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Plot Summary

The Royal Ranger – The Ranger's Apprentice by John A. Flanagan is the story of a princess who becomes the first female King's Ranger in the history of the kingdom of Araluen. Princess Madelyn, or Maddie as she is known, is a spoiled and privileged princess. She is a fifteen-year-old who finds the life of a princess boring. She is adept at tracking and hunting with her leather sling loaded with lead balls. Against her parent's orders, she sneaks out at night and hunts in the dark forest. She gives her prey to the sentries who appreciate the fresh fowl and game.

Maddie's parents confront her about her dangerous behavior. There are bears and other creatures in the forest as well as brigands and outlaws. She is particularly vulnerable to kidnapping because of her position in the monarchy. She is a royal princess and she is next in line to rule the kingdom following the ascension of her mother, Princess Cassandra, who soon take the throne because her father, King Duncan, is old and very ill and there is no hope for his recovery.

But Maddie is rebellious and argues with her parents about how she spends her time. She is not interested in sitting in her ivory tower sewing and doing needlework and polishing her tiara. She wants some excitement and drama in her life.

Will Treaty is a legendary and heroic King's Ranger. He was once a happy-go-lucky fellow but his wife was murdered and he is obsessed with avenging her death. He runs the risk of being suspended from the Ranger Corps because he has rejected missions and only wants to focus on finding and bringing to justice the murderers of his wife. Gilan, the Commandant of the Rangers, wants the old Will back and wants to find a way to shake him out of his doldrums.

Gilan (who heads the King's Rangers) and Halt (a wise, retired Ranger) devise a plan that will help both Maddie and Will. Halt is the first to suggest the controversial idea. He recommends that Maddie be named the first female Ranger and apprentice under Will. By training under Will, Maddie will learn discipline and will come to understand what dedication, humility and loyalty all mean. As for Will, he will be distracted from his grief by having a young trainee to challenge. She is sure to challenge him in many ways.

Although both parties are reluctant and unsure at first, they embark on this unusual undertaking. Maddie has to learn to leave her life of privilege behind and become subservient to Will who creates a stringent training program for her. At first she balks at doing menial chores and cleaning up after herself, but she learns that being a Ranger is more than just shooting straight. She comes to recognize that a Ranger is fit in mind, body and spirit.

Gilan sends them on a mission to find out who murdered another Ranger. Their investigation leads to unexpected results. Maddie proves herself to be worthy of the title of King's Ranger. Her parents are proud of her and reinstate her as a princess. Maddie understands the responsibility of being a princess and is dedicated to the kingdom, but



her first request after becoming a royal again is to be able to finish her Ranger training with Will.

Analysis

Chapter 1

A wagoner bullies his way into the free meal tent that is being sponsored by Squire Dennis of Scanlon. He is presented as rude and rugged and is obviously not one of the "good guys." A Ranger appears and accuses the wagoner of being responsible for the death of a Courier woman who burned to death in a fire that he and his gang started. The wagoner appears to be visibly shaken when he realizes that he is being confronted by a Ranger. His reaction indicates that the Rangers are respected and even feared.

The Ranger represents the kingdom and represents good versus the evil of the wagoner. The King's Ranger is Will Treaty. Although he has authority to arrest the man, he kills him during a struggle. Will Treaty does not seem to regret having killed the wagoner and appears to be bent on revenge. At this point, it is not clear if the revenge he seeks is the King's business or if it is personal in nature.

Chapter 2

Conflict exists between Princess Madelyn or Maddie and her parents, the Princess Regent Cassandra and Lord Horace. Like a typical fifteen-year-old, Maddie rebels against her parents' rules. She has an adventurous spirit and sneaks out at night to hunt in the forest. At her age she feels immortal and believes that nothing will happen to her. Her parents recognize the danger of a young girl hunting in the dark forest. This chapter foreshadows a clash between daughter and parents that is sure to erupt in succeeding chapters and play a role in the story line.

Chapter 3

It is apparent that Maddie knows that her parents disapprove of her nighttime hunting treks in the forest. She lies to her mother and father, telling them that she was just getting a snack in the kitchen. But, of course, they know better and remind her of the dangers that lurk in the forest. Not only are there dangerous bears and other animals, there are outlaws who could do her harm. She is particularly vulnerable because she is a princess and heir to the throne. Maddie has not fully realized the responsibility of her role in the kingdom. She could be kidnapped for a ransom. Maddie's parents try to impress upon her the importance of her position in the kingdom. But, like any young teen, she wants a more exciting life. Though many young girls would disagree, she does not feel the life of a princess meets that criteria.

Chapter 4

The Araluen Kingdom is in crisis which probably explains why Maddie's parents are so concerned with her careless behavior. King Duncan is ill and his death is imminent. Once he passes, Princess Cassandra will take over as ruler. Although there is peace now, a transition to a new monarch could tempt some pretenders to challenge the new Queen. If something were to happen to Cassandra, Maddie would become the ruler.



Lifelong friends, Halt and Pauline, were summoned to the castle but they don't know why. Halt is a retired Ranger and is a close friend to Cassandra and Horace. He always vowed to serve his king but he truly does not want to take on a new mission if it involves returning to the Rangers.

Chapter 5

Halt immediately senses that there is conflict between Maddie and her parents. He has an understanding heart and encourages them to be a little more understanding with the youngster. He reminds Cassandra that she was very much like the rebellious teenager. It's something that Cassandra may not want to hear but knows it's true. But Gilan has another problem child – Will Treaty. He is worried about him. Perhaps his concern has something to do with his encounter with the wagoner and the fire at the inn that caused the death of a woman.

Chapter 6

It now becomes clearer why Will is set on avenging the death of the woman in the fire. The woman was Alyss, his wife and soul-mate. She had died heroically when she ran into the fire to rescue a young girl. She was successful in getting the child out but she perished in the fire. The fire had been set by Jory Ruhl and his gang.

