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Plot Summary

A Sparrow Falls by Wilbur Smith is a riveting tale that begins with the war in France, and follows three combatants back to Africa. Mark Anders and Fergus MacDonald are a crack sniper team in France, but when Mark is shot, the war is over for him. He goes home, looking forward to being with his grandfather, only to find that he is dead. As he looks into the death, he becomes a target himself, and the closer he looks the more foul the story of his grandfather's accident is. After two attempts on his life, Mark realizes his grandfather was murdered so that a group of men could gain access to 'Andersland' and the water on it. Dirk Courtney's greed knows no bounds as he tries to gain access to land slated as a National Park so that he can dam a gorge and flood the Bubezi Valley creating more farmland and increasing his net worth. Mark if forced to flee Ladyburg, and stays for a short time in Fordsburg with his old partner Fergus MacDonald and his wife Helena but they have become deeply involved in the Marxist/Communist movement, supporting the uprising of the workers against the bosses and government in general.

He falls in love with the General's daughter, Storm, and their secret affair results in a pregnancy that Storm keeps from Mark because she and Mark fight over his plans for the future. Storm leaves to save face, and marries but her husband is only interested in her father's money, and the marriage is short lived. When Mark hears that she is married, he loses hope, and marries someone else. Marion is more in love with her rising status than she is with Mark, but she goes with him to Chaka's Gate.

The twists in this story continue, as the fight over Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River Valley seems all but lost to Mark and Sean when Sean's son Dirk takes over Sean's seat in Parliament and works to push through the development of the area. He almost succeeds, but nature wins out, and love prevails when Marion is killed by a lioness and Mark and Storm find each other again. The story doesn't end there, and in an explosive finish Mark and Sean both believe they've lost everything, and the Courtney family ends up ensuring the permanent security of the natural beauty of Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River Valley.

Chapters 1 - 5 Summary

Anders and MacDonald, a well-known sniper team, arrived earlier that morning. Mark Anders is honored to meet Sean, having heard the stories of his history at the gold fields of Witwatersrand, and his legendary chase of General Leroux across Southern Africa.

Chapters 1 - 5 Analysis

Sean Courtney prefers to be in the field with the men rather than in an office as his stature as Brigadier-General suggests. He heads for the farmhouse that is the mess for the second Battalion, and loses his subaltern, Nick van der Heever to a crack shot by a German sniper. He takes the loss personally, and is informed the services of the crack sniper team of Anders and MacDonald have been secured.

Anders in honored to meet Sean, but MacDonald is immediately jealous of the common bond they find, as Sean is acquainted with Mark's grandfather. Though Sean directs his questions to Mark, the older MacDonald interjects, claiming how difficult his part in their sniper team is. After all, he has to manipulate the dummy, Cuthbert just right to entice the enemy sniper to give away his position. Sean is not impressed.



Chapters 6 - 10

Chapters 6 - 10 Summary

Mark moves through the line cut through the wire in front of 'A' Company. The snow stops, and he waits near the ruins of the farmhouse in fear. He hears a voice ask in German, 'Bist du da?' (Are you there?). The voice says they are going back, so Mark follows and pushes into a tangle of roots, checking his rifle carefully to ensure the sight hasn't moved. At dawn, he flexes his fingers. A blanket of snow covers him. MacDonald moves into position with Cuthbert and, when a shot rings out, the dummy kicks in his hands. Fergus curses. The German is in the same stand as Mark.

Mark's ears buzz. Using periphery vision, he sees the Mauser barrel. He imagines the shape of the body, using the Mauser as a reference point to locate his hips. He can't risk removing the safety. It has to be done in one smooth motion. He sees the impact of his shot, and shoots again before the German cries out. He waits until he hears him sobbing in German, 'Oh my God... the blood. Oh God, the blood.' Mark approaches warily to find both shots having gone through the German's hips. Something in Mark snaps and his feet are running, but none of it seems real. A German machine gunner takes careful aim and fires a burst that hits Mark in the back, taking him down immediately. Fergus asks permission to take out a patrol to retrieve Mark and it is granted. Taking volunteers, he finds Mark shortly after eight. It takes nearly an hour to carefully cut him out of the wire.

Chapters 6 - 10 Analysis

Mark works his way carefully to the abandoned farmhouse, but he knows he can't stay where he is. He hears a German voice call out. Another one answers and Mark realizes his good fortune and his fear immediately subsides as he follows them, his nerves now steady. He makes his way to the spot he and MacDonald chose with binoculars earlier, working his way into the root system of a fallen oak. He checks his rifle, eats and sleeps. When he wakes, a light snowfall covers him, and he is careful not to disturb this camouflage as he scans the area for his adversary.

Fergus gets into position with the dummy Cuthbert. When the shot rings out, Fergus curses, realizing the sniper has chosen the same stand of trees. Mark calculates the body size, and stares until he makes out the material of the German's uniform. Then he rolls and fires two shots in succession. After a moment, he hears cries, so he goes to his adversary, finding him in a pool of blood. Mark snaps and runs for the British lines, but before he gets there, a German machine gunner cuts him down. MacDonald chokes back a sob and asks for permission to take a patrol out to retrieve him. It takes more than an hour to cut Mark free of the wire.



