Ria quits her job before anyone can accuse her of passing information to Danny regarding real estate deals. Rosemary is unhappy with Ria because all she talks about is Danny.

Barney arranges for Ria to have a job at a dress rental shop named Polly's. Ria learns that Polly is Barney's mistress.



Ria meets Danny's parents. She is surprised at how different Danny is from his quiet and reserved family. Danny's parents will not come to the wedding because it is too far to travel.

Ria is told that her entire wedding party can be outfitted at Polly's at no charge. Ria is ecstatic.

Ria attends an event at Barney's house and meets his wife, Mona. Ria likes Mona immediately.

Danny gets a new job with Barney.

Ria meets Polly at the store. Gertie, Ria's co-worker, has a great fondness for Polly.

Gertie comes to work one day with a noticeable bruise on her face. Polly tells Ria that Gertie's boyfriend, Jack, often beats Gertie. Ria is appalled. Polly says Gertie will not leave Jack.

Ria and Rosemary go to see the psychic recommended by Hilary. The psychic tells Ria that she will have two children and a miscarriage. The woman also tells Ria that she will be successful in her own business and travel to America. Ria is puzzled. Rosemary's reading is unsatisfactory. There is no husband in Rosemary's future, nor are their children. Rosemary will, however, be very successful in business. Rosemary dismisses the psychic's visions.

Ria and Danny spend every spare moment working on the house. They discuss buying a car. Barney presents the couple with a new car.

Hilary stops coming round Tara Road. Hilary is extremely jealous of Ria and her new life.

Ria gets Hilary involved with the new baby. Ria and Hilary make up.

Ria goes into labor. She cannot find Danny. Ria calls Hilary, who takes her to the hospital.

Polly calls Danny in a panic. Barney is having a heart attack. Danny rushes to Barney's side and takes him to the hospital. Danny is unaware that Ria is in labor.

Gertie has another episode with Jack. They make up and decide to get married.

Barney recovers from his heart attack. Danny gets to Ria too late - the baby has been born. It is a girl. Hilary is furious at Danny.

Nora moves to Tara Road and takes a job caring for an older woman. Nora thrives.

Polly wonders about Barney's influence on Danny. Polly knows that Danny is cheating on Ria.



Rosemary meets Colm Barry. Colm tells Rosemary he is in AA.

Ria wonders if Mona knows about Barney's affair and chooses to keep her head in the sand.

Ria promises herself to take many photos of baby Annie.

Ria and Danny enjoy going to sales and auctions to find items for the house. The couple spends a lot of time at home.

Chapter 1 Analysis

The reader meets the essential characters up to this point. At first Ria is a shy girl with low self esteem. She lives in the shadow of her vivacious sister, Hilary. Rosemary plays the same role in Ria's life. Meanwhile, Ria is constantly being lectured about appropriate behavior from her mother who says that she will not raise "cheap" daughters. If a girl gives herself to a man, then no man will marry her. Hilary ignores her mother's advice. Shockingly, the party girl Hilary completely changes her behaviors and marries Martin, a dull, frugal and worrisome man. Hilary becomes stodgy and reserved.

Rosemary brings out Ria's more confident side. Although Rosemary is stunning and vivacious, she is not at all a flirt or tease. There is a joke that the office has a pool on which man, if any, will ever get past Rosemary's defenses.

Ria is instantly smitten with Danny Lynch. Danny is Ria's dream man - ambitious, charismatic, and handsome. Danny is a charmer who sweeps Ria off her feet. Ria feels lucky. Rosemary is somewhat jealous because she eventually wants to get married and have children but there is no man in sight.

Nora is right to warn Ria about Danny. However, Ria is in love and is not willing to listen to her mother or sister. Ria also ignores the red flag regarding Danny's parents and the fact that he has distanced himself from them. Ria is determined to have a relationship with Danny's parents, particularly after Annie is born.

Hilary's new lifestyle does not afford her the same kind of luxuries as Ria, although Ria explains that those luxuries are hard won and bought at discount. Hilary thinks that Ria no longer needs her since she has the perfect life. Ria tells Hilary that she needs her, particularly during the pregnancy because she is scared.