Will has been completely transformed by the tragedy. He was a happy-go-lucky man but now he is filled with anger and rage. Gilan is the leader of the Rangers and he wants the others to intervene and help Will get over his obsessive behavior.

Halt shows his wisdom when he blends two problems together and fashions one solution that will fix both. Maddie needs discipline in her life and Will needs something to live for other than revenge. He suggests that Maddie become a Ranger apprentice and that Will be her mentor. It is a controversial even unheard of proposition. But it could be just what both Will and Maddie need.

Chapter 7

Halt's intuition about Maddie is keener than that of her own parents. He knows that Maddie is not the type of girl who is happy to stay in her ivory tower to sew and do needlepoint and polish her tiara all day. Gilan wants to help Will return to his former self and, as leader of the Rangers, he needs Will's skills and abilities to defend the kingdom. Gilan shows his wisdom as a leader when he recognizes that even though Maddie will not be as big and strong as her male counterparts, she would have the advantages of speed and agility.

Chapter 8

Halt is a great mediator. He allows Maddie to show off her skills with weapons but at the same time he sternly reminds her of her duties as a princess. She may become a Ranger but she will always be a princess and her duty is to the kingdom. He shows his



respect for Maddie's parents by allowing them to tell Maddie about a surprising matter involving her.

Chapter 9

This chapter underscores how quickly and unexpectedly things can change in one's life. Maddie's rebelliousness resulted first in confinement to her room. Then it led to a place and experience she never would have dreamed of – her chance to be the first female Ranger and to train under Will Treaty. Knowing that she's still in the doghouse, she tries to hide her glee over the news so that her parents don't think they're rewarding her and change their minds.

Chapter 10

Halt again becomes the diplomat who wins Will over to the idea of having Maddie as his apprentice. Will is depressed over the loss of his wife. He cannot fathom ever being happy again and the thought of putting up with a spoiled princess and having the responsibility of making a Ranger out of her is the last thing Will wants to do. Halt and Gilan appeal to Will's sense of duty and his oath as a King's Ranger. The written appeal from Cassandra and Horace and the knowledge that Alyss would have wanted him to help them makes it impossible for him to reject the offer. But he accepts it reluctantly. His first priority of avenging Alyss' death remains the same.

Chapter 11

The old adage to be careful what you ask for because you just might get it applies here. It is a rude awakening for Maddie when she realizes that she is just an apprentice to Will. She thinks back to her life as a princess in her castle and, perhaps, regrets the behavior that led her to Will's rustic cabin in the woods. She recognizes that life was a lot easier being a princess than it will be as a Ranger apprentice. She will have no maid and no vast wardrobe. She will have to do chores and obey Will. Although Will has affection for Maddie, he knows that in order for her to become a good Ranger, he must separate her from her spoiled life and break her of her privileged demeanor.

Analysis

Chapter 12

Maddie has more lessons on what it is NOT to be a princess. Just like any spoiled and privileged child, she wants what she wants. She wants the freedom and excitement of hunting in the dark and honing her skills with weapons. However, she also wants a maid to clean up after her and a royal cook to prepare her special air-cured ham just the way she likes it. She likes the bread that Will has but doesn't like the notion that she will be the one who fetches it each morning from the baker. Princesses don't "fetch" things, but Ranger apprentices do. Although she is excited and intrigued by the turn of events, she has not fully accepted her new reality. Will has no intention of allowing her to pick and choose which part of being a Ranger's apprentice she likes. She's got to learn to be humble and obedient.

Chapter 13

Part of Maddie's adjustment to her new life is not all her fault. She is a princess and has been a princess all her life. She knows no other existence – yet. When she corrects Jenny by telling her that she should be addressed as "Your Highness" or "Princess" she is just following a protocol that she has been taught all her life. She really isn't being rude.

Will decides that he must show Maddie the letter from her parents that she has been temporarily disinherited by her parents. She is technically no longer a princess. Will knows that her parents are merely trying to help with her transition and have no intention of permanently disinheriting her. But, Maddie needs to be shaken a bit in order for her to understand that the training is serious and important.

Chapter 14

Will knows that appreciating the unique qualities of Ranger horses is something else that Maddie is going to have to learn.

Chapter 18

Maddie is beginning to learn that there is more to a horse than its beauty and speed. Although she puts Will's chunky little horse, Tug, down she sees that he has more stamina and lasting power than Sundancer. What she doesn't know is that the Rangers have an ability to communicate with their horses which probably comes in handy during a Ranger's battle with his enemies. Maddie is learning a lot but she still has more to learn. Becoming a Ranger is not just being skilled at weaponry it is also an internal and spiritual transition that she will acquire with time and with the right attitude.

Chapter 19

The Ranger horses have an almost magical quality about them. Tug communicates with Will although no words are spoken. Chapter 22

Maddie is doing well enough that Will expands her training even more. While Will is good for Maddie, she is good for him, too. He will never forget what happened to his wife and will never abandon his quest to avenge her death, but Maddie has brought a new purpose in his life.

Maddie encounters another challenge when she becomes too chummy with the village kids. Staying remote and distant from others is part of the Ranger's oath. If she does not maintain this distance from others, she will vulnerable and open to exploitation and become less effective. It is another aspect of being a Ranger that she learns the hard way.

Since the parents mistreated the girl and beat her, the innkeeper thought perhaps she had just run off.

Chapter 33

Will and Maddie stayed two days but learned little more about Carrie Clover. Maddie became friendly with the village children and raised the matter. The kids confirmed Rob Danver's belief that someone took her. But the kids were reluctant to say much more. An older boy spoke out and said that Carrie was taken by a river wight – an evil river spirit. The younger boy was hushed up when he said there was no such thing as a river wight. One of the girls mentioned the "story man" which drew Maddie's curiosity.