Chapters 11 - 15

Chapters 11 - 15 Summary

Months later, Mark heads back to Andersland, excited at the prospect of seeing his grandfather again. A distant thud and voices take him to men falling heavy timber and approaching he asks what they are doing. One man says the land is owned by a Ladyburg company that intends to put in sugar crops. Mark realizes his grandfather is dead. This is something he would never have allowed. He finds his grandfather's hiding place, and his prized possessions are still there. Now there is no doubt. He walks to his Uncle Fred's who explains his grandfather was hunting with Piet Greyling and his son at Chaka's Gate when he fell on his rifle, shooting himself in the stomach a year ago.

Chapters 11 - 15 Analysis

Mark returns to Andersland to see his grandfather. He finds a huge crew of men cutting down the trees his grandfather loved, and approaches the foreman to be told the land was sold to Ladyburg Estates. Mark returns to the homestead, and finds the secret hiding place in the floor that still holds his grandfathers' most prized possessions. Chapters 16 - 20 Analysis

Hobday tells Dirk Courtney about his encounter with Mark Anders. Having thought he was long dead, Dirk and his compatriots had eliminated John Anders to gain control of the only property with water, a necessity to the expansion of the sugar mill. Mark heads to Fordsburg, goes to Fergus's home and tells them what happened. Mark is surprised to discover that his old friend is a Bolshevik and a practicing communist, but they insist that it is the workers against the bosses now. Fergus is convinced that one day they will be called upon to serve as a sniper pair again.

Chapters 21 - 25 Summary

Fergus is popular at the communist meetings, though he admits to Mark that much of it is rhetoric to motivate them for the coming battle. Chapters 26 - 30 Analysis

Mark and Helena never leave the cottage. On the fifth, a letter arrives from Fergus changes everything. Chapters 51 - 55 Analysis

Ronald Pye is summoned to Dirk's lair and finds his brother-in-law. Dirk forces him to pay his brother in law's gambling debt and Ronald tells him he's leaving, but Dirk tells them a story at gunpoint about being solely responsible for the deaths of a hundred men, women and children.

Mark's finds evidence of snares, and footprints of a man. On the twenty-first morning, he has the chills and fever of malaria, and hears the call of an owl, answered in kind on the other side of him. Weak and disoriented, he imitates the owl, drawing one of them to him, and shoots him. He forgets about the second man who shoots him without warning and Mark falls into the river. Chapters 56 - 60 Summary

Mark works long hours and Sean throws a party after Mark helps win the Africa Cup. Part way through Ruth confides an unwanted guest arrived - Sean's estranged son, Dirk. Mark goes down when Dirk learns his name Mark realizes he is the man responsible for John Anders death, the attempts on his life, and the theft of Andersland. Mark helps the General into the Rolls. The General wants Mark to attend the Prime Minister's speech later, and when he is gone, Mark goes back into the house and lets himself into Storm's studio. The Prime Minister announces a state of martial law and Sean tells Mark they will leave immediately after he gets home.

Fergus and his group bomb the police station in Fordsburg, and isolate the Newlands station before throwing grenades in until they beg. He tells his men that by morning, the flag of communism will fly from every public building in Johannesburg.

The Scottish Transvaal company gets off the train at Dunswart Station, but are overcome by fire from a hundred locations and forced back on the train. They leave with twelve dead and thirty wounded.



Chapters 76 - 80

Chapters 76 - 80 Summary

Harry Fisher charges a shopkeeper as a traitor, and says they should shoot him. Two men drag him out, but neither is able to carry out the sentence so Helena does. Fergus tells them the Prime Minister is traveling by road without escort. The Prime Minister is so anxious to get into the action, he refuses to take a circuitous route into Johannesburg for safety. Sean relents on the condition the Cadillac act as decoy out front. Before long, the Cadillac is under fire, forcing its way through a barricade, for Mark to follow. Damaged, the Cadillac might have continued, but the assault from a Vickers gun that follows leaves all three men in the Cadillac cut to ribbons before the car hits a wall. A DH.9 is sent in to drop leaflets to announce martial law, and inform the general populace that they have until eleven that morning to leave, or be considered part of the rebel factions. Gratefully, Sean and Mark see the women and children leaving shortly afterwards, most of them carrying their most important possessions.

Chapters 76 - 80 Analysis

The fighting is complicated by feelings that arise when men who have known each other most of their lives are faced with the possibility that they will be forced to kill each other. They follow until just after noon when Pungushe tells Mark he's lost the spoor. Angry, Dirk knows he's been had again, but isn't sure how. Chapters 116 - 120 Summary

Characters

Brigadier-General Sean Courtney

After four winters in France, B.G. Sean Courtney is a tough and often unpredictable leader. He enjoys an informal style, where he is likely to show up unannounced even on the front lines unattended by even his own staff. His impromptu visits cause his subordinates much dismay, but Sean enjoys the panic his sudden arrivals have been known to cause. He is a tough and unorthodox leader, who has been compared to a bull elephant, but having survived the Boer War, he is more comfortable with his men than with the leaders of equivalent rank and status.