The appearance of Barney presents opportunities. However, Barney is very slick and perhaps should not be trusted wholeheartedly as Danny seems to think. Barney openly flaunts his mistress, Polly. Barney takes Polly to all public affairs and also travels with her while Mona stays at home. Ria feels like a traitor because she genuinely likes Mona. It is assumed that Mona is happy with her luxury-style life and does not want to rock the boat by confronting Barney.



Barney is a generous and likeable man. However, it is apparent that Danny has become beholden to him rather quickly. It does not go unnoticed that Danny has lied about Barney's whereabouts when he has his heart attack. In some ways, it seems - at least to Hilary and Ria - that Danny has chosen Barney over his wife. Hilary will not forgive Danny for not being with Ria when Annie is born.

The situation with Gertie and Jack is frustrating for all of Gertie's friends. Polly tells Ria that she has tried to get Gertie to leave Jack but Gertie always refuses. Since Polly and Gertie are close friends, it seems that no one will be able to convince Gertie. Still, Ria tries. Gertie falls into the cycle of abuse. Jack remains sober for a time and Gertie is convinced that this time he has changed. No one else believes it. Gertie marries Jack much to everyone's dismay. It is clear that Gertie's life will get worse as times goes on.



Chapter 2 Summary

Rosemary's mother is a woman who believes she and her family belong in society and should act with class. The family does not have money but the attitudes are there to a degree. Rosemary's mother remains dismayed that Rosemary is unmarried. Rosemary's sister, Eileen, is a lesbian.

Rosemary tries to get her mother to go to dinner at Quentin's. Rosemary's mother feels the place will be filled with "jumped up" politicians, the wealthy and business people while they will be unknowns. Rosemary wins the argument. In Quentin's, Rosemary points out the booth where people go when they want to be discreet. When she peeks into the booth, she sees Danny and Orla.

Danny believes that Nora knows all and constantly compliments her on her vast knowledge. Danny also says Nora looks like Audrey Hepburn in "Breakfast at Tiffany's" and begins to call her Holly after the Holly Golightly character.

Rosemary goes to the bank and is admired by all of the people there as she is a smart and successful woman that is always well turned out.

Rosemary runs into Orla. Orla has joined AA.

Colm opens a restaurant on Tara Road.

Ria goes to visit Danny's parents. Ria's father asks if they were in town. Someone had spotted Danny. Ria was not with Danny. Ria assumes the other woman was Polly as she often traveled with Barney and Danny.

Ria and Danny throw a lavish party. Danny instructs Ria to invite Barney and Polly and not to mention the event to Mona. Ria feels guilty.

Rosemary is angry with Danny for his behavior. At the party Orla gets drunk and rages about Danny's infidelity to her. Ria learns the truth. Danny breaks off the relationship with Orla. Rosemary tells Orla to let go.

Much to everyone's surprise, Jack remains sober.

Nora becomes social butterfly and begins to play bridge.

Ria invites Sheila and Max to visit. The couples discuss big changes in Ireland. Sheila thinks about moving back to Ireland from Connecticut. While Sheila visits, she takes Ria and others to see the psychic. The psychic tells Ria she is pregnant. When Danny finds out, he is upset. Ria strikes back.



Orla returns to AA. Orla wants to become a singer. Colm offers her a part-time position at his restaurant.

Ria gives birth to Brian. Gertie and Sheila also have children around the same time.

Rosemary continues to have a high profile around Dublin. Rosemary is still not content and decides to try a marriage agency.

Colm's restaurant opens.

Rosemary talks to Danny about buying a house. One is chosen and renovations begin.

Ria worries about Gertie. Gertie leaves Jack and moves in with her mother.

Ria is upset about Rosemary's comments that her house is musty. Ria asks Gertie to spruce up the parlor.

Barney begins to worry about his cash flow. The house on Tara Road is put up for mortgage on his behalf.

Rosemary moves into her new house.