Later, she told Will about her conversation with the village children. He'd never heard of a river wight either. He heard of barrow wights, spirits that hung around graves. Maddie was fairly certain that the kids were lying about a river wight taking Carrie Clover. Will became curious when Maddie mentioned a "story man." He decided he'd ask about him in the tavern later. It was Maddie's turn to check on the horses. But she was spooked by tales of river wights and story men so she asked Will to go with her.

In the tavern that night, Will asked Rob if there was a story man or spinner living in the village. Rob answered that there was no permanent story man, although occasionally one passed through. Will sensed that Rob wanted to say more but held his tongue.

Analysis

Chapter 23

Will has no children and learns that one can't trust a teenage girl who is left all alone to do as she pleases. Although Maddie is really not interested in drinking alcohol, she is a typical youngster and caves to peer pressure and drinks the wine. It makes her feel free and liberated until she is caught red-handed by Will who tracks her down. Although he seems to be angry, he understands her behavior more than he lets on. Will was young once, too.

Even though she's tipsy, Maddie has enough awareness to realize that she may have besmirched her image and that of the Rangers with her reckless behavior. It may be a lesson well-learned.



Chapter 24

Will knows that Maddie doesn't feel very good the next morning. But, he drives her just as hard as on any other day of practice. She hangs in like a trooper. Finally, Will realizes that Maddie isn't going to accomplish much, and he shows his human side by letting her off the hook a bit. She is miserable enough. He realizes that he doesn't have to lecture her. He knows that she will never want to feel this horrible again and that Maddie will learn more from her mistakes than from her successes.

Chapter 25

Maddie is committed to being a Ranger. She fears that her behavior has caused her to lose Will's respect, something that she had been fighting to attain. Will doesn't want to alienate Maddie from her friends in town so he doesn't press her for their names. He secretly admires her loyalty to her friends. She now realizes that to be a valuable Ranger she must put her responsibility before any friendships she might make on the outside.

Maddie gains insight into Will's deepest feelings and thoughts when she overhears him telling Sable, his dog, how miserable he is without Alyss and how Maddie has brought purpose back to his life. She is flattered by his feelings for her which makes her vow to never disappoint him again.

Chapter 26

Maddie learns another Ranger lesson. She doesn't understand why a Ranger would take on the job of killing a barnyard critter that is stealing a farmer's chickens and eggs. Will explains that chickens and eggs don't seem that important to a princess, but they are everything to the farmer. It is a Ranger's responsibility to help people who need help. It is not their job to judge how important it is.

Chapter 27

Maddie demonstrates that her training is taking hold in more ways than one. Her sharpshooter skills bring the pesky marten down but Maddie shows a richer understanding of what it means to be a Ranger. Maddie impresses Will with her kindness when she gives the marten's rich pelt to the farmer's wife. It was a valuable item for the farmer's wife to have. By behaving in such a charitable way, the reputation of the Ranger Corps is strengthened.

Chapter 28

Galin is happy to see that the plan to help both Will and Maddie is working. He is impressed with Maddie's progress and her more demure demeanor. He is also thrilled to see that Will is coming out of his deep depression. Gilan is so pleased with Maddie's progress that he feels comfortable sending her on an important mission with Will.



Will shows another side of what it means to be a Ranger. The fact that Rangers have to get tough even with law-abiding citizens comes to the forefront in the encounter with the farmer who found the dead body of a fellow Ranger. When the farmer tells Will he doesn't have time to leave his work on the farm, Will threatens him with arrest. Although Will wouldn't have arrested him, his warning was enough to make the farmer cooperate. This lesson may be an important one for Maddie.

Chapter 30

Will demonstrates his superior tracking ability when he studies the spot where Liam's body was found. Maddie shows her intelligence and acumen when she notices marks on the trees that were caused by a rope that probably tripped the Ranger and caused his death. Will's investigative experience and training leads to the discovery of some secret papers in Liam's cabin. The papers could provide some clues about what case Liam was working on and could lead to those who are responsible for his death.

Chapter 31

When Liam's secret papers reveal the names of children, Will fears that there may be some dark plot afoot involving the kidnapping or even killing of children. Liam's notes tell Will that they must act immediately. More children could be in jeopardy. Maddie learns from this incident that Rangers have to sometimes disguise themselves and present other identities to get to the bottom of things. She is beginning to understand that people fear Rangers and that at times more can be learned if they keep their true identities hidden.

Chapter 32

Through their stealth investigative abilities, Will and Maddie are able to learn quite a bit about the case that Liam was working on before his death. They believe that it involved a horrid crime or else Liam wouldn't have been murdered. In the first village they visit, they discover a crucial bit of information when they hear that a little girl had disappeared.

Chapter 33

Maddie proves her unique value in the investigation of the missing children. She performs a task that Will would be unable to do without her. Since she is a female and a young teen, she is able to infiltrate a group of village children and learn that a strange man known as the story man had recently been in town. Although the kids don't reveal anything in words, from their body language and behavior, Maddie is certain that something about this man frightened them. She just doesn't know what.

David thought that the Stealer had taken Maurice.

Chapter 36

The Stealer stripped the flesh off a chicken leg and then complained that it wasn't properly cooked. Harold replied that he never had claimed to be a cook. The Stealer threw the chicken leg in the bushes and told Harold to get him some cheese, ale and bread. The leader of the kidnappers was dressed all in black, the color he wore when he stole children. He was tall and well-built and his hair was almost white.

There were nine men in the temporary camp including the story man. And, there were five children, ages ten to fourteen chained together under a tree. The Stealer ordered Benito, a bitter man who'd been badly injured in a fight years before, to travel to Esseldon to frighten the girl off or kill her.

Chapter 37

As she approached the fallen man, she drew her saxe. The man was dead. She was numb and a little nauseated. She had killed a man. But, she knew that it was him or her.

