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Plot Summary

They all leave except Marguerite. She feels responsible for what happened to him. She goes to apologize to him, and he just gazes at her. It is clear that he feels very attracted to her and visa versa. After her apology, she leaves. Wren is ordered to take the rest of the day off.



Chapter 1 Analysis

The book begins by informing the reader about the life of Marguerite. She is very saddened by the loss of her dear friend, Nick. Her remaining study group friends are in a league of their own and feel as if they are better than the average citizen of New Orleans. Marguerite has never felt that way. She treats everyone equally, although her father feels the same way her friends do.

Chapter 2 Summary

He was just reaching puberty.

Chapter 2 Analysis

Marguerite (Maggie) feels very drawn to Wren, although she cannot understand why. She feels indebted to him due to her rich, snooty friends and the way they treated him. She tries to make amends to him by apologizing. When she feels that she's done all she can, she leaves the bar and is attacked by four rough looking men. If it were not for Wren, she would have been raped or even killed. The reader feels the attachment between Maggie and Wren. They are extremely attracted to one another for reasons beyond each of their comprehensions. Wren can't possibly have a relationship with a human, and Maggie has no idea what Wren really is.



Chapter 3 Summary

Wren lay in bed in his natural form, healing, as Dev (a Were Bear) and four of his brothers brought in flowers that were sent to Wren. Nicolette, the mother of the house, is angry and storms upstairs to tell Maggie to leave. Wren is angry and growls at Nicolette, but Maggie insists upon leaving. She doesn't want to cause anymore problems. When Maggie leaves, Nicolette calls her mate and arranges to rid the Sanctuary of Wren once and for all.

Chapter 4 Analysis

The reader learns more about the Katagarian race in this chapter. They are those who have animal hearts. Wren is one of them, and it is taking every ounce of his energy to be human in front of Maggie. They only eat every four days and are extremely dangerous. Wren's strength is also incredible. He knows he is an outcast and should not be anywhere near Maggie, but he cannot help himself.

Maggie is not the only one in turmoil, because Nicolette will not allow Maggie to be with Wren. It is forbidden and could cause the Sanctuary to be in jeopardy. Chapter 6 Analysis

Chapter 8 Summary

On an island off the shores of Australia, a meeting is called to order. The Omegrion is a meeting where the heads of each species (Regis) are called together. The Katagaria and Arcadia Were-Animals meet to discuss serious matters. Today, the meeting is called to discuss Trelos (rabies or madness) in one of their kind. There are two wolf Regis's (Vane and Fury) and Dante, the head of the meeting, is disturbed by this. There should only be one Regis per animal. There is one dragon, one jackal, one bear, one tiger, one panther, etc. As he approaches them, they explain that Vane changed to Arcadian upon puberty. The others do not think Wren will listen to her due to his animal heart. They are wrong.

Maggie talks Wren into trying to do things the human way by proving his Uncle's guilt in his parent's murder. He listens intently while Maggie talks to him about going back in



time and trying to find something that will link his Uncle to the crime. He finally agrees. Just as the hunters arrive on the ship, Maggie and Wren transport themselves away from the ship and into Wren's father's bedroom.



Chapter 11 Summary

They are back in the 1980's in Wren's father's room. Wren recognizes the things around the room and tells Maggie there is a lot he doesn't remember. They hear voices in the hallway. Wren whisks Maggie away to hide in the closet. He wishes there was time to hide somewhere else, but there's no time. Wren's father and mother enter the room and are arguing loudly. Aristotle and Karina were arguing, because Karina is brought back from Asia by Aristotle to discuss their son, Wren. Aristotle takes the information in slowly. He cannot believe he would leave a full human, Bill Lauren, in charge of his son. He knows all of this is true, though. Wren has come back from the future for a reason.

Karina had left to meet Grayson, and Wren follows behind to track her leaving Maggie behind for Aristotle to guard. Aristotle is pleased to protect her in Wren's absence. Maggie asks Aristotle if he has any old pictures of Wren when he was a boy. He says he can do better than that and leads her to the current, thirteen-year-old Wren. Aristotle built a one way glass enclosure around Wren's room so that he can see Wren, but Wren doesn't know he's being watched. Maggie watches as Wren changes to human form behind the glass and tries to walk and talk. He's like a human baby taking his first steps. Wren learns this on his own, and refuses help from his father.