Sean Courtney has dark, thick curls of wiry hair that is interspersed with grey, as is his short, thick beard. His nose is battered and twisted, but his eyes of cobalt blue are sharp and steady as any young man's. His judge of both weather and men is as unerring as his judge of horses. He easily can pick out the big-hearted, or the ones who are rotten, explainable only by his depth of experience and a deeper insight than most have. A legend, Sean is well known to have made a fortune in the gold fields of Witwatersrand, and single handedly chased and caught the Boer General Leroux in Africa. At fifty-nine years of age, Sean slips easily from the Zulu language and back to English, putting the men under him guickly at ease.

General Courtney is a gentleman, through and through, with a high moral standard and self worth. He spent much of his youth hunting large game, but came to appreciate the wilderness in his later years, becoming a staunch supporter for the African Wildlife Society and champion of the efforts to ratify and protect the African National Forests at Chaka's Gate. He is a man who loves his with fiercely, and is willing to fight for the things he believes in. Taken with Mark Anders, he loves him like a son, while rejecting his own flesh and blood because of his lack of morals and standards of any kind. His legacy is the National Wildlife Society in Africa, and he worked tirelessly to its benefit and inception.

Mark Anders

A volunteer in the French army, Mark Anders is well known throughout the area for his prowess with a rifle. He moves with certain grace not unlike that of an athlete and is younger than his partner, Sergeant Fergus MacDonald. Mark eyes are serene and pale golden brown, with lids that do not overlap the iris, leaving the cornea floating clean and white like a full moon. His gaze is direct and hypnotic, despite his age, which is nearer to seventeen than twenty. Thin and exploited mercilessly by those who relied on his abilities, his skin is spotted with lice bites and his cheeks are hollow. Though his eye sockets are sunken, he is alert and intelligent. He has a slight stutter that quickly vanishes when he is concentrating on the task at hand.



Mark fully appreciates the beauty of his homeland when he returns, and it is this appreciation that fuels much of his actions afterward. A strong and usually silent type, he begins by trying to find out who killed his grandfather while he was away at war, and in doing so, makes some powerful enemies. They try to kill him more than once, but his training, combined with the things his grandfather taught him as a child, save his life more than once. He is forced to flee the Ladyburg area, but returns again, unable to resist the lure that is his homeland. Passionate about the wildlife, Mark Anders becomes the warden in charge of the Chaka's Gate National Park, which he helped to create and administered to for most of his life. Living in the cottage he built, he returns even after carelessness with the wildlife by his first wife costs her his life. His strong attachment to the wilderness keeps him from being able to destroy the lioness responsible, and he goes on to help restore and maintain the natural state of beauty he's come to love.

Having no real use for money, he takes all he has and creates the African Wildlife Preservation Society and encourages others by educating them as to the importance of its existence. His second wife also lives in Chaka's Gate with him, where she also gives up everything (and nothing) to live in the beautiful wilds of their African homeland. Their son John, named for the grandfather who taught him so much, grows up there as well. When he finally retires in 1973, he and his wife move to the cottage at Umhlanga Rocks on the Natal Coast.

Sergeant Fergus MacDonald

Fergus MacDonald is an older man, slim of build and with feature reminiscent of a slum dweller. His eyes are set too close, and his lips are narrow, twisting down at the corners. Resembling a ferret, MacDonald's claim to fame is his association with the young crack shot, Mark Anders, whom he had the distinction of training. He has ginger hair and large freckles on his hands. Fergus is one of the ones intent on the new order of trade unions and Karl Marx. He gave Mark his first Martini Hendry rifle and is jealous of the bond that forms immediately between Mark and the Brigadier-General Courtney.

Fergus is an ambitious man, and takes hold of the ideals of communism. He whips the workers' into a frenzy, lying to them if necessary to get them to strike, and then even take up arms against the 'bosses' and everything they stand for. He promises them a brave new world in which white men won't lose their jobs to black men - just as soon as they take this world down. Armed and dangerous, these men fight with him and he leads them into a bloody battle with government that ends in Fordsburg where it started. Fergus is one of the last to die, after using a machine gun called a Vicker's gun to mow down soldiers as they stood waiting for transport when the fighting was supposedly over. Mark is sent to flush out the unknown man in his machine gun nest, and when Fergus sees him coming, he goes down to intercept him, leaving the Vicker's gun with his wife Helena and encouraging her to shoot for him. She does so, but before too many more are killed, Mark finds a shot and takes it, not knowing who he is shooting until he hears her scream for Fergus. Fergus loses all reason then, and goes after Mark as he climbs the stairs to Helena. They grapple and Fergus ends up hanging over the edge of



the stairs with Mark holding him, but instead of giving in, he raises his gun to shoot Mark, forcing Mark to let him drop to his death.

Dirk Courtney

A large man with wide and powerful shoulders, Dirk Courtney has a strong chin, and perfect white teeth inside a wide and determined mouth. His eyes are dark and intelligent, and he radiates strength. Ruled by greed, Dirk bought his way into the Ladyburg Farmers Bank by making Ronald Pye a deal he could not refuse. Six hundred thousand pounds in cash bought him sixty percent of the Bank's shares, and a piece of Ronald Pye's soul in the bargain. Having left his home in Ladyburg as a young man estranged from his father and family, Dirk returned as a rich man surrounded by dark rumors of his unsavory character.