The man was dressed all in black and appeared to be foreign with his dark, swarthy complexion. In a sack under his cloak, she found a heavy brass disk with four blades set around it. She recognized it as an Iberian weapon, an assassin's weapon. She felt more fortunate than ever that she had avoided being hit with that ominous weapon. She found some papers in his sack and took them with her.

If she reported the man's death, her identity as well as Will's would be exposed. The investigation would be lost. She decided to leave the man there without a word to anyone. Will assured her that she had done the right thing. She would have been killed if she hadn't struck first.

Maddie told Will about the papers she found which included a map. He wanted to see it immediately. He learned in Boyletown that the story man had been there a couple days before Peter Williscroft's disappearance. The boy was mistreated just like the others.

Chapter 39

In the attic room, Will and Maddie studied the map carefully. Six crosses were drawn on the paper. Each cross was numbered. The one word written on the paper was "Pueblo." Immediately, he thought of Violet Carter who was thirteen and couldn't seem to do anything good enough to please her parents. Fernald confirmed that a story man in a colorful costume had been through the village a few days before. Will told Fernald to keep their discussion to himself. If he even breathed a word of it to anyone, Will would arrest him and throw him in the dungeon and have his inn torn down plank by plank. He didn't relish bullying or scaring the man, but the man's silence was essential.

That night Will sat in the tall grass behind the Carter house, and Maddie positioned herself across the street. After several hours, Maddie thought that the Stealer wasn't coming but Will's instincts told him that he would be there that night.

Chapter 41

Will heard the voices of two men who were casing the Carter house. One whispered that there was no one around. Will saw that they were wearing black when they emerged from the shadows. Will thought of the terror that Violet would soon experience. Unfortunately, he had to allow her to be kidnapped. The Stealer stepped into the moonlight, and Will could see that he was indeed Jory Ruhl, the man he had been hunting down for causing Alyss' death. Though he was tempted to apprehend him right then, he had to be patient. Ruhl would lead them to the other missing children. Rhul said that Violet was the tenth and last that Eligio had contracted them to abduct. They were heading for Hawkshead Bay. The ship that would take the children away was due in three days.

Will overheard Jory and the other man talk about how Liam's snooping had slowed them up. He stayed behind and let the men walk off. He could easily track them. Maddie came scurrying across the street. She had seen the men and the abduction take place, too. He filled her in about what he'd heard and said they'd be tracking the Stealer and the other man who would be heading to Hawkshead Bay. Will explained that he had been pursuing Ruhl. He was the man who had killed his wife.

Chapter 42

They returned to their horses and bedded down for a few hours. She slipped a quiver over her shoulder and lastly pulled on her cape. She slowly and cautiously made her way to the cliff. She remembered to "trust the cloak" as Will had often told her. She knew where Will was supposed to be but saw no sign of him at first. Then she saw his raised hand in the tall grass to signal where she was.

They peered down on the beach and saw the ship. It was a long, narrow ship that was built for speed. There was a wooden cage in the center of the deck. Will was certain the ship wouldn't go out for hours. It needed high tide to slip out, and the gang would want to travel at night to avoid detection. Will told her to study the ship and the distances between the beach and ship until she could picture it in her mind. He had a plan for that night which he promised her she would love. She wasn't so sure that she would exactly "love" it.

Analysis

Chapter 34

Maddie shows her maturity when she does target practice with the village kids. Although she is a trained Ranger and could out shoot the kids, she doesn't take advantage. She refuses to take the money that they had set aside up for the winner. She is patient with the boys and shows them how to use a sling without lording it over them. Being a girl herself, she understands why the girls are reluctant to try their hands at the sling. She encourages them and hopes that her shooting skills inspire the other young girls.

Chapter 35

Both Maddie and Will learn that there was a story man at the second village they stopped at. Being good investigators, it doesn't take them long to determine that there is a connection between the incidents in both towns. The fact that there's another missing child in the second town confirms to the Rangers that they are on to something and that the paperwork they found in Liam's cabin was not a false lead. A more ominous threat emerges in the story when one of the boys tells Maddie that there is a Stealer of the Night who took children. Maddie knows that "Stealer of the Night" is just a fancy way of saying "kidnapper."

Chapter 36

The kidnappers are frustrated. They had rid themselves of one bothersome Ranger who was nosing around. Now they apparently had a young girl who was asking too many



questions. They probably didn't think the girl was a Ranger because there were no female Rangers – that is until Maddie became an apprentice. If the kidnappers knew that two Rangers were on their trail, they may have hightailed it out while they could. Unknown to Maddie, her life is very much on the line.

Chapter 37

Maddie soon learns that she is indeed in danger. The Stealer sent one of his thugs to scare her, and it worked. She is very frightened. After the menacing individual leaves her with the warning to stop asking questions, her training and oath to the Ranger Corps kicks in. She could not allow this person who was probably connected to the kidnapping ring go. She had to pursue him. It was her duty and it was what Will would do.

Maddie proves to be a tenacious and brave fighter. Once it is obvious that he intends to kill her, she strikes first. And despite her belief that this man is a kidnapper and worse, she feels badly. It is the first person she killed. It is a natural reaction that anyone would have.

Deciding what to do about his body leaves Maddie conflicted. But, in the end, she does the right thing. It isn't the most humane thing to do to just let his dead body lie in the middle of the street, but she has to consider priorities. If she were to report his death, her identity and Will's would be revealed. The investigation would be damaged. Finding and rescuing the children that had been taken were her first priorities.

Chapter 38

Will is sympathetic when Maddie tells him how upset she is that she had killed another human being. He understands. As a young Ranger, he no doubt had experienced a similar reaction when he first killed another person. He stresses that she could do nothing else. If she hadn't killed the man, it would be Maddie lying dead in the street. She had done the right thing for herself, for the kingdom, the Corps and most importantly for the children.