Chapter 11 Analysis

They have to be very careful when traveling back in time, for any changes could alter the future. Wren feels very protective of Maggie and doesn't want anything to happen to her. Upon their arrival and hearing the way Karina speaks of Wren to Aristotle, Maggie



feels great anger. Wren comes to the realization that his father really does love him. It's his mother's fault that he was kept locked in a cage for so many years.

Chapter 12 Summary

Aimee finds her way back to the Sanctuary. She really doesn't want to be there, but she knows she must return. She is the only daughter to Aubert and Nicolette and knows they would hunt her down if she didn't return. She heads for her room and is confronted by Nicolette. Aimee is tired and does not want a confrontation with her mother. She tells her mother that Wren is innocent, and Nicolette gets angry. As they stand together arguing, they hear something in Wren's room. They open the door to find Zack rummaging through Wren's things.

Nicolette confronts Zack, and Aimee says Zack lied to the Omegrion about Wren. Nicolette asks him if it's true, and he doesn't answer. As he has made a habit of lying his whole life, it is easy for him to mask his scent. Nicolette could not smell the lies he told, so she thought he was telling the truth. Nicolette orders Zack to leave and prepares her family to make things right for Wren, so that the wrath of Savitar doesn't find them all killed.

Back in the 1980's, Wren hides in the bushes while he watches his mother and Uncle talk on a park bench. Characters

Marguerite D'Aubert Goudeau

Marguerite (Maggie) is a college student. She attends Tulane University as a law student and studies with her group of stuck up "so called" friends. Her father is the senator of Louisiana, and her mother is a Cajun woman who commits suicide to escape the life of wife of a senator. Maggie feels very alone since her mother dies and starts to slip into depression upon the death of her dear friend, Nick. He seems the only person who truly understands her.

Maggie has always felt that she didn't belong in her own social life. She didn't exactly want to become a lawyer. She does this for her father. She feels as though she is meant for something else. The closest thing to her since Nick's death is Wren Tigarian. She meets him at a bar called the Sanctuary. Maggie's stuck up friends pick on Wren continuously, and Maggie sticks up for him. They spend a little time together at first, then they start spending a lot more time together. Soon they fall in love hard, but Maggie knows being the daughter of the senator that this match will never make her father pleased.

Wren Tigarian

Wren is twenty-years-old and lives at a place called the Sanctuary. It is a bar on the outside, but on the inside, it is a safe haven for Were-Hunters that have no place else to go. Wren is a Katagarian, which means he has the heart of an animal, and his natural form is that of an animal. When he sleeps, he's an animal. He has to wish himself into human form, and it's difficult for Were-Hunters to keep human form during the daytime hours. Wren has the ability to become four different things, human, white tiger, snow leopard or a combination of white tiger and snow leopard. Most Were-Hunters are either human or one animal. He has lived at the Sanctuary for twenty years. His parents died violent deaths when he was very little. Wren is a very quiet person. He buses tables at the Sanctuary and keeps to himself. He has a friend Marvin, who is a monkey and befriends Nick (Maggie's friend). He hates socializing and would rather keep to himself in the dark of the Sanctuary.

Fury Kattalakis

Fury is one of Wren's friends. They knew each other as children and somewhat later in life. Fury has two brothers, Fang and Vane. He is a large white timber wolf in animal form and is a Katagarian. Fury and his two brothers come to Wren's aid when he is sent to Omegrion and sentenced to be hunted and killed. Fury knows Wren is innocent of the crimes he's charged with and offers his own den as protection to Wren. He not only puts his own life on the line, but his pack, as well. Fury is a Regis, head of an animal branch, and is therefore called upon when the Omegrion meets to decide a Were-Hunter's fate.



Vane Kattalakis

Vane is brother to Fury and Fang. He is an Arcadian Were-Hunter and a large solid white timber wolf, like his brother Fury. Vane was born Katagarian but changed to Arcadian when he hit puberty. He was protected from his pack when this happened by his brother Fury. Vane is a Regis, head of an animal branch, and is therefore called upon when the Omegrion meets to decide a Were-Hunter's fate. Although each animal branch can only have one Regis, Vane represents the Arcadian side where Fury represents the Katagarian side.