After gaining controlling interest in the bank, Dirk continues with bigger plans, happily killing anyone who gets in his way. The first victim of his plans of progress is John Anders, the grandfather who raised Mark. Dirk has him killed because he refuses to sell his property to him, and it is the only property with water on it to further his plans of development. Once John Anders is out of the way, Dirk tries to get his father Sean to go into business with him. He tells Sean that with his power in government, he could easily get Parliament to agree to the damming of Chaka's Gate and the subsequent flooding of the Bubezi River Valley for the purposes of farming and irrigation. When Sean instead has the area ratified as a National Park, Dirk shows his true colors, threatening to kill his father as well if he stands in his way.

Instead of taking that radical course of action though, Dirk instead pursues a seat in government. He wants Sean's seat, and runs with the National Party for Hertzog. He wins this seat by publicly denouncing his father as the Butcher of Fordsburg because of his role in the labor strike there, and promises the local farmers that when he implements his plan they will be much better off. He fills them with promises of schools and hospitals, farmland and unending irrigation. The seat is taken from his father by only a few hundred votes, but the whole situation takes a great deal of life out of Sean.

In a new position of power, Dirk is unstoppable. He uses the media to further his goal by loudly proclaiming the unfairness of Marion Littlejohn's death, and telling his constituents that wildlife has no place this close to development. His plans would of course ensure their safety.

Marion Littlejohn

Young and pretty, Marion has a small face with a snub nose that is freckled. She has a quick smile, and a direct demeanor, and is the object of Mark's first proposal. Working at the land registry office, she meets Mark when he first comes to Ladyburg looking for information about his grandfather's death, and the subsequent dispersal of Andersland. She has a strong and unyielding love for Mark, and after their first consummation, she writes him daily - long letters filled with love and promise of their future together. Mark is



so consumed by Storm after meeting her that he can scarcely think of anything else. When their affair begins, he goes to Marion, tells her that he isn't ready for marriage, and wants to break their engagement. She isn't easily deterred and to his dismay promises to wait for him. Much later, when he returns to her after he and Storm have their falling out, she has no problem with the idea of living at Chaka's Gate with him. They quickly wed, and she immediately takes note of the rise in her social status, concerned more with that than with her love for Mark, much as Storm had done.

Living at Chaka's Gate is no easy feat, but she does so with enthusiasm. Sadly, her enthusiasm ends there though. She has little interest in the things that Mark is passionate about, and even when he is enthusiastically telling her about something that is obviously of great importance to him, she is more interested in the drapes she wants to buy. Her attitude does not improve until she discovers she is pregnant, and suddenly she finds a new appreciation for life around her. She goes out to collect mushrooms and stumbles across a cub that a lioness has moved in preparation for the coming season changes. Thinking it is abandoned, she makes her first mistake by approaching it. Filled with the joys of coming motherhood herself, she lets those maternal feelings guide her as she tries to decide how to take this baby home with her. She doesn't hear the lioness until she is just fifty yards away, and then she makes her second mistake. She screams in terror, causing the lioness to panic and lunge for her. The mauling is terrible and Marion's continued screaming only furthers the cat's protective behavior. The lioness doesn't stop until Marion is dead.

Storm Courtney

As dainty as a hummingbird, Storm Courtney almost floats with a grace that is breathtaking. She has large, dark and haunting eyes and a bold brow that is pale and wide. Her hair is deeply black and lustrous and hangs in a tumble of thick waves. She has long and tapered fingers attached to strong hands, and is tall with a tiny waist. Her long legs and poise complete a picture of almost sculpted beauty. Her neck is swanlike, long and delicate, and her mouth is full of small and regular teeth. She has a teasing demeanor, and drives with the ease and confidence of a man, fast and sure. In the sunlight, her eyes are the color of polished sapphires.

Though in the beginning she is full of herself and her position in life, her relationship with Mark is an eye opening experience. Becoming pregnant with his child just before she walks out on him, her sense of pride and the thought that she would lose her dignity won't allow her to return to him, so instead she marries a man who is despised by most who know him, including her father, Sean. Derek Hunt is a pig, and in a very short time, Storm is asking for a divorce. She winds up in a small cottage with the son she names John and it is there that Mark sees her again for the first time since she left Lion's Kop. Stunned by the likeness of the child to him, it takes little time for him to realize it is his, and he is even more amazed at the changes in Storm. No longer the spoiled and self-involved young lady he knew before, she now has a quiet confidence and grace that only adds to her considerable beauty. Sadly, Mark is married to Marion, and Storm won't allow him to disgrace his relationship with her by leaving her to be with them. This all



changes when Marion is killed by a lioness at Chaka's Gate, and when Mark approaches her a second time, she makes the decision to go with him to Chaka's Gate.

Now an up and coming artist, she has already had her first successful exhibition, and looks at life through new eyes. She recognizes beauty where before she hardly saw at all.