Chapter 39

The urgency of the matter becomes evident when Will concludes that the kidnappers had hit three villages and have plans to hit three more. He knows of an active slave trading operation and suspects that the kidnappers would be taking the children to sell to the slavers. He figures that the story man is sent ahead of the others to learn which children are the most vulnerable in each village and therefore the easiest targets. These men are greedy and heartless kidnappers who sell a pound of flesh without compunction. Maddie's first mission with Rangers is a challenge in that she is dealing with the worst kind of people imaginable.

Chapter 40

Will is forced to use his strong arm tactics with the inn owner in Willow Vale. It is crucial that the man not tell anyone that he was visited by a Ranger who was inquiring about



missing children. If word got out and the story man and the Stealer of the Night learned that they were being tracked by Rangers, they would take the kids they already had and leave the country. Those children would be lost forever.

Chapter 41

Will knows that he has to be patient and allow one more child to be abducted. If he he stopped the two men from kidnapping Violet, the other children would be lost. They would be sold to a slave trader in another country. His goal is to save all the children and return them home. He will apprehend and arrest the kidnappers and end their criminal operation.

Will shows the maximum restraint when he discovers that the Stealer of the Night is none other than Jory Ruhl, the man responsible for his wife's death and the man he had been hunting for eighteen months. He is naturally tempted to attack him on the spot. However, saving the children is of paramount importance. As a Ranger, he cannot put his personal vendetta before the safety of children.

Chapter 42

Will puts his tracking skills to use in following Ruhl and the other kidnappers. The field training that Will had subjected Maddie to was coming in handy in real time. She is able to apply what she learned in training on a real-life mission. It is a good thing that she is a quick study!

Will and Maddie's plan of attack begins to materialize when they find the camp and see where the children are caged. They would both play an important role in the rescue. Maddie knows that there is danger ahead but she had internalized the Ranger's oath and understands what her responsibilities and first priorities are. She may have been a princess first; but, her most recent title is Ranger.

Chapter 43

Will is not encouraged when he sees that he and Maddie are outnumbered by three to one. But they are highly trained and as such superior to the ordinary criminal like Ruhl and his gang. The cruelty with which the children are being treated wears on Will and Maddie as they watch the camp overnight.

Chapter 44

Will surmises that the slave ship won't weigh anchor until the night's high tide. So, they can leave undetected. Will teaches Maddie another Ranger skill. She has to commit every detail about the slave boat to memory. It is essential for their plans to go off smoothly. Maddie is being realistic when she reacts to Will's statement that she'll "love" his plans to rescue the children. She wasn't so sure she'd really "love" them.

Analysis

Chapter 45

Perhaps setting the ship on fire was symbolic of the fire that killed Will's wife. It is not coincidental that part of the rescue plan involves fire. He can avenge his wife's murder in a way and rescue the children. Recovering the children is something that his wife would have wanted him to do.

There is an ominous tone in Will's words after Maddie compliments him on his organizational skills. She tells him that he has thought of everything in the planning of the rescue operation. He is wise and has been through many such missions before. He warns her that there is always the unexpected.

Chapter 46

All of Maddie's training is paying off. She learned to track and camouflage herself in the woods. And she learned to trust the cloak. The many miles she was required to run made her fit and agile. She darts to the mess tent unnoticed and grabs the keys to the cave prison and battles with the slavers, all confirming that her many hours of training and practice have made her a valuable asset to the Rangers Corps.

The one thing that Will failed to plan for was that the Ruhl gang would have a tracker. Had he thought of that possibility, he would have covered his tracks, thrown off the gang and led them in a different direction. But, as he said, there is always something that is missed in planning.

Chapter 47

There was no time to explain that things didn't always go the way they were planned to go. Maddie and the kids run for cover but Will stays behind to fend off the advancing gang. Chapter 52

Maddie shows her resourcefulness and her retention ability. She had remembered seeing a series of caves on their way to the bay. Characters

Maddie

Princess Madelyn, or Maddie as she is known, is a spoiled and privileged princess in the Kingdom of Araluen. She is a fifteen-year-old who finds her life as a princess to be boring. She likes to track and hunt animals in the forest at night. She sneaks out in the dark to follow this pursuit much to the dismay of her parents.

Maddie's parents scold her about her dangerous behavior. There are many perils in the forest, such as bears and other dangerous animals. She is particularly vulnerable to kidnapping because of her position in the monarchy. There are outlaws and brigands in the forest who could abduct her for ransom. Maddie must take her position as a royal princess seriously because she is an heir to the throne. However, Maddie cannot see spending her days sewing and doing needlework with her ladies-in-waiting. She wants excitement and drama in her life.

Maddie's parents and a group of close friends devise an unconventional plan that will teach her discipline and what it means to be committed and dedicated to a cause. She will be named a Ranger apprentice and will train under Will Treaty who is a legendary and heroic King's Ranger. Will is in grief over the loss of his wife; and, it is felt that training Maddie will be a good distraction for him.

Maddie doesn't fully understand that she is leaving her life of privilege completely behind. So, she brings a maid and a full wardrobe with her to Will's cabin to start training. At first she balks at doing menial chores and adhering to Will's orders and requirements; but, she begins to come around and recognizes that a successful Ranger is the total package – helpful, brave, kind, skilled and willing to serve the kingdom.

Will Treaty

Will Treaty is a legendary and heroic King's Ranger. He was a happy-go-lucky man until his wife Alyss was killed in a fire that was intentionally set by a criminal named Jory Ruhl and his gang of thugs. Eighteen months after her death, he is still filled with rage and bitterness and is obsessed with tracking down and bringing to justice every member of the gang, especially its leader, Jory Ruhl.

