilogy" by Nora Roberts is the third book in a trilogy. After the copyright information, there is a list of all the books written by Nora Roberts. The books are arranged in categories such as single titles, series, and anthologies.

The dedication page is followed by some quotes then a prologue. The prologue takes place in the past and shows events that occurred in the ghost's life while she was living. Chapter One begins in 2005, and the rest of the book takes place in this time. The 20 chapters are numbered rather than named. They run between approximately 10 and approximately 20 pages. The last chapter is followed by an Epilogue. The epilogue is followed by the Table of Contents.