Nicolette Peltier

Nicolette heads the family of bear Katagarian Were-Hunters. She runs the Sanctuary bar in New Orleans. She is the Mama bear who decided to start the Sanctuary as the safe zone after two of her bear cubs were killed. The other Peltier's are Aimee, Remi, Quinn, Zar, Serre Etienne, Alain and Papa (Aubert). Nicolette helps Zack (Wren's cousin) accuse him at Ometrion of killing his parents. It is because of her and Zack that Wren is hunted by the others and marked for death. Nicolette is trying to protect her family from harm and, since Wren brings Maggie (a human) to the Sanctuary, she feels that the humans will be onto them, and they will no longer be safe.

Dante Pontis

Dante is a Katagarian panther who owns Dante's Inferno in the Twin Cities, Minnesota. He comes to Wren after his death sentence is rescinded and offers him sanctuary at his Inferno. He offers Maggie the same. He's not a very tolerant sanctuary owner like the others, but he seems to be fond of Wren. He is the head of his family and is mated to Pandora Kouti, an Arcadian panther.

Savitar

Savitar is the most feared of his kind. He is thought to be nearly nine-hundred-years-old and the first to guard at the Omegrion. He can turn Were-Hunters to dust by just a look. He loves the beach and surfing and is always found wearing surfer clothing. He is extremely powerful, keeps to himself and his body is covered in tattoos. He has no decision power at Omegrion. He simply maintains equality as the meetings take place. No Katagarian or Arcadian will fight in his presence. He also delivers to Maggie and Wren the gift of their becoming mated. He visits their wedding ceremony and delivers the mark to both of their palms.



Were-Hunters

Lycaon, an ancient Greek king unknowingly married an Apollite (a race created by the Greek god Apollo, more beautiful and stronger than mankind and blessed with psychic abilities). The Apollite died on her twenty-seventh birthday. Lycaon knew his two sons would also die on their twenty-seventh birthdays, so he started experimenting on them by splicing their life forces with those of animals (wolves, dragons, jaguars, etc.) to create hybrid beings. When he was done experimenting, he chose the wolves and the dragons to merge with his sons.

The fates were not happy and punished them to be at war with one another. They made one Katagarian and the other Arcadian. To this day, they hunt one another and use the Sanctuaries scattered around the world for safe haven. They are Were-Hunters, and now there are many kinds, lions, hawks, falcons, eagles, tigers, wolves, bears, jackals, snow leopards, jaquars and cheetahs.

Were-Hunter Mate

Every Were-Hunter is chosen a mate by the fates. Sometimes, it's against their will. This is done by giving the Were-Hunter and it's mate a symbol that is burned into the palm of their hand. They have three weeks to accept or reject their chosen mate. If each of them accept, they can have children together. If they do not, they will remain sterile for the rest of their lives. The male can only mate with the female. He will become impotent around every other female he encounters. The female is free to mate with whomever she chooses, but she can only have children with her chosen mate.

Bryani Kattalakis

Byani is the mother of Vane, Fang, Anya, Fury, Dare and Star. She is an Arcadian Lykos Were-Huntress. She has three scars on her face and neck and dresses very sexy, like a warrior queen. She hates Vane and his Katagarian father who tried to force her to accept him as her mate. She lives in Britain.



Objects/Places

Sanctuary

Sanctuary is the premier New Orleans biker bar, owned by the Peltiers, a clan of Katagarian bears. It is a limani (safe zone for all types of Hunters) "where natural rivalries are put aside and no fighting or killing is permitted". Wren Tigarian works at Sanctuary as a bus boy. He and his monkey live peacefully together away from life outside.

Omegrion

Omegrion is a council of the Were-Hunters with one representative from each branch of the Arcadian and Katagarian race. Each head is called a Regis, and they all come together to decide the fate of a Were-Hunter who has been brought up on charges of a sort. They make the laws that govern all of the Were-Hunters and are responsible for setting up Sanctuaries.