Will is on the verge of being suspended from the Ranger Corps because of his obsession with hunting down his wife's murderers. He has declined to take several missions because of his personal vendetta. Gilan, the Ranger Commandant, wants to bring Will out of his doldrums and turns to mutual friends for a solution. Maddie is a royal princess who lacks discipline and an idea is sparked that will help both Will and Maddie.



Gilan asks Will to take on Maddie and train her as a Ranger apprentice. At first, Will is reluctant to agree to this arrangement; but, Maddie's parents are his friends. They plead with him to train their daughter. Will knows that his wife would have wanted him to help his friends. Will finds a talented and eager trainee in Maddie, and the two eventually form a strong bond as fellow Rangers.

Gilan assigns them to an investigative mission. They are to find the murderer of a fellow Ranger. During this investigation, Will is able to finally confront Jory Ruhl and his gang. With the help of Maddie, he is able to break up a kidnapping operation in which children are being abducted and sold as slaves.

Princess Cassandra

Princess Cassandra is Maddie's mother and the heir apparent to the throne of Araluen. She is concerned that her rebellious daughter doesn't take her position in the monarchy seriously. She is also worried that her daughter exposes herself to danger while hunting in the forest at night.

Sir Horace

Sir Horace is the husband of Princess Cassandra and the father of Maddie. He understands his daughter's need for excitement in her life; but, he also worries that her rebellious attitude will lead to trouble for her.

King Duncan

King Duncan is the ruler of Araluen. He is very ill and is not expected to live. He is worried about his daughter Cassandra taking over the crown. He asks that the Rangers help and support her when she becomes the queen.

Gilan

Gilan was named the new Ranger Commandant. He heads the King's Rangers and is concerned about one of his men, Will Treaty, who is obsessed with tracking down the murderers of his wife. Gilan fears that he will be forced to suspend Will from the Rangers for shirking his other duties.

Halt

Halt is a retired King's Ranger. He is summoned to the King's castle by Gilan, the commandant of the Rangers, to help in an intervention with Will Treaty, a Ranger who is obsessed with finding his wife's killers. Halt thinks of a solution that will help both Will and Princess Maddie. She is having problems with her royal parents.



The Story Man

The Story Man worked for the slavers. He would visit villages and gather kids around to tell them scary stories about The Stealer of the Night. His job was to find the most vulnerable kids in the village to target for kidnapping.

Jory Ruhl

Jory Ruhl is a criminal and the leader of the gang that killed Will Treaty's wife. Will has been tracking down Ruhl for eighteen months when he discovers that Ruhl is the leader of a kidnapping ring that is abducting children to sell into slavery.

Enrico

Enrico is a sailor from the slaving ship who is also an outstanding tracker. He is able to track Will down and lead Jory Ruhl and his gang of slavers to Will, Maddie, and the children they had rescued.



Symbols and Symbolism

Maddie's Sling

Before she became a Ranger apprentice, Maddie was adept at hunting for game with her leather sling armed with lead balls. After she went through training, the Rangers included the sling as one of their standard weapons.

The Ranger Crossbow

The Ranger Crossbow had an unusual shape and was very heavy. It weighed fifty pounds and was quite a challenge for the young and slightly-built Maddie to learn how to use it effectively.

The Letter

To convince Maddie to take her Ranger training seriously, her parents wrote a letter disinheriting her. They temporarily took her status as princess and heir apparent from her so that she would cooperate with Will during her training.

Tug

Tug was Will's horse. He was a stocky gray horse that appeared to be old and slow; but, he could run as fast as necessary. Will could communicate telepathically with Tug and was able to tactically maneuver in battle to avoid harm.

Bumper

Bumper was Will's Ranger horse. He was a piebald with black and white splotches. He was short and stocky. Maddie fell in love with him the moment she saw him. She was able to communicate telepathically with Bumper.

The Ranger Cloak

Part of the Ranger uniform is the Ranger Cloak. It has a magical element and can help Rangers go undetected. Will repeatedly tells Maddie to "trust the cloak" when she is in trouble.



The Wine Cask

When Will discovered Maddie drinking wine at a party, he picked up the wine cask and threw it to the ground, breaking it into several pieces.

Fire Arrows

Will decides to use fire arrows when he assaults the slavers. He shoots flaming arrows onto the deck of the slave ship and sets it on fire.

The Slaver's Boat

The slaver's boat is narrow and sleek and speedy. In the center of the deck is a wooden cage where captured children are kept while they are being transported to the slave market in another land.

The Cave Prison

Before the children are boarded onto the slave ship to be transported to the slave market, they are locked up in a prison that is fashioned out of a cave on the wall of a cliff near the bay.



Settings

The Kingdom of Araluen

Maddie is a princess in the Kingdom of Araluen. Araluen is a faraway, fictional land that existed long ago. The royal family lives in the Castle Araluen and rules over the Squires who have authority over the fiefs that comprise the Kingdom.

Will's Cabin

Maddie travels to Will's cabin in a wooded area of the Kingdom. She stays at the cabin for her training as an apprentice Ranger. She has her own private room and there are stables for the horses. Will trains her in the skills of tracking and camouflage and weaponry in the nearby woods.

The Gatt Farm

Maddie and Will help a farmer who is losing his chickens and eggs to a predatory animal that sneaks into the barnyard. Maddie takes out the creature, a marten, with one shot from her sling.

Hawkshead Bay

The children who were abducted by the slavers were taken to a prison cave on a cliff above Hawkshead Bay. A slaver ship was anchored in the bay waiting to take the children away to a slave market.

Wyvern Inn

Will Treaty's wife was killed in a fire that was intentionally set by a gang of criminals. She died at the Wyvern Inn which was located in Anselm Fief in the Kingdom of Araluen.