Ria thinks about going back to work now that the children are older. Ria puts aside the work issue and wants to focus on the garden. Ria decides to at least do a patch up job since Danny is against complete renovation.

Sheila invites Hilary to go to the U.S.

Ria goes to visit Mona. Mona does not seem at all worried about money. She has been broke before. Besides, Barney always has a back up plan.

Colm makes a deal with Ria. He will fix up the garden if he can grow vegetables for his restaurant. Ria agrees.

Ria and Danny have a seventh birthday party for Brian. Annie fusses over spending the afternoon with children younger than herself. Annie also worries about her looks and wants to look more like Rosemary.

Gertie arrives at the house to help with the party. Jack demands that she bring ten pounds from the house and waits on the road. Gertie tries to preserve her dignity and says she will work for the money. Rosemary tells Ria to stop enabling Gertie.

Annie leaves the house and goes for a walk. She goes to Rosemary's and sees Rosemary engaging in sex with a man. Annie is shocked and horrified. Annie runs and falls down in front of the restaurant. Colm picks Annie up off the ground and soothes her. Colm takes Annie home.

Ria has everything she has ever wanted and is grateful.



Chapter 2 Analysis

Time begins to go by quickly. New friends are introduced into the mix. Danny maintains his friendship with Barney and almost seems to become Barney's slave, even putting up 16 Tara Road to secure Barney's financial future. Oddly enough, Ria supports this gesture even though it was already done when she learned about the mortgage.

Brian is now seven years old; Annie is 12. Ria begins to feel restless. Danny likes the way things are and likes knowing that Ria is at home. Ria considers having another child as a way to fill her days but knows Danny will most likely not be receptive.

Rosemary's life seems picture perfect to those on the outside but Rosemary is not content and wants to be married with children. Thus far the psychic's predictions have been right, much to Rosemary's dismay.

Ria seems fine with ignoring Danny's relationship with Orla. Rosemary seems to be angrier about Danny's infidelity. One might surmise that Danny and Ria are patterning their marriage after Barney and Mona's marriage, even if it is unintentional.



Chapter 3 Summary

Ria and Annie go shopping. Annie is 14 years old now. Nora had given Annie a large gift card to buy anything she likes. Annie and Ria cannot agree. Annie becomes frustrated with Ria although Ria offers no advice. Annie thinks Ria has given up. Annie compares Ria to the always well dressed Rosemary. Ria decides to leave Annie to shop on her own while she returns home to wait for the delivery of a sander. Ria is refinishing the floors in the house.

People often visit Tara Road, especially on Saturdays. Danny does not like having so many people in and out of the house. Nora never drops by uninvited nor does she ever stay long, lest she wear out her welcome. Nora often leaves her strange little dog, Pliers, at the house while she goes to the nursing home.

Rosemary now owns the printing company and continues to be very successful.

Ria and Rosemary continue to agree on almost everything but Gertie and her situation.

Ria thinks about getting a job or having one more baby.

Gertie continues to beg for money, much to Ria's dismay.

Danny talks about how the house on Tara Road is now worth a fortune. Ria reminds him that they have no intentions of selling it. Tara Road is changing with new neighbors and new developments plus the addition of Colm's restaurant.

Ria laments that her sex life with Danny is dwindling. Ria begins to wonder if her family is falling apart. Danny seems to be gone a great deal of the time. He tells Ria that he is working hard. Ria begins to feel the effects of the empty nest syndrome. She feels especially sad when she learns that no one will be home for dinner. That night when Danny returns early, Ria insists that they go to Colm's restaurant for a nice meal.

During dinner, Ria calmly announces that it is time to have another baby. Danny's face goes white. After a few minutes of discussion, Danny tells Ria that he has been seeing another woman, Bernadette. Bernadette is pregnant. Danny wants to leave Ria and the children to be with Bernadette. Ria faints. Colm cares for Ria and Danny goes home.

Ria goes home late. She and Danny talk. The scene turns ugly. Danny explains that there is no turning back. He wants to be with Bernadette. Danny says they have fallen out of love. Ria says she has not changed, nor have her feelings. Danny tells Ria not to make it harder than it has to be. Danny says they must talk to the children. Ria says Danny must explain since she does not understand herself.