Sentinels

Out of the Arcadian patrias are born the Sentinels. They are the guardians of man and Were-animals. Only a select few are born to each patria. They are the strongest Were-Hunters and pursue and execute Slayers or those found guilty by Omegrion. A "geometric design covers one side of an Arcadian Sentinel's face once they reach maturity, but the Sentinel can hide the design if they choose to."

Maggie's Apartment

Maggie has a cozy apartment not far from the University that her father pays for. She lives alone there and has no pets. She rarely has visitors. It is a modest place with few decorations. It has one bedroom, a front porch and ta pool in the back. She and Wren find solace there together away from the crowds in and around the University. They spend as much time together in her apartment as they can.

The Library

The library is where Maggie and her snooty friends have their study group together. They talk about people and make jokes at other's expense. Maggie finds it very boring to get together with them, but likes to please her father. The group consists of children of prominent families destined for greatness in New Orleans.



Apollites/Atlantis

Apollites/Atlantis is a race created by the Greek god, Apollo. More beautiful and stronger than mankind, they were blessed with psychic abilities. Apollo loved his people and wanted them to replace mankind. They were sent to Atlantis where they intermarried with the Atlantean natives - until the day that the Apollite queen got jealous and sent her people to kill Apollo's Greek human mistress and his son. In retaliation, Apollo cursed his people. On their twenty-seventh birthdays, they would die a slow and very painful death. Today, many of them blend seamlessly into the human world while others live in segregated communes.

Daimons

Daimons are Apollites who refuse to die at age twenty-seven. They have to steal human souls to artificially elongate their life span. Once a human soul is taken, it begins to die, leaving Daimons always looking for their next victim. As long as they have a living human soul within them, they can continue to live indefinitely. Any Apollite who takes a human soul into his or her body is called a Daimon.

Wren's Childhood Home

Wren's childhood home is a quaint house with surrounding land. The Were-animals like to live in homes that have a remote feel to them, so that they can remain in animal form and not cause suspicion among the neighbors. Wren has his own room, but throughout his childhood, his parents kept him locked in a cage.

Maggie's Pearl Necklace and Earrings

Maggie's father comes through for her in the end by coming to her wedding with a wonderful gift. Her grandmother on her mother's side of the family owned a beautiful pearl necklace and matching earrings. Maggie's mother wore them when she married her father, and now Maggie would have them for her own wedding.

Mating Mark

All Were-animals are given mating marks upon the palm of their hands when they are mated to the opposite sex. The Fates choose this mate for them. Once they have made love to one another, the mark magically appears on their palms.



Themes

Two Different Races

The central image and conceit of this story are the two prominent races. The Arcadians are basically humans who are able to take animal form once they reach puberty. For them, puberty occurs around the age of twenty-five. Their prominent form is human, so when they sleep they look like humans and have human hearts. For them, their training is to go from human form to animal form by using magic.

The Katagarian are animals who can take human form once they reached puberty at the same time. Their prominent form is animal, so when they sleep, they look like their respective animal and have animal hearts. For them, their training is to go from animal form to human form by using magic. Both species have magic that is also only available to them at puberty. They are able to travel through time, are telepathic (with one another) and take refuge in sanctuaries across the world. They are constantly at battle with one another.

Savitar, the impartial mediator between the two races, set up limanis or sanctuaries where human and animal can go without fear of being hunted or killed. In these few places, they can rest for a time before they rejoin the war.

A Forbidden Love

Marguerite (Maggie) is a completely human, college student. She attends Tulane University as a law student. Her father is the senator of Louisiana, and her mother is a Cajun woman who commits suicide to escape the life of wife of a senator. Maggie's father wants her to marry an upper crust man who has status in New Orleans. He would be happy if she married a doctor or a lawyer. He has high hopes for his daughter. He pays for her apartment, her college and everything she could possibly want. Being a Senator, Maggie's actions reflect upon his social standing, and he takes this very seriously.