Jan Christiaan Smuts

Prime Minister, he is also a General, although he is a small man with hands that are almost fragile. The demeanor of a philosopher or a scholar is accentuated by his neat and pointed beard. Despite his small frame, he carries a vital force and has an awesome presence and power of character. He has a compelling voice, and is a knowledgeable botanist. Actively interested in the preservation of the African wildlife, he is a staunch supporter in Parliament for Sean and Mark while they strive to make the lands at Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River Valley a National Park. Jan Smuts is so impressed with Mark when they first meet that he also gives him the position of warden in the National Park lands once they are ratified.

Though he loses his seat in congress, a strong supporter climbs down from his to put Smuts back into a position of influence, and Smuts gratefully accepts.

Helena MacDonald

Helena is the wife of Fergus MacDonald. She is in her early thirties and still good looking with fine cheekbones and dark eyes that radiate intelligence. She is sure of herself and uses her hands to emphasize her speech. Her hands are strong, the fingers tapered gracefully ending in short and well kept fingernails. Her short hair is dark brown and full of curls, and she is well aware of her sexuality and how to use it. Her skin is creamy olive colored and her breasts are large for her slim frame. She smokes cigarettes, which is uncommon for women in this time period, and her first and second fingers are yellowed with nicotine.

Ruth Courtney

Wife of General Sean Courtney, Ruth is one of Natal's first ladies. A renowned beauty, though well past forty, she has a shrewd eye and is fiercely protective of Sean. Still slim and lovely, she has no trouble arousing her husband with ease, although her body is no longer able to produce children - let alone a son like Sean so badly wanted. Quick and strong in mind and body, she has small, pointed breasts and long shapely legs.



Pungushe

The name given by Mark because of his cunning and hunting ability, Pungushe means Jackal. This Zulu, a warrior who fought with Bombata at the gorge, is a mighty hunter who came to be so when the soldiers came and took away his cattle. He is a man of about forty, who is in excellent physique. His muscles are clearly defined and the skin itself is lighter than that of most Zulu's. He has a broad forehead, and his eyes are dark, fierce and proud. He has just a touch of frosting at the temples of his short dark hair. Pungushe has three wives, seven sons and six daughters.

Derek Hunt

Derek is an overweight and unattractive man, married twice before taking Storm as his third bride. His large belly bulges out over his belt, and his skin is heavily freckled. His arms are long and thick and they are covered with a fuzz of ginger colored hair. His skin has a raw and red look, with the purplish glaze of a heavy drinker. His lack of handsome looks is echoed in his disgusting behavior, belching and groping Storm in public, humiliating her in front of her friends with apparent glee. Already having seven children between two wives, he has little concern for social niceties. He has heavy shoulders, pitted and scarred purple with a myriad of small boils. For breakfast, he enjoyed mixing Black Velvet, and Champagne, giving him a permanent watery and pink-rimmed look.

John Courtney

John is Mark's son by Storm Courtney, a robust young man with a cap of golden hair and penetrating eyes like his father. Good strong lungs and a captivating demeanor earn him the name Phimbo, meaning little man with a great voice. Robust, bold and aggressive, he becomes a quick favorite of the Zulu man and his family.

Ronald Pye

Ronald is an older man whose once prosperous bulges have sagged, and jowls have begun to droop. Once enjoying controlling interest in the Ladyburg Farmers Bank, Ronald had sold controlling interest to Dirk Courtney ten years previously. The deal had been attractive - six hundred thousand pounds in cash for sixty percent interest in the bank, but what had really swung the deal in Dirk's favor was Ronald's desire to get even with General Sean Courtney, Dirk's estranged father. Now, he bitterly regrets the deal.

Hobday

Hobday has a heavy smooth jaw without whiskers, and his teeth appear as though they've been ground down flat into an even line. He is darkly sun tanned, making his white teeth stand out in stark contrast. His head is round in shape like a large cannon



ball, and his neck is small and thick, giving the impression of a heavyweight boxer. He is stocky in build, with thick broad shoulders, and a brusque laugh. He has a nasty demeanor, easily admitting that he likes to 'break a head' now and then. With the look of a killer, he enjoys tormenting, and takes pleasure out of watching other people in pain. He is insolent, and has little or no respect for women. He takes pride in his ability to push every dollars worth out of the men who work for him, and his loyalty is fierce and unswerving.



Objects/Places

Cuthbert

A realistic dummy, from the waist up resembling a rookie complete with helmet riding at a natural angle on it's head. Used to lure a sniper out of hiding, it is nothing more than a broom handle from the waist down, manipulated by Fergus McDonald leaving the younger Mark Anders to take the shot.

Andersland

Eight thousand acres of loamy ground and four miles of river frontage with good water that is owned by Mark's grandfather, John Anders, and was named by him thirty years before. Also, the only home Mark has ever known. A key property as it is the only one in the area with water on it.

Chaka's Gate

Declared a hunting reserve in 1869, Chaka's Gate is a vast wilderness that the men of Zululand and northern Natal saw as their own private hunting reserve. It is the area where John Anders lost his life to an apparent hunting accident after he had 'fallen on his rifle'.