The scene with the children turns nasty. Both children are angry and cry. They understand that Danny has another woman and that they are going to have a baby. Brian tells Danny that if he is going to go, he should go now. Danny leaves. The next morning Ria suggests that the children speak to Danny so that they can ask questions and better understand the situation.

Ria makes a list of things to do which includes calling her mother, Hilary, Rosemary, Gertie and Colm. Hilary, Rosemary and Nora tell Ria to hold onto the house on Tara Road. Ria functions on autopilot.

Chapter 3 Analysis

Ria could not be more shocked by Danny's news. Ria is happy and feels that they have made a life together. They are older and busier, especially with the children but it is a good life. Danny disagrees. Danny also tells Ria not to make it more difficult than it already is. Ria is stunned by Danny's callousness. Ria realizes that Barney and Polly knew about the other woman. Ria also realizes that while she likes Polly and Mona, she has never liked Barney.

Ria is in shock and it is unclear how she will react to the situation once she returns to her senses.



Chapter 4 Summary

Ria continues to work on autopilot. She manages to fill her days with household chores, attempting to have some sense of normalcy. Meanwhile, the days go by without notice. Ria never really knows if it is day or night. Ria maintains the hope that Danny will come to his senses and return home. Even Polly says that the affair with Bernadette will not last. Danny seems determined to go through with the separation and eventual divorce.

Marilyn Vine calls the house on Tara Road looking for Danny. Marilyn explains that she is interested in a house exchange. On a whim, Ria agrees. Marilyn will come to stay at Tara Road and Ria will go to Marilyn's home in Stoneyfield, Connecticut. Ria begins to make plans immediately. Ria will spend one month alone and one month with Annie and Brian. Ria keeps the information to herself until she receives a packet from Marilyn with details. Danny is not pleased, nor is Annie.

Annie and Brian meet Bernadette for the first time.

The reader is introduced to Marilyn Vine, who works at a university. Marilyn's husband Greg is in Hawaii on a lectureship. She has opted not to go which puts strain on the marriage. Greg does not understand why Marilyn prefers to stay in Connecticut. Marilyn's friend Heidi lets it slip to Greg that Marilyn plans to go to Ireland for two months. Greg is livid. The relationship between the couple worsens. Marilyn tends to keep to herself and is annoyed that she told her friend about Ireland before she could tell Greg. Marilyn plans to make the trip regardless.

Travel dates approach for Ria and Marilyn. Danny finally seems to accept Ria's decision to go.

Chapter 4 Analysis

Ria's choice to accept Marilyn's offer seems both wise and a bit crazy. As the chapter goes on, Ria's family and friends come to realize that it will be good for Ria to get away from Dublin for a while. Danny is not keen on the idea, in part because it will disrupt his life and he will have to assume the role of the single parent. Danny refuses to tell Ria what part Bernadette will play in the discipline of the children.

Marilyn's history is similar to Ria's and the pair form an early bond. Each does not realize what a good home and life she has and each has fallen for the theory that the grass is always greener.



Chapter 5 Summary

Rosemary visits Ria. Rosemary says that Bernadette will never be anything to the children. Rosemary, like Polly, does not think that the relationship will last. Rosemary is dismayed to learn that Ria would take Danny back.

Finola Dunne, Bernadette's mother, supports her daughter in this new relationship although she is not keen on her daughter having become pregnant by a married man. Finola inquires about the children. Finola admires the new house Bernadette and Danny have, due in part to the will of Barney McCarthy.

Ria arrives in Stoneyfield and follows Marilyn's directions. Marilyn arrives in Dublin and meets Colm.

Annie and Brian move to Danny's new house. Bernadette says little and the children are unsure how to behave or what to do.

Ria goes to see Carlotta as planned. Carlotta offers Ria a beauty treatment while she waits for Carlotta's shift to end. Ria finally relaxes. Ria is surprised when she receives a large bill for the treatment. Carlotta takes Ria to Tudor Drive. Ria begs Carlotta to come inside. Carlotta resists and finally says that she has never been in Marilyn's house.