Wren is twenty-years-old and lives at a place called the Sanctuary. It is a bar on the outside, but on the inside, it is a safe haven for Were-Hunters that have no place else to go. Wren is a Katagarian, which means he has the heart of an animal, and his natural form is that of an animal. He has lived at the Sanctuary for twenty years. His parents died violent deaths when he was very little. On the outside, Wren looks like just another poor bus boy who wears old faded jeans and t-shirts, but he is more than that. He is the heir to Tigarian Technologies and holds 52% of the stock. Tigarian Technologies is second to only Microsoft, so Wren is sitting on a fortune.

The simple fact remains that one is human, and the other is Katagarian. None-the-less, these two individuals fall madly and deeply in love with one another. They both know this love can never become anything more.



Were-Hunters

Were-Hunters are made up of human and many different animal types. They came to be because of a love gone bad many years ago. More than two thousand years earlier, there was a queen who was born of a cursed race (the Apollites). She hid this from her husband, the king. Before she was born, her people had killed the mistress and child of the Greek god Apollo. In retaliation for the murders, the Greek god cursed her people with three things. They would have to drink the blood of their own in order to live. They could not walk in daylight, and they would all die a painful death at the age of twenty-seven. When this queen became twenty-seven, her husband watched as she died a painful and slow death.

They bore two sons together, and the king could not bear the thought of his sons dying in the same manner, so he tried to cross breed them with animals to elongate their lives. He created two races, the Katagarian who had animal hearts, and the Arcadian who had human hearts. He created many of these species before altering his two sons. Once his sons were no longer true Apollites, they could not be held to Apollo's curse. The Fates (those who were responsible for making the laws for his people) were angry with the king for thwarting god's plan and changing his two sons. The Fates demanded that the king kill all of the Katagarian and Arcadian race, starting with his two sons. He refused, so the Fates caused the two races to never be at peace. They would be at war all the time, hunting and killing each other until no more of their kind was left. The war has lasted even until this day.



Style

Point of View

This story is told in third person, but the point of view if both Maggie and Wren's. Maggie and Wren comment about their feelings toward each subject, the characters and development of the people in the story. One knows that they are quite taken by one another. Maggie is sympathetic to Wren each time he is wounded and does her best to mend his wounds and give him her love.

This story is fiction, a work in which one timeframe is briefly interrupted by another. The people in the earlier timeframe are Wren's mother and father in the 1980's. Love conquers all, the author shows us. Maggie and Wren, the main characters, enter a relationship not knowing much about each other. Wren holds his Were-Hunter status in secret in the beginning, but learns to trust Maggie and, slowly, the relationship grows. Before long, Maggie learns of Wren's half man, half animal status and grows to love him absolutely with everything in her soul. As it turns out, they are mated in the end and have their families surrounding them.

Setting

The novel opens in 2005 in New Orleans. It revolves around a bar called the Sanctuary and Maggie's apartment. There are many different places, but the majority is in those two places. The brief shift in time comes in a later chapter where Maggie and Wren are transported back in time by Wren's Were-animal powers to the year 1980. They arrive at Wren's childhood home, but stay only briefly.

Wren is surrounded by a series of insults and injuries inflicted upon him by Maggie's rich and shallow classmates. Later in the novel, Wren is hunted by his kind also and bears scars from that, as well. Maggie and Wren's love for one another grows to a point where they burn with desire and do not care to be separated ever. Wren's father bites Maggie on the shoulder and makes her Were-animal. This starts the solid union of the two.

Language and Meaning

This story was written in the early 2000's. There is a distinct knowledge the author portrays when writing about the Were-Hunters of this time. The language is simple and easy to read and the story is told in the same manner. Maggie is portrayed to be of Cajun ancestry because of her mother. Wren is very American, so their dialect is direct with no accent or slang. The story is filled with history of the Katagarian and Arcadian Were-animals and descriptions of their customs and ways. The love between Maggie and Wren, in particular, is described throughout each chapter and gets stronger throughout the story.



Structure

The story is told in sixteen chapters with an epilogue at the end. The progress of the story is linear except for the brief appearance Wren and Maggie make in 1980. It starts and ends in 2005 in New Orleans.

Would you have liked to see Wren reunited with his father earlier? Do you think it would have ruined things for he and Maggie?

How do you think the book would be different if Maggie were the Were-Hunter, and Wren were completely human?