Hooters

Mine employees charged with calling each shift in to work, the hooters are so named for the mournful wailing howl that is their signature summons.

Natal Motors

Mark's first job in Durban is as a salesman for Natal Motors under the direct supervision of Dicky Lancome.

Emoyeni

The Zulu name that graces the town home of General Sean Courtney. Entered via two white gates, the property sits on the crest of the hills that surround the town of Durban. Small herds of partially domesticated game roam the grounds and the driveway is so long that even after the gate is out of sight, the house can't be seen. Half-wild, but still groomed and well looked after, the landscape is like a fantasy with a low bridge that



crosses the neck of an artificial lake. The house is like a Spanish palace, its roof tiled in candy pink and surrounded by vibrant and blazing flowerbeds.

Africa Cup

Name given to the award that represents the finest rifleman and his division. It is an award that has long gone to Colonel Hamilton of the Cape Town Highlanders, but with Mark Anders help, General Sean Courtney is convinced that this coming February they will take the cup from him at last. The Africa Cup stands just about as high as a man's chest, and is on a base of polished ebony.

ZARPS

Zuid Afrikaanse Republick Polisie, used in a derogatory fashion by the striking union workers.

Fordsburg

Hometown of Fergus and Helena MacDonald, and final stronghold of rebel striking forces where a last stand is made.

Sjambok

A long, vicious tapered whip made from the cured hide of a hippo and used to inflict pain and punishment on the men Harry Fisher deems as traitors or cowards. Wielded by a man, it can cut the skin to ribbons with little exertion.

Trades Hall

Located on the corners of Center and Commercial in Fordsburg, it is the stronghold of the strikers, and the center of operations.

Cocoa Pan

Used to truck waste materials to the rock dump by way of rail lines, cocoa pans are small four wheeled tip-trucks coupled together and made of steel. Mark uses one of these to hide behind and avoid Vickers gun fire as he makes his way to the nest Fergus and Helena are holed up in.



Vickers Gun

A machine gun with capability of firing multiple rounds from a belt of ammunition that is fed into it. Used by Fergus, it is a ruthless killing machine.

Lion's Kop

The first home Sean took Ruth to after they were married, and the place she considers to be their special home. Overlooking the Ladyburg Valley, it is the center and fortress of their lives.

Great Longwood

A pretentious name given to the home built by Dirk Courtney on the land that borders that of his father, Sean.

Slag Yster

A killing iron, and the name given to a trap that weighs thirty pounds. The jaws are so strong that it takes a thick branch or more to lever them open, and it is an instrument used by poachers in Chaka's Gate.

Assegai

Designed by King Chaka in the days of Zulu wars, this is a broad bladed stabbing spear which can go into a man with such force that when it's removed, it sucks the life blood out of a man as though it were done by machine.

Ngaga

The Zulu name for pangolin which is a scaly ant eater resembling an armadillo. This nocturnal creature scurries around like a wizened old man stopping to look closely at anything in it's path and then continuing on if caught out in daylight.

Abelungu

Zulu word for white man.

Silwane

Zulu name for wild animals.



Sakubona

'I see you', the traditional Zulu greeting, usually followed by the name.

Tokoloshe

A mythical creature from Zulu magical legend.

Umhlanga Rocks

A small seaside village along the coastline on one side of the main port of Durban across the Umgeni River where Storm and her baby, John live after she leaves Derek. Also the home that Mark and Storm retire to in 1973.



Themes

Preservation vs Progress

This is a story that highlights the constant struggle to maintain a balance between progress and preservation. While one man advocates development and what he perceives as progress, another fights for the preservation of wildlife and the natural resources that he grew up learning to appreciate and love. Dirk Courtney is determined to increases his wealth regardless of the cost to others or to the environment. While he has the money and the means to further development in the Chaka Gate and Bubezi Valley areas, his vision is shortsighted at best. He manages to gain the support of locals by promising them prosperity and unlimited water supplies to further their farming endeavors, but he neglects to take into account the permanent losses that would occur as a result. Though this story is told in the first quarter of the nineteen hundreds, it is a struggle that is ongoing in all areas of the world today. Dirk's goal is to flood the Bubezi Valley by damming the natural rock faces at Chaka's Gate, and in doing so create thousands of acres of arable land to grow crops and a large lake with which to irrigate them.