Themes and Motifs

Humility

While it is understandable that a royal princess is not naturally humble because of her upbringing and position, the story of The Royal Ranger – The Ranger's Apprentice tells the story of Princess Maddie who is given no option other than to learn to be humble and understand the value of humility. Maddie is presented as an independent-thinking young teenager who defies her parents' rules. She finds life as a royal boring and wants excitement and drama in her life. She gets what she wants most unexpectedly.

When she begins her training as the first female Ranger apprentice, she quickly learns the meaning of all or nothing at all. To be an apprentice and to learn what it means to be a Ranger, she must leave her royal past far behind her. The transition isn't necessarily an easy one for her. She is spoiled and privileged. She wants to cherry pick the parts of Ranger training that she likes. She wants to learn to use the Ranger Crossbow and wear the Ranger cloak and ride the Ranger horses; but, she doesn't want to clean up after herself, do chores, or obey Will Treaty, her mentor.

For Maddie to be an effective ranger, she must humble herself and be willing to serve the cause and not her personal whims. She brings a maid and a full wardrobe along with her to Will's cabin in the woods where she will be training. She quickly learns that an apprentice is a lowly personage and does not have maids or fancy ball gowns. Maddie has to give up her former life of privilege completely in order to withstand the rigors of Ranger training and to be able to fully embrace what it means to be a King's Ranger.

Dedication

In "The Royal Ranger" Maddie learns the true meaning of dedication and that there are different ways to express and apply it as a guiding force no matter what role one plays in life. Maddie is a princess and was born into privilege. Everything was given to her and she wanted for nothing. Life was, therefore, effortless for her both physically and spiritually. As she matured, her parents saw the spoiled and rebellious child that they had raised. Although she knew she was a princess, she didn't know what that really meant beyond having ladies-in-waiting and tiaras and always having her way.

As a princess and an heir to the throne, Maddie didn't understand that she was responsible for the kingdom and its people. She didn't realize that while others may bow to her, she was serving them. While the people of her kingdom were loyal to her, she didn't recognize that she had to be dedicated to their welfare.

In the end, Maddie learned what it meant to be dedicated to a cause. She came to see the importance of putting herself last and putting others, including those who she ruled, before her. She didn't learn this lesson in the castle. She was taught about what it



meant to be dedicated when she became an apprentice in the King's Rangers Corps. Maddie's parents were wise to take their daughter out of her environment of privilege and even temporarily strip her of her royal title so that she could learn how to commit to something beyond herself.

Being a warrior in the field taught Maddie that it was essential to focus on the mission and the goal to be accomplished. She learned that removing herself and her needs and wants from the task to be done was the only way to true success. Her training as a Ranger was so much more than a physical challenge. In fact, the physical part was probably the easiest part of her training. Being selfless and subservient to the mission and embracing the spiritual aspect of becoming a Ranger were lessons well-learned. Having learned these lessons, she would be able to transfer to her role and responsibilities as a princess and someday as an effective ruler of the kingdom.

Abuse

A subplot in The Royal Ranger – The Ranger's Apprentice involves abuse, particularly the abuse of children which is exposed by Will and Maddie when they are given a mission to investigate the death of a fellow King's Ranger. Although initially the investigation centers around the circumstances surrounding the murder of the Ranger, it eventually leads to a kidnapping ring that is operating in the villages of the kingdom.

Will and Maddie discover some paperwork in the deceased Ranger's cabin that provides evidence that young children are being abducted from their homes in the middle of the night. The criminals who are kidnapping the children have plans to sell them in the slave market. Part of their cruel plot involves sending a story man into the villages who tells the young stories ghost stories. By interacting with them, he makes a judgment as to which children to target for abduction. The kidnappers focus on taking children who are abused and mistreated by their parents. Their thinking is that the authorities in the village won't suspect foul play and assume that the children ran away from an abusive home and therefore won't try to find them.

Will and Maddie are able to find the children and rescue them from the kidnappers. Not surprisingly, the slavers mistreat the children, too. They chained, bound, and imprisoned the children. They fed them only one meal a day. While it is gratifying that the children were rescued from the kidnappers and would not face a life of slavery, the author does not deal with what will happen to the children when they are returned to their parents who abused them. Allowing their abusive parents to take them back is not a good outcome for them. It seems the author failed to tie up this loose end and could have created a better ending for the children.



Styles

Point of View

The Royal Ranger is written in the third person limited omniscient. Writing the story from this point of view allows the reader to learn the thoughts, fears, believes and motivations of the main characters in the story. The "limited" omniscient presents only the point of view of the major characters in the story.

This point of view is important in this story of a young royal princess who becomes the first female Ranger and is an apprentice under a legendary and heroic Ranger. These two main characters have their own demons to deal with. The reader learns that Maddie, the princess, does not find life very exciting as a royal and that she is in conflict with her parents over her reckless behavior. She wants excitement and drama in her life. She loves hunting, tracking, and weaponry. She is not your regular royal princess by any measure.

Will Treaty is obsessed with pursuing the murderers of his wife who was killed in a fire that was intentionally set. Will is on the verge of being suspended from the Rangers because of this obsession. He is shirking his other duties.

The point of view of both these characters is crucial in understanding the main story line and various subplots of this story. From their personal reflections, the reader gains insight into the tortured Ranger who has lost his soul-mate and the young vibrant princess who aspires to be more than a royal. Their thoughts and motivations also show how the two characters are good for each other and how their relationship changes and enriches each of them.

Language and Meaning

The novel takes place in an undetermined time in a fictional land called Araluen. The Kingdom is separated into fiefs. There are numerous references to the royal family including the old ruler, King Duncan, who is the current monarch. There is mention of Princesses, Knights, Squires and the heir apparent to the throne. The royal family is protected by sentries who stand guard at every side of the castle. The King's Rangers are a group of highly trained soldiers who protect the crown and serve the King. The Rangers are heroic and legendary. They are highly skilled in the crossbow, saxe knife, and throwing knife. They carry their weapons on a scabbard.