Marilyn sees the house on Tara Road for the first time. Marilyn loves the house. Colm introduces Marilyn to Clement the cat.

Both Marilyn and Ria get accustomed to their new surroundings.

Greg calls his house and speaks to Ria. The conversation is both strained and strange. Greg's brother stops by the house, unaware of Marilyn's absence. Greg also calls Heidi. Heidi asks Greg if he will be home for the alumni celebration.

Annie lies to Bernadette about going to see Nora and gets caught in the act. Annie sulks. Meanwhile Brian speaks to his friends Myles and Dekko. Kitty comes by to see Annie. Annie refers to her as "Mary" since her parents do not like Kitty. Finola does not catch on.

Ria spends time with Heidi and Carlotta.

Rosemary drops off a letter for Marilyn. Rosemary invites Marilyn to dinner or for drinks but makes it clear that she has no intention of being bothersome. Marilyn appreciates the gesture but wants to be alone.

Orla goes to see Colm about singing at the restaurant. Colm is stunned that men would offer Orla work if she showed her breasts.



Annie is mean to Danny regarding his relationship with Bernadette.

Nora and Gertie stop by to meet Marilyn.

Danny plans to take the family to Colm's restaurant. The kids insist on calling Ria to let her know that they will be out.

Rosemary and Marilyn arrange to have dinner.

Chapter 5 Analysis

Ria takes a step in the right direction by going to America. This is especially fortuitous since she makes a failed attempt at getting Danny back. Danny struggles with his role as parent and is obviously not used to handling the children. Bernadette seems to have little interest in the children. Bernadette's mother is on the scene and will most likely play a large part in the children's lives in Ria's absence.

Marilyn feels no guilt about going to Ireland and in fact feels that her sanity depends on it. Greg reaches out to anyone who will listen, trying to get an explanation for Marilyn's actions.

This is where the differences between Ria and Marilyn come out - Ria is very sociable and inviting while Marilyn is a solitary person who prefers to keep people at a distance.

Ria and Heidi take a class on the internet from Hubie, a young boy who teaches the class. Ria learns that Hubie is a friend of Marilyn's son Dale who died in a car accident.

Andy comes to dinner at Ria/Marilyn's house. Andy is impressed by Ria's skills in the kitchen.

Both Ria and Marilyn feel slighted and angry that the other is having such a grand time in her temporary home.

Marilyn begins to spend time with Rosemary and others. Marilyn begins to enjoy herself and begins to care for the gardens at Tara Road.

Ria learns the story behind Dale's death and figures out that is why Marilyn wanted to go to Ireland to escape. Hubie confides in Ria that Dale was driving the car the night he and Johnny were killed. Everyone assumed it was Johnny and Greg and Marilyn were led to believe it to relieve some of their grief. The boys were up to no good that night and everything was planned by Dale. Marilyn and Greg blame those who survived and forbade them to come to the funeral. Hubie makes Ria swear she will not tell Marilyn. Ria agrees.

Friendship

Friendship is one of the main themes of Tara Road by Maeve Binchy. Ria Johnson Lynch starts out as a quiet and unassuming woman. After Ria marries and starts a family, she is determined to be surrounded by friends and family. The house on Tara Road becomes a gathering place for Saturday get togethers as well as parties. Danny is not entirely happy about this situation.

Ria is a loyal friend who often helps others including Colm Barry and Gertie. Ria is the one everyone calls when in need. When Ria goes to America, she takes the trait with her. People who had not become close to Marilyn soon become close to Ria and doors are opened to new friendships and loyalties.

While Marilyn is in Dublin, she begins to experience a little of what Ria's life must be like regarding friendships. While no one is intrusive, Ria's friends make themselves available and eventually win over the previously isolated woman.



The experience of switching houses is invaluable to Ria and Marilyn and soon they develop a lasting friendship.