The opposition to this plan begins with Mark Anders who first crosses paths with Dirk when he investigates his grandfather's death. Returning from the war in France to the land he grew up on, he discovers it has been sold to a front company owned by three men. The primary investor in this enterprise is Dirk Courtney. Mark digs deeper, and learns that his grandfather was likely killed by Dirk's men, although he has no proof, but by investigating, he finds that he suddenly has a price on his head. He goes back to Chaka's Gate to find his grandfather's grave, and relearns his appreciation for the untouched beauty and wilderness of the area. It is not quite as his grandfather remembered it. Already, the land has seen a change because Chaka's Gate was considered a hunting preserve. As such, there are no elephant roaming the land, buffalo are all but non-existent, and the mighty lion that depends on large game for survival is also gone. Mark's trip to Chaka's Gate restores his deep appreciation for the area, and begins his fight to save the area from development. In a strange twist of fate, Mark finds himself hired as the warden in charge of preserving and protecting the land he loves and his strongest supporter and benefactor is Dirk's father. Sean Courtney whom Mark meets for the first time in France during the war. Their bond is strong and trusting, deepening with their shared distrust of the estranged son, Dirk. It is a fitting legacy for Sean Courtney, who spent much of his youth hunting in Chaka's Gate and is horrified to find that now the larger game in the area that he once knew to be so plentiful is all but eradicated by shortsighted human interference. Building a great wealth for himself by taking from the earth, he finally learns that the value is not in the money but in the preservation of all wildlife and natural beauty in the area he plundered thoughtlessly as a younger man. Now his legacy includes the funding of the preservation efforts that he finds infinitely more satisfying. It is a lesson his son, Dirk cannot grasp.



White Labor vs Black Labor

The mines in Africa are fraught with conflict as the two sides struggle to exist side by side. It is early in the year 1922 when rising costs force mine owners to replace high paid white labor with lower paid and less skilled black men in order to maintain profits and keep from closing mining enterprises. The white man has long considered this their domain, while the black men were nothing more than slaves to be bought and sold at whim. Once equality begins, and slavery is discouraged, the white man begins to lose pace against his counterparts. Demands for higher wages and better working conditions leave mine owners and operators little choice but to close mines or cut costs. In an effort to keep the mines producing, the owners look to black labor willing to work for much less, and complain much less about conditions as anything is an improvement of their former lives of slavery. While the white man has become increasingly greedy, the black man is content to earn a wage of any kind.

This becomes a subject of great conflict as the mine owners try to reduce costs against rising expenses, hiring black labor at a cheaper rate instead of closing the mines outright. White labor rebelled starting a civil war that forced the government to declare martial law. The result was a bloody battle where many lost their lives, largely because of the inflated rhetoric of a few men who adopted a Communist/Marxist ideal. Storing weapons in great numbers, they looked and waited for an excuse to bring the entire matter to a head, and that opportunity presented itself when the government became aware of their weapons cache. Forewarned, Fordsburg became a bloody battleground and the center of the conflict. The needless slaughter that resulted could have been much worse had there not been such cool heads at the helm of the government's response.

Love vs Position

Mark Anders first proposes to Marion Littlejohn largely because he is taken by her willingness to please him, despite how little pleasure she derives. In an effort to keep him interested in her, Marion offers Mark the physical contact she has little interest in, and Mark is the man who takes her virginity. In an act that is more painful than pleasurable for Marion, she still promises to improve her skills in that area, merely to keep him. Her dedication to his happiness at the expense of her own comfort is largely what inspires Mark to propose, as friendship is as far as they have gone at that stage.

When Mark meets Storm Courtney for the first time, chemistry takes over. His mind and heart are completely devoted, and though he has never so much as kissed her at first, he can't stop thinking about her. His feelings for Storm are raw and impulsive, and though Storm fights it at every turn, she feels the same way. When they finally consummate their relationship, they are so taken with each other that they risk the wrath of her father to continue their secret trysts. Storm and Mark have different ideas about where their lives will take them though. Storm is used to wealth and the power of her position. She uses it indiscriminately, even causing Mark to be fired in the beginning



from his job at Natal Motors. It is her position that she is unwilling to lose when she refuses to see Mark's vision of the future. Angry because he won't trade his position as warden of the newly created National Park at Chaka's Gate for one of white-collar position and power, she leaves him. Unfortunately, she is already pregnant by then and in a desperate attempt to keep from disgracing herself, she marries a man she believes has money and position. The fact that she doesn't love him is irrelevant. It is much more important to her at this point to save face. She marries Derek Hunt, who unknown to her is much the same as she is. Having lost his fortune to two ex wives and seven children as well as a variety of bad business decisions, he marries Storm despite her pregnancy to gain access to her father's money and the power it brings. It is not a marriage that brings either happiness.

Knowing Storm is married breaks Mark's resolve. Despite his love for Storm, he approaches the only other woman who has expressed true interest in how he feels - he thinks. He goes to Marion Littlejohn, looking for another chance, and she is only to happy to oblige. They are married quickly, and she has no problems with moving into the wilds of Chaka's Gate with him, but theirs is a loveless relationship from the start. Marion enjoys the newfound status that her marriage to Mark brings her, and is more than willing to play wife and housewife in return. Their lovemaking never improves because there is no love there to begin with, and mutual respect while great for friendship is not something that a long-term marriage can be built on. All Mark can think about is Storm, and he can't help but compare the two women with Marion coming up short by a long shot. The result of both of these relationships - Storm's and Mark's - is that no one is happy. The position these weddings brought each woman brought just that and nothing more.