Maddie – or the Princess Madelyn as she is officially known – becomes an apprentice in the Rangers Corps. She is the first female to become a Ranger. She has a natural affinity for tracking and hunting and is adept at using her leather sling and lead balls to bring down her prey. Maddie trains under the celebrated Ranger named Will Treaty. He teaches her to use the standard weapons of the Corps and trains her in tracking and camouflage tactics. Part of the Ranger uniform is a cloak. There is a magical nature to



the cloak; it helps the Ranger hide from the enemy – sort of like the invisible cloak of Harry Potter fame. Will tells Maddie repeatedly to "trust the cloak" whenever she is in need or help or in peril. Ranger horses can communicate telepathically. The horses are short and stocky. Maddie's horse Bumper is a piebald which means that it has a coat of black and white splotches.

Maddie and Will are tracking down a gang of kidnappers. The legend that surrounds these criminals includes a Story Man who tells the kids scary ghost stories and The Stealer of the Night who sneaks in and abducts the children. The children are taken to be sold as slaves. The children are kept in a cave prison on a cliff near a bay of the sea. A sleek narrow slave ship is used to transport the children away to be sold in the slave market in another land. There is a wooden cage in the middle of the deck where the children are be kept during the voyage.

Structure

The Royal Ranger is separated into fifty-five medium-length chapters which are followed by an epilogue. The story unfolds in a mainly chronological manner. There are no flashback sequences only references to past incidents. For example, when the character, Will Treaty, is first introduced he appears to be stoic and distracted – a man with no humor and in fact an angry man with a violent streak. When the reader learns that Will lost his wife in a fire started by criminals just eighteen months before, a deeper understanding of this character is attained. He was described by other characters as once happy-go-lucky; but, after the tragedy, he is obsessed with only revenge and bringing the guilty to justice.

Will Treaty and Princess Madelyn, or Maddie as she is called, are the two main characters. They are treated as co-protagonists who have a story together as well as individual stories. While the story begins on two tracks, the stories of the two protagonists ultimately merge into one story.

As described above, Will is presented as a grieving widower who is bent on avenging his wife's death. Maddie is initially presented as a spoiled and privileged royal princess. Although these two main characters do not seem to have much in common at first, a relationship develops between them that by story's end elevates each of them. Will finds new purpose in life, and Maddie learns what it means to be selfless and to put others before herself.



Quotes

No one ever died from being too careful.

Importance: King Duncan's land had been at peace for years. However, he knew that could change at any time. He was always cautious.

Len was trying to equate the current Princes Cassandra—the caretaker rule of the kingdom—with the picture his companion had drawn of a wild, adventurous tomboy terrorizing the castle guards.

-- Len (Chapter 2 paragraph Page 51)

Importance: The sentry was trying to imagine the royal and dignified Princess Cassandra as a tomboy when she was her daughter Maddie's age.

Think about it. Could Maddie be in safer hands? Will loves her. He's her godfather. He looks upon her as his niece, of not his surrogate daughter. You'd be entrusting her to his care. And you know he would die before he let any harm come to her.

-- Halt (Chapter 7 paragraph Page 175)

Importance: Halt is trying to convince Cassandra and Horace to allow Maddie to train under Will Treaty as a Ranger. They are having problems with her rebellious nature and Halt thinks Will can tame her spirit.

You're a spoiled and arrogant brat who needs to be taught a lesson.

-- Will (Chapter 13 paragraph Page 310)

Importance: Will was exasperated with his new apprentice. Maddie thought she should be treated like a princess even though she was being trained as a Ranger.

Trust the cloak.

-- Will (Chapter 16 paragraph Page 390)

Importance: While training Maddie, Will told her how their mottled uniform and cloak could make them blend into the background and allow them to go basically undetected.

Better to hit the enemy late than miss him entirely.

-- Maddie (Chapter 17 paragraph Page 417)

Importance: Will is teaching Maddie to be more concerned with accuracy than with speed as she practices her weapons drills during her training.

I mean... do you ever get the feeling that your horse is talking to you?

-- Maddie (Chapter 21 paragraph Page 536)



Importance: Maddie has just been given Bumper, her Ranger horse, and realizes that there is something magical about him.

She stepped closer to the bank and peered into the smooth, fast-running water, trying to see if there was, in fact, a river wight visible. Then she realized that she had no idea what such a creature might look like.

-- Narrator (Chapter 33 paragraph Page 805)

Importance: Maddie had just been told that a river wight had stolen one of the village children away in Danver's Crossing. Though she didn't believe that there was such a creature, it none the less frightened her – she was just a child herself.

That storyteller was here all right. I'd bet my life on it.

-- Maddie (Chapter 35 paragraph Page 846)

Importance: Will and Maddie were pursuing an elusive storyteller where children had gone missing. The statement foretells the danger that she would be facing herself.

Ruhl and the other two horsemen dismounted to lead the way down the cliff path. The line of prisoners followed them. It was obviously difficult going with their hands tied, and with the heavy rope linking them. If one slipped, the two on either side would be dragged down as well.

Importance: This quote captures the peril that the abducted children were subjected to by the slavers who were planning to take them to another land to sell into slavery.

Speed is the enemy of stealth, Will had told her. You're better to move slowly and silently than to rush about making noise.

-- Maddie (Chapter 44 paragraph Page 1,065)

Importance: Maddie recalled this from Will when she approached the kidnappers. She and Will planned to apprehend the gang and rescue the stolen children.

His first order of business was to get rid of the tracker, to give Maddie and the children a better chance of escaping. His own person revenge would have to wait – although not for too long.

-- Will (Chapter 52 paragraph Page 1,247)

Importance: Will's first duty was to protect Maddie and the kidnapped children whom they had rescued. He would wait to deal with Ruhl who had killed Will's wife. However, Will would ultimately have his revenge.