Betrayal

Betrayal is one of the main themes of Tara Road by Maeve Binchy. There are several major betrayals on behalf of some of the characters. The first is the betrayal by Danny Lynch of his company when he undercuts them to sell Barney McCarthy's house.

Although it is not learned until much later in the book, the reader learns that Rosemary Ryan has been betraying Ria for years by having a lasting affair with Danny. It is likely that Ria will never realize this betrayal since Marilyn certainly will not tell. In addition, the relationship ends badly.

Danny also betrays Ria. First he has an affair with Orla King. It is not stated how many other women there are in Danny's life. It is clear that Barney's betrayal of his wife, Mona, has had an impact on Danny. Ria learns of the betrayal when Danny announces that he is going to be with Bernadette, a 22 year old woman who has become pregnant. Ria seems as if she will never recover from this particular betrayal.

Some of the betrayals have been predicted - first by Hilary and Nora who distrust Danny and by Mrs. Connor, the psychic, who says that Rosemary is not a good friend.

Karma seems to wreak havoc on those who have betrayed others and those who are loyal thrive.



Style

Point of View

The point of view used in Tara Road by Maeve Binchy is third person omniscient. This point of view works well throughout the book since there are several components and underlying factors that would not be revealed otherwise, particularly when it comes to the relationships between the characters. The story itself is rather complex and only third person omniscient would allow the reader to follow and understand the activities of all of the characters plus the state of affairs in Ireland at the time. It also allows for the reader to follow and understand actions and thoughts of other characters in the book as well as those events of which one single character has no knowledge.

While the first person point of view might have been interesting when coming from the characters in their time of confusion, third person conveys the entire story and not just the subjective opinions of the characters. It also permits the reader to take part in the journey and development of each character in the story.

Language and Meaning

The language and meaning used throughout Tara Road by Maeve Binchy reflects on the times in a number of ways. It is clear that the people in the stories live in Ireland as they speak of particular events and fashions of the time. Binchy does not use a great deal of slang or any language that would date the work in a negative way or confuse the reader who might not be familiar with certain Irish terms.

Binchy is a master of language and is not afraid to exercise her vocabulary. There is a marked absence of sex, violence, and vulgarity throughout the stories and it is rare to see any use of profanity despite circumstances where it might be appropriate given the nature of betrayal and animosity between the characters. In the places where Irish terms and references are made, it tends to add an air of authenticity to the story and some old world charm. Since Binchy is Irish, this language rings true and is effective.

It is easy to see the progression of the work, both in structure and language. The language is more formal in the beginning of the collection and becomes more personal as the characters develop toward the middle and to the end.

Structure

The work is chronological in nature. It is comprised of 476 pages, broken into nine chapters. The shortest chapter is 31 pages in length; the longest chapter is 78 pages in length; the average number of pages per chapter is 66 pages.

The story begins with the author describing the teenage lives of Ria and Hilary Johnson. Ria is 16; Hilary is the elder sister. The girls talk about fellows. Hilary is much more experienced with dating and is a bit promiscuous. Ria is curious. Hilary tells Ria to keep her voice down because their mam (mother) will hear them and then no one will be allowed out of the house. Hilary tells Ria that her time will come. The girls also talk about their future plans. Ria wants to travel the world.

The girls' work history is also examined. Ria gets a job at a real estate firm. She does not know the business but is willing to learn and likes the job as well as her co-workers. One of Ria's co-workers, Rosemary Ryan, becomes a fast friend. Ria is envious of Rosemary's flair and style. All the men want to be with Rosemary but Rosemary is not an easy woman.

Ria learns that a new member of the team will be arriving at their office. The man, Danny Lynch, is attractive and charismatic. Ria falls for him immediately. To Ria's surprise, Danny falls for her instead of the vivacious Rosemary.

Ria and Danny marry and begin their life at Tara Road. There are many tumultuous moments while they raise their family. Danny becomes very successful and also begins to cheat which ends the marriage. Ria and an American woman named Marilyn decide



to exchange places, each experiencing a new life. During that time, both woman learn about themselves and step onto the path of becoming their true selves.