Style

Point of View

While Wilbur Smith uses primarily the third person perspective as narrator, and switches back and forth between the most important characters. Adeptly weaving this tale, he uses each character reliably and confidently to create a straightforward and enjoyable read. Beginning with General Sean Courtney, the point of view is woven around the war in France, and the contribution of Mark Anders. These are the two main characters, although there are several supporting characters that are of equal importance in the story's development. The narration includes in depth emotions of its main characters, helping the reader to understand the growth and motivation of each. For example, Mark Anders grew up in the Bubezi River Valley and Chaka's Gate areas with his grandfather, John Anders. When Mark returns from the war, he discovers his grandfather is dead, and Andersland, his grandfather's property and his inheritance, has been taken from him. In an effort to trace those responsible, he finds himself in a fight for his life, and realizes the importance of Andersland to the man who engineered its theft.

The other character most important to this story is Sean Courtney. He and Mark meet for the first time on the battlefield in France, and surprisingly again after the first attempt on Mark's life. In a well-scripted tale, Sean brings Mark back into his life, employing him and coming to think of him as his son. This is highly relevant as the story plays out because Sean has disowned and is estranged from his natural son, Dirk, a cunning and ruthless man who thinks nothing of killing to accomplish his goal of greater wealth and power. Dirk is the architect behind the theft of Andersland and the death of John Anders. As the story evolves, and Dirk discovers Mark asking questions, he commissions men to kill him as well. In his pursuit of greater wealth, his history includes the senseless slaughter of over a hundred men, women and children, which enables him to buy controlling interest in a local bank. After engineering the death of John Anders and the appropriation of his land, Dirk approaches his father with a plan that is as horrifying as it is large. Dirk wants to flood the Bubezi Valley by damming Chaka's Gate, and use the land around it to grow crops for profit.

Mark and Sean team up to fight this plan by establishing a National Park, and declaring the area a wildlife preserve. Throughout it all, Mark learns about women and love, falling hard and losing just as hard, and the emotional growth is well articulated and surprising at times. It's an excellent story, well told and easily read.

Setting

While A Sparrow Falls begins in France, the story is set mostly in Africa. A Sparrow Falls centers on the struggle to preserve the natural beauty and wilderness of Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River Valley. In its stunning descriptions of wildlife and the natural beauty of Africa, it is easy to be swept up into the desire to preserve Africa, and fight



those who use progress as an excuse to lay waste to all in their path. The area of Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River Valley are under threat of destruction by ambitious men who prefer profit to preservation. As the population increases, the wilderness and wildlife therein is pushed further and further back, the loss of their natural habitat threatening their very existence.

Sean Courtney is a central character, owning thousands of acres of land in his property called Lion's Kop alone, and is a staunch supporter of the African Wildlife Protection Society first conceived by Mark Anders. His will and subsequent financial contribution makes it possible for the Society to be administered without government funding, and guaranteeing the survival of the wilderness in the areas of Chaka's Gate and the Bubezi River valley.

Mark Anders moves from Ladyburg, the nearest town to Andersland, which is the property his grandfather owned, to Fordsburg when he is chased out by the man who wants control of the land, and then back to Durban where he launches a fight to save the area he grew up in and was taught to love and appreciate. He finally lives in Chaka's Gate until his retirement in 1973 when he moves with his wife Storm to Umhlanga Rocks on the Natal Coast.

Language and Meaning

A Sparrow Falls is written most in English, but Wilbur Smith interlaces the text with many Zulu references, and native African names and titles. This lends to the realism and authenticity of the story, taking the reader right into the wilderness. The Zulu language used is descriptive, with names derived by the behavior of the people. The main characters are fluent in Zulu as well as English, and are therefore understood by the Zulu natives they encounter. Mark Anders for example, refers to the tracks of a barefooted man in Chaka's Gate as Pungushe, meaning jackal. He uses this name for him throughout the story, while the Zulu named Pungushe by him, calls him Jamela, meaning he who looks but cannot see. There are references made to the mythical creature Tokoloshe from Zulu magical legend to describe the mysterious lioness prints that Pungushe creates to lead a hunting party away from the actual animal for long enough to lead her to safety.

Pungushe goes on to name Mark or Jamela's son, John - calling him Phimbo meaning little man with a great voice and Mark introduces his wife Storm to Pungushe by using the Zulu translation of the word Storm, Vungu Vungu. When Jamela and Pungushe speak of Mark's grandfather, he is referred to as Ixhegu. The Zulu man often describes people by their behavior, such as 'the man who laughed all the time and walked with the noise of a buffalo herd' or 'the silent one'. These are just a few examples of the many Zulu words are phrases that bring this story to a realistic light for the reader.



Structure

A Sparrow Falls is divided into a hundred and fifty four sections similar to chapters, but not actually labeled as such. The beginning is centered on the Great War in France and the participation therein of Mark Anders, Fergus MacDonald and Sean Courtney. When they return home to Africa, their interaction takes them from the Bubezi River Valley to the heights of Chaka's Gate. While most of the story centers on the preservation of the area known as Chaka's Gate, there is also a considerable portion devoted to the homes belonging to Sean Courtney, Emoyeni and Lion's Kop.

There are also several 'chapters' devoted to the area around Johannesburg and Fordsburg where civil upheaval surrounding labor and striking workers is concerned. Fordsburg is the center of the striker's stronghold, and the last city to be brought back under control with government having to resort to martial law to accomplish their task. The result loses Sean Courtney a seat in Congress that he held from 1910 forward.
